#### Rationale

The School of Music offers the following documents for converting its degree programs from quarters to semesters. The School's three undergraduate degrees (Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Music Education, and Bachelor of Arts) and four graduate degrees (Master of Music, Master of Arts, Doctor of Musical Arts, and Doctor of Philosophy) may be pursued in conjunction with 42 programs, two minors, and one Graduate Interdisciplinary Specialization:

Members of the School of Music tenure-track faculty, led by eight academic area heads, are responsible for crafting and delivering the curricula. Beginning in Winter Quarter, 2009, a task force began discussions and identified principles by which the conversion would take place. After comparing the semester systems used by peer institutions, the decision was made to minimize changes to OSU program goals and/or curricular requirements. Led by the Associate Director of Undergraduate Studies and the Chair of Graduate Studies, three committees, including the curriculum, graduate studies, and administrative (comprising the eight area heads), continued their deliberations. Administrative committee discussions yielded the decision to renumber the School's courses based upon the current numbering system rather than developing a new system.

For the remainder of the academic year, each area began to convert its courses to their semester equivalents. In the summer of 2010, new course information was collected to input the School's 700 courses, using the CUT spreadsheet. Also, during the summer of 2010, the Associate Director, in frequent consultation with the area heads, drafted semester programs, four-year plans, and curriculum maps. Each area vetted drafts of these documents at the annual faculty retreat in September of 2010. Simultaneously, the Chair of Graduate Studies, through consultation with area heads and the Graduate Studies Committee, revised the graduate degree curricular sheets. Further modifications were made to these documents through October, and near-final drafts were properly vetted through the curriculum committee, Graduate Studies Committee, and administrative committee during that period. The full faculty approved all semester programs on October 27, 2010.

#### **Transition Plans**

In Autumn of 2010, the School faculty began to advise its students of the approaching conversion to semesters: 1) during the annual welcome convocation, the Associate Director spoke with students about the conversion process and how it will affect them; 2) on the same day, a portion of the School's website was dedicated to the semester conversion. Documents contained therein discuss the semester numbering system, the university's commitment to students, and advice for the students as the semester change approaches. Over time, these web pages will contain more specific information providing details on program and course conversion. Furthermore, the SOM Associate Director will create a spreadsheet that will show current quarterly course numbers and titles and their semester equivalents. During the 2010-2011 school year, the Associate Director will also meet with student organizations such as the Undergraduate Music Council, to discuss the conversion process in detail, and to provide the aforementioned documentation to the students.

In the Autumn of 2011, the Associate Director will offer an extensive group advising session for all undergraduate students on the day prior to the start of classes. Soon thereafter, during "Advising Fairs," members of the SOM faculty, even those not regularly assigned advisory duties, will offer special (one-time only) individual advising sessions in preparation for the School's conversion to semesters. Furthermore, several times in each quarter of 2012, the Associate Director will offer additional undergraduate group sessions which will be advertised by email, web communication, and posted flyers. One-on-one advising sessions with each student's regular advisor, undergraduate and graduate, will serve as follow up during the normal advising period. It is anticipated that, for a number of upperclassmen in the School, flexibility will be required to prevent delays in the time it takes them to graduate; the School intends to use substitute courses within each student's program to alleviate this problem. In determining eligibility for students enrolled in the School's minor programs, those courses taken in the quarter system will be honored using a 1:1 ratio. Moreover, those students who have been away from campus or have fallen behind in their programs will need special guidance to access the correct course sequence and fulfill the necessary prerequisites. The attached fouryear plans will be of great assistance to all involved in this process.

I would like to acknowledge the dedicated work of the Associate Director for Undergraduate Studies, Tim Leasure, and the Director of Graduate Studies, Pat Woliver; the documents shepherded by these two gentlemen throughout this time-consuming and frequently overwhelming task are monuments to their commitment, skill, and perseverance.

