SOM Graduate Programs Rationale

The mission statement of the Ohio State University School of Music as published in the *School of Music Faculty Handbook and Pattern of Administration*, under the heading "Purposes of the School of Music" states:

The Ohio State University School of Music educates students for professional careers as composers, performers, scholars, and teachers. As an integral part of a major public university with a strong commitment to teaching, research, and service, the school recognizes the relationship that binds music to other academic and artistic disciplines. The School aims to provide, at the highest level, instruction in the study and practice of music and, in so doing, to promote an awareness of music as a humanistic study. The School encourages musical research in all its dimensions by providing students and faculty opportunities for performance, creative activity, and scholarly inquiry. The School is dedicated to sustaining and advancing musical culture in the academy and in the society at large, and it endeavors to meet service obligations to various communities within and beyond the university. Recognizing the dynamic and evolving character of music in contemporary life, the School acknowledges an ongoing responsibility to evaluate its programs and procedures, and to investigate fresh approaches to the realization of its mission. In keeping with the university's broader mission, the school is committed to nurturing the best of Ohio's students, while developing and maintaining excellence and diversity by recruiting nationally and internationally.

The School of Music offers two doctoral degrees: the Doctor of Philosophy (Music Education, Music Theory, Musicology) and the Doctor of Musical Arts (Composition, Conducting, Performance); and two Master's degrees: the Master of Music and the Master of Arts. Embedded within the degrees are 24 subprograms and one Graduate Interdisciplinary Specialization. The curricula for the subprograms are not rigid and the curricular sheet for each program acts as a guidepost for degree requirements. The sheet is intended to indicate both the nature of the course work and the usual elements for fulfilling the requirements for the degree. The student's actual course work is designed to provide a well-rounded total program, including depth in the major area and breadth in supportive studies. As stated in the School of Music Graduate Handbook, each student is assigned a graduate advisor. After assignment, the student consults with the adviser, and together develops a tentative program of studies. The adviser and student are charged with the responsibility of ascertaining that all degree requirements are met. At an appropriate time an advisory committee is selected by the student and the advisor. This advisory committee oversees the master's recital, examination, and thesis, or the doctoral recitals, Candidacy Examination, and Final Oral Examination (dissertation or DMA document defense). The advisor, with the assistance of the Advisory Committee, has the right and the responsibility to determine the content of each assigned advisee's program. Coursework is chosen from 5000 level through 8000 level courses of which at least 50% must be 6000 level or higher.

For conversion to semesters, the SOM Graduate Studies Committee and graduate faculty following the SOM mission statement has retained the processes that govern graduate study and has moved forward with the principle of adhering to (in most cases) a 2/3 reduction in course offerings and requirements. Our doctoral credit hour requirements have gone from 120 total quarterly credits to 80 total semester credits. Of that, students can transfer 30 semester credits in from a master's degree from another institution.

D.M.A. degree

The Doctor of Musical Arts (D.M.A.) degree is offered in Music Composition, Conducting, and Performance. The Doctor of Musical Arts emphasizes the applied aspects of music making—creating, performing, and conducting. The purpose of the degree is to prepare superb musicians who are equipped to serve as teacher-scholars in university or professional settings. Program goals and objectives of the specific D.M.A. programs are described in the following paragraphs.

D.M.A. in Music Composition

The purpose of the D.M.A. program in Music Composition is to prepare students for successful careers as composers in a variety of settings (university research and teaching, independent commissions, film and electronic/computer media, and so on). The doctoral program in music composition is cohesive and collaborative. Students meet on a weekly basis to review and criticize their own work; they also work on creative projects with other visual and performing artists throughout the College of Arts and Sciences, including the Advanced Computing Center for the Arts and Design (ACCAD), the Dance Department, and the Theatre Department. Public performances of student works will occur in each semester. Students may also participate in the annual School of Music Contemporary Music festival (which brings them in contact with a variety of visiting composers), as well as in several annual competitions, such as the composer-in-residence competition in which one student is chosen to write for the School of Music Symphony Orchestra, and to serve as the composer-in-residence with the orchestra for one year. The composition faculty represents a diverse group of stylistic and aesthetic perspectives, thereby insuring that the student is exposed to a wide range of viewpoints.

D.M.A. in Conducting

The purpose of the D.M.A. program in Conducting is to prepare students at the highest level for musical leadership in choral, wind, and orchestral ensembles. This is a highly selective program that is limited to a maximum of three students at any given time. A distinctive feature of the D.M.A. program in Conducting is that students gain experience with choral, wind, and orchestral ensembles, in addition to substantial focus in their particular area of specialization. Because of the small enrollment in this program, doctoral students in conducting have many opportunities for working with ensembles.

D.M.A. in Music Performance

The purpose of the D.M.A. program in Music Performance is to offer high-level performance training within an academic environment. Music Performance students may major on violin, viola, cello, string bass, flute, oboe, clarinet, saxophone, bassoon, trumpet, horn, trombone, tuba, percussion, voice, or piano. The music performance faculty have impressive performance experience and credentials, and are generally hired on a full-time basis to serve as teachers and mentors to their students. The presence of full-time performance faculty in the School of Music contributes to the musical-intellectual life of the university and the community. The School of Music supports numerous and diverse ensembles, including choirs, bands, orchestra, opera theatre, and chamber music ensembles. The quality, number, and variety of ensembles provide ample performing experience for D.M.A. students at Ohio State. Music performance at OSU exists in an atmosphere of scholarly inquiry that includes such areas as pedagogy, acoustics, physiology, psychology, and humanities. The work of some faculty addresses performance as an aspect of perception and cognition. The emphasis on excellent musicianship shaped by scholarly inquiry is strong at Ohio State.

Doctor of Musical Arts

Composition

The Doctor of Musical Arts in Composition program provides advanced studies for the composer and teacherscholar. The program requires a minimum of 50 semester credit hours of advanced graduate study after completion of a Master's degree in music.

The program described below is not rigid. It is intended to indicate both the nature of the course work and the usual elements for fulfilling the requirements for the DMA degree. The student's actual course work will be designed to provide a well-rounded total program, including depth in the major area and breadth in supportive studies.

The advisor, with the assistance of the DMA Advisory Committee, has the right and the responsibility to determine the content of each assigned advisee's program. At least 50% of the courses must be designated Graduate Study Only (6000-8000 level courses).
