The course additions to the major and minor are approved curriculum, proposed to be approved for use in the major since the last formal revision of the major and minor course lists.

Film Studies faculty recently completed an interdisciplinary course audit and found that several courses in the major and minor are no longer offered by their academic unit. Future curricular revision is ongoing within the Film Studies area faculty committee; the department supports these initial requested changes to update the advising guides and more accurately represent the active course offerings that count toward requirements in the major and minor in Film Studies.

Film Studies minor program guidelines

Credit hours:

- A minimum of 15 credit hours required (one introductory course and 12 additional credit hours). 1000 level courses shall not be counted in the minor.
- Transfer and EM credit hours allowed: a student is permitted to count up to 6 total hours of transfer credit and/or credit by examination.
- Overlap with the GE: A student is permitted to overlap up to 6 credit hours between the GE and the minor.
- Overlap with the major and additional minor(s): the minor must be in a different subject than the major; the minor must contain a minimum of 12 hours distinct from the major and/or additional minor(s).

Grades required

- Minimum C- for a course to be listed on the minor.
- Minimum 2.00 cumulative GPA for all minor course work.
- Course work graded Pass/Non-Pass cannot count on the minor.
- No more than 3 credit hours of coursework graded Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory may count toward the minor.
- X193 credits No more than 3 credit hours.