#### **SOM Graduate Programs Rationale**

The mission statement of the Ohio State University School of Music as published in the *School of Music Faculty Handbook and Pattern of Administration*, under the heading "Purposes of the School of Music" states:

The Ohio State University School of Music educates students for professional careers as composers, performers, scholars, and teachers. As an integral part of a major public university with a strong commitment to teaching, research, and service, the school recognizes the relationship that binds music to other academic and artistic disciplines. The School aims to provide, at the highest level, instruction in the study and practice of music and, in so doing, to promote an awareness of music as a humanistic study. The School encourages musical research in all its dimensions by providing students and faculty opportunities for performance, creative activity, and scholarly inquiry. The School is dedicated to sustaining and advancing musical culture in the academy and in the society at large, and it endeavors to meet service obligations to various communities within and beyond the university. Recognizing the dynamic and evolving character of music in contemporary life, the School acknowledges an ongoing responsibility to evaluate its programs and procedures, and to investigate fresh approaches to the realization of its mission. In keeping with the university's broader mission, the school is committed to nurturing the best of Ohio's students. while developing and maintaining excellence and diversity by recruiting nationally and internationally.

The School of Music offers two doctoral degrees: the Doctor of Philosophy (Music Education, Music Theory, Musicology) and the Doctor of Musical Arts (Composition, Conducting, Performance); and two Master's degrees: the Master of Music and the Master of Arts. Embedded within the degrees are 24 subprograms and one Graduate Interdisciplinary Specialization. The curricula for the subprograms are not rigid and the curricular sheet for each program acts as a guidepost for degree requirements. The sheet is intended to indicate both the nature of the course work and the usual elements for fulfilling the requirements for the degree. The student's actual course work is designed to provide a well-rounded total program, including depth in the major area and breadth in supportive studies. As stated in the School of Music Graduate Handbook, each student is assigned a graduate advisor. After assignment, the student consults with the adviser, and together develops a tentative program of studies. The adviser and student are charged with the responsibility of ascertaining that all degree requirements are met. At an appropriate time an advisory committee is selected by the student and the advisor. This advisory committee oversees the master's recital, examination, and thesis, or the doctoral recitals, Candidacy Examination, and Final Oral Examination (dissertation or DMA document defense). The advisor, with the assistance of the Advisory Committee, has the right and the responsibility to determine the content of each assigned advisee's program. Coursework is chosen from 5000 level through 8000 level courses of which at least 50% must be 6000 level or higher.

For conversion to semesters, the SOM Graduate Studies Committee and graduate faculty following the SOM mission statement has retained the processes that govern graduate study and has moved forward with the principle of adhering to (in most cases) a 2/3reduction in course offerings and requirements. Our doctoral credit hour requirements have gone from 120 total credits to 80 total credits. Of that, students can transfer 30 credits in from a master's degree from another institution.

Most of our master's programs have gone from 45 minimum quarter credit hours to 30 semester hours. The outlier subprograms are:

- Master of Music in Piano Performance
- Master of Music in Voice Performance
- Master of Music in Woodwind Performance 34 minimum credits
- Master of Arts in Piano Pedagogy

# **Master's Degree Programs**

### **M.M. in Brass Performance**

The Master of Music in Brass Performance degree program provides intensive instruction in performance and appropriate exposure to related literature and research techniques. The degree is appropriate for those preparing for careers in performance and/or higher education. The program is also appropriate for those planning to pursue the doctorate in performance. The student is accepted into the program based upon an audition on a primary instrument: trumpet, horn, trombone, euphonium, or tuba; and continues in the program with that instrument as their "major" instrument. The curriculum requires a minimum of 34 semester credits. The major comprises 22 credits: 16 credits in one-on-one lessons 7802.51-55; 4 credits in "Brass Literature" 7852.05; and 2 credits (7805) for a culminating recital that serves as the thesis. A minimum of 12 credits are required from Supportive Studies in Music: 3 credits in "Music Research Methods and Bibliography" 6786; 4 credits in ensemble participation (one ensemble per semester); and at least 5 credits of electives chosen from musicology, music theory, music education, or conducting.

For brass majors the performance of one major recital is required. This recital is considered the thesis. The recital must be presented no later than the twelveth week of the final semester. The Master's Examination Committee is expected to attend this recital. After approval of the recital, a one-hour oral examination will be conducted by the three-member Master's Examination Committee comprising two members from the major area and one member from outside the major.

