Dear Members of the ASC Curriculum Committee:

I am writing this letter, as the Chair of the Journalism Committee in the School of Communication, to formally request that COMM 4445 (Stereotypes in Media) be added to the Critical Thinking Skills area of the Journalism Major.

I am making this request for two reasons. The first is that the content fits squarely within the Critical Thinking Skills domain for our journalism students. Understanding how stereotypes are deployed in the media (both intentionally and unintentionally) can have important consequences. By teaching students how to reflect upon these representations, we are helping to train our students to be more responsible consumers, and producers, of news. The second reason we are making this request is because a current course option in this area, COMM 3597.02 (Media and Terrorism), will not be offered for the foreseeable future due to a retirement. As such, including COMM 4445 as a consistent option – to replace 3597.02 – allows more flexibility for our students.

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JOURNALISM-BA**Public Affairs Journalism (PAJ)**

This program leads to a tagged Bachelor of Arts in Journalism degree. Requirements for students admitted to the major SU12 and later. Nine (9) COMM courses totaling at least 32 credits are required. A grade of C- or better is required in all courses in the major. Maintaining a 2.0 GPA in the major is required after admission to the program

PROGRAM AREA DESCRIPTION

Public Affairs Journalism (PAJ) teaches you how to investigate and disseminate news. Our multimedia focus prepares you to integrate this training with the skills necessary for packaging news stories with word, still photo, audio, and video. As a journalism student, you also are taught to consider the context in which you will practice in the field, including an understanding of the social, legal, and ethical implications that all journalists encounter.

To emphasize applied learning, students are provided extensive skills training, further reinforced through experience at *The Lantern*, completion of a minor, and a required news-related internship.

REQUIRED PRE-MAJOR COURSES: 6 credit hours (do not count in the major). All students must complete two pre-major courses. A grade of C- or better is required in both courses for a Major & Specialization Application to be considered. Admission is competitive and an online application is required.