## M.M. in Composition

The Master of Music in Composition is designed to provide the student with broadly based professional training and solid preparation for doctoral level work in music composition. In conformity with the 30 credit hour minimum of other M.M. programs, the major area receives 20 credit hours and the remaining 10 credits are allotted to supportive studies in other areas of music (musicology, applied music, music education) or in related fields outside of music (fine arts, linguistics, computer science, psychology, philosophy, etc). Requirements in the major area include 6 credits in the following two categories: composition (Music 5635 or higher) and counterpoint (Music 5631 or higher); 4 credits in "Composer's Seminar" 6630; 4 credits in other graduate courses in composition or music theory subject to the approval of the advisor; and thesis (Music 6999 to a maximum of 6 hours). Requirements in supportive studies include one registration in analysis (Music 5620 or higher), and 6-8 elective credits in musicology, music education, applied music, electronic music (5677.01, 5636.01, or higher), additional analysis courses, or participation in ensembles. This distribution conforms to NASM standards. The thesis is a composition that requires a score or a computer printout with one set of materials necessary for performance. The composition represents the culmination of the student's work in the master's program, and as such should demonstrate the student's skill and creativity. After approval of the thesis and recital, a three-member Master's Examination Committee conducts a one-hour oral examination. One committee member represents an area other than the major.

The program is designed to provide a rigorous foundation in traditional composition studies, and an opportunity to pursue special interests within the realm of "classical" contemporary styles.

In addition to having close connections with the College of the Arts and Sciences computer center (ACCAD), the school has its own state-of-the-art sound synthesis studio with several satellite stations, a MIDI computer lab, and excellent library resources.

The composition program is supported and enhanced by the series of annual contemporary music festivals sponsored by the school with the support of the Columbus Symphony and various art councils. Recent festival composers have included Crumb, Bolcom, Harbison, Corigliano, Wilson, Schuller, Osvaldo Golijov, and Augusta Read Thomas. One concert in each festival features works of local composers.

Yearly competitions and honors also stimulate student compositional activity. These include the Donald Harris Scholarship, the Ruth Frisco Prize, the Jack Johnstone Prize, and the University Orchestra Composer-in-Residence Competition.

# M.M. in Choral Conducting

The **Master of Music in Choral Conducting** is a two year, in-residence program with a curriculum designed for those seeking advanced instruction in the art of conducting and

experience in conducting choral ensembles. The program is also appropriate for those planning to pursue the doctorate in conducting. All master's candidates in choral conducting are required to pass a keyboard proficiency exam upon entering the program. The curriculum requires a minimum of 32 semester credits. The major comprises 20 credits: 4 credits in one-on-one conducting lessons 7803.01; 4 credits in "Conducting Seminar" 6881; 2 credits in "History and Literature of Choral Music" 5650; 8 credits in ensemble participation (two ensembles per semester); and 2 credits for a culminating concert prepared and conducted by the candidate. A minimum of 12 credits are required from Supportive Studies in Music: 3 credits in "Music Research Methods and Bibliography" 6786; 2 credits in "Graduate Diction for Singers" 6812; at least 3 credits from musicology; at least 2 credits from music theory; and 2 credits in applied voice study 6701.21.

Conducting majors compile a recital portfolio comprising public performances with various choral ensembles, notably Mastersingers (a chamber ensemble that serves as a vehicle for graduate conducting recitals). Majors also conduct their respective Glee Clubs and occasionally either Symphonic Choir or the Chorale. This portfolio serves as the thesis. The Master's Examination Committee is expected to approve this portfolio, either by attending the performances or reviewing an audio tape.

# M.M. in Orchestral Conducting

The **Master of Music in Orchestral Conducting** is a two year, in-residence program with a curriculum designed for those seeking advanced instruction in the art of conducting and experience in conducting orchestras. The program is also appropriate for those planning to pursue the doctorate in conducting. Prerequisite for entrance is a baccalaureate degree in music (or equivalent) with a major in keyboard or a band or orchestral instrument. In conformity with the 30 credit hour minimum of other M.M. programs, 18 credits make up the major area of conducting: 8 credits in one-on-one conducting lessons 7803.02; 4 credits in "Conducting Seminar" 6881; 4 credits in an applied studio instrument 6701; and 2 credits for a culminating concert (the thesis, 6999) prepared and conducted by the candidate. A minimum of 12 credits are required from Supportive Studies in Music: 3 credits in "Music Research Methods and Bibliography" 6786; 4 credits in ensemble participation (registration in Symphony Orchestra each semester); at least 3 credits from musicology; and at least 2 credits from music theory.

### M.M. in Wind Conducting

The **Master of Music in Wind Conducting** is a two year, in-residence program with a curriculum designed for those seeking advanced instruction in the art of conducting and experience in conducting wind ensembles. The program is also appropriate for those planning to pursue the doctorate in conducting. Prerequisite for entrance is a baccalaureate degree in music (or equivalent) with a major in keyboard or a band or orchestral instrument. In conformity with the 30 credit hour minimum of other M.M. programs, 18 credits make up the major area of conducting: 8 credits in one-on-one conducting lessons 7803.03; 4 credits in "Conducting Seminar" 6881; 4 credits in an

applied studio instrument 6701; and 2 credits for a culminating concert (the thesis, 6999) prepared and conducted by the candidate. A minimum of 12 credits are required from Supportive Studies in Music: 3 credits in "Music Research Methods and Bibliography" 6786; 4 credits in ensemble participation (one ensemble per semester); at least 3 credits from musicology; and at least 2 credits from music theory.

# M.M. in Percussion Performance

The **Master of Music in Percussion Performance** degree program provides intensive instruction in performance and appropriate exposure to related literature and research techniques. The degree is appropriate for those preparing for careers in performance and/or higher education. The program is also appropriate for those planning to pursue the doctorate in performance. The student is accepted into the program based upon an audition on several percussion instruments and continues in the program with percussion as their "major" instrument. In conformity with the 30 credit hour minimum of most other M.M. programs, the major comprises 18 credits: 12 credits in one-on-one percussion lessons 7802.71; 4 credits in "Percussion Literature" 7852.07; and 2 credits (7805) for a culminating recital that serves as the thesis. A minimum of 12 credits are required from Supportive Studies in Music: 3 credits in "Music Research Methods and Bibliography" 6786; 4 credits in ensemble participation (one ensemble per semester); and at least 5 credits of electives chosen from musicology, music theory, music education, or conducting.

For percussion majors the performance of one major recital is required. This recital is considered the thesis. The recital must be presented no later than the twelveth week of the final semester. The Master's Examination Committee is expected to attend this recital. After approval of the recital, a one-hour oral examination will be conducted by the three-member Master's Examination Committee comprising two members from the major area and one member from outside the major.

# M.M. in Piano Performance

The **Master of Music in Piano Performance** degree program provides intensive instruction in performance and appropriate exposure to related literature and research techniques. The degree is appropriate for those preparing for careers in performance and/or higher education. The program is also appropriate for those planning to pursue the doctorate in performance. The student is accepted into the program based upon a piano audition and continues in the program with piano as their "major" instrument. The curriculum requires a minimum of 32 semester credits. The major comprises 20 credits: 12 credits in one-on-one piano lessons 7802.11; 6 credits in "Piano Literature" 7852.01; and 2 credits (7805) for a culminating recital that serves as the thesis. A minimum of 12 credits are required from Supportive Studies in Music: 3 credits in "Music Research Methods and Bibliography" 6786; 4 credits in ensemble participation (one ensemble per semester); 2 credits in "Western Art Music: Music from 1700-1870" 5648; and at least 3 credits of electives chosen from musicology, music theory, music education, or conducting.

For piano majors the performance of one major recital is required. This recital is considered the thesis. The recital must be presented no later than the twelveth week of the final semester. The Master's Examination Committee is expected to attend this recital. After approval of the recital, a one-hour oral examination will be conducted by the three-member Master's Examination Committee comprising two members from the major area and one member from outside the major.

## **M.M. in String Performance**

The **Master of Music in String Performance** degree program provides intensive instruction in performance and appropriate exposure to related literature and research techniques. The degree is appropriate for those preparing for careers in performance and/or higher education. The program is also appropriate for those planning to pursue the doctorate in performance. The student is accepted into the program based on an audition on a primary string instrument: violin, viola, cello, or string bass; and continues in the program with that instrument as their "major" instrument. In conformity with the 30 credit hour minimum of most M.M. programs, the major comprises 18 credits: 12 credits in one-on-one string lessons 7802.31-7802.34; 4 credits in "String Literature" 7852.03; and 2 credits (7805) for a culminating recital that serves as the thesis. A minimum of 12 credits are required from Supportive Studies in Music: 3 credits in "Music Research Methods and Bibliography" 6786; 4 credits in ensemble participation (one registration per semester in Symphony Orchestra); 3 credits in String Pedagogy 7810.3; and at least 2 credits of electives chosen from musicology, music theory, music education, or conducting.

For string majors the performance of one major recital is required. This recital is considered the thesis. The recital must be presented no later than the twelveth week of the final semester. The Master's Examination Committee is expected to attend this recital. After approval of the recital, a one-hour oral examination will be conducted by the three-member Master's Examination Committee comprising two members from the major area and one member from outside the major.

# M.M. in Voice Performance

The **Master of Music in Voice Performance** degree program provides intensive instruction in performance and appropriate exposure to related literature and research techniques. The degree is appropriate for those preparing for careers in performance and/or higher education. The program is also appropriate for those planning to pursue the doctorate in performance. The student is accepted into the program based on a vocal audition and continues in the program with voice as the "major" instrument. The curriculum requires a minimum of 32 semester credits. The major comprises 18 credits: 12 credits in one-on-one voice lessons 7802.21; 4 credits in "Voice Literature" 5652, 5655, or 7852.02; and 2 credits (7805) for a culminating recital that serves as the thesis.

A minimum of 14 credits are required from Supportive Studies in Music: 3 credits in "Music Research Methods and Bibliography" 6786; 4 credits in ensemble participation (one registration per semester); 3 credits in "Structure and Function of the Singing Voice" 7715; 2 credits in "Graduate Voice Diction and Repertoire Coaching" 6812; and 2 credits in "Intro to Operatic Stage Techniques" 6710.

For voice majors the performance of one major recital is required. This recital is considered the thesis. The recital must be presented no later than the twelveth week of the final semester. The Master's Examination Committee is expected to attend this recital. After approval of the recital, a one-hour oral examination will be conducted by the three-member Master's Examination Committee comprising two members from the major area and one member from outside the major.

Conservatory-style teaching and the varied research specializations of the voice faculty provide a tremendous strength to the students in the M.M. Voice Performance program.

# M.M. in Woodwind Performance

The **Master of Music in Woodwind Performance** degree program provides intensive instruction in performance and appropriate exposure to related literature and research techniques. The degree is appropriate for those preparing for careers in performance and/or higher education. The program is also appropriate for those planning to pursue the doctorate in performance. The student is accepted into the program based upon an audition on a primary instrument: flute, clarinet, oboe, saxophone, and bassoon; and continues in the program with that instrument as their "major" instrument. The curriculum requires a minimum of 34 semester credits. The major comprises 22 credits: 16 credits in one-on-one lessons 7802.41-46; 4 credits in "Woodwind Literature" 7852.04; and 2 credits (7805) for a culminating recital that serves as the thesis. A minimum of 12 credits are required from Supportive Studies in Music: 3 credits in "Music Research Methods and Bibliography" 6786; 4 credits in ensemble participation (one ensemble per semester); and at least 5 credits of electives chosen from musicology, music theory, music education, or conducting.

For woodwind majors the performance of one major recital is required. This recital is considered the thesis. The recital must be presented no later than the twelveth week of the final semester. The Master's Examination Committee is expected to attend this recital. After approval of the recital, a one-hour oral examination will be conducted by the three-member Master's Examination Committee comprising two members from the major area and one member from outside the major.

# **Master of Music**

# **Brass Performance**

Prerequisite for entrance is a baccalaureate degree in music (or equivalent) with trumpet, horn, trombone, euphonium, or tuba as the major or principal instrument. The applicant must be sufficiently prepared to begin studies at the Music 7802 level. Deficiencies may be removed by additional preparatory course work assigned by the advisor.
