#### **COURSE NUMBER:**

**COURSE TITLE:** Professional Pathways in the Field of Social Work

**LEVEL OF INSTRUCTION:** Undergraduate

**CREDIT HOURS:** 1 credit, 1 hour of class per week

**REQUIRED TEXTBOOK:** There is no required textbook. Resource and reference materials on Social Work are available and/or on reserve in Sullivant Library, 110 Sullivant Hall, 1813 N. High Street. #### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course introduces students to the challenges and opportunities in the diverse field of Social Work and demonstrates how the profession is distinct from other helping professions. A seminar format provides an environment where students can explore and design a career path of special interest and have the opportunity to draw on the experiences of practicing professionals. The course explores the preparation for, requirements of, and professional issues in the career path of interest; examples of professional issues include: 1) ethics in client-worker relationships 2) the role of technology in social work, 3) the incursion of managed care and human service corporations. Special attention is given to undergraduate degree planning and professional pathway preparation. Emphasis will be placed on professional development.

#### **COURSE GOALS and OUTCOMES**

This seminar is designed to introduce students to career and employment options in Social Work. It will provide students the opportunity to explore a professional career path of interest. As a result of participating in the seminar, students will be prepared to outline an educational and professional career plan suited for a Social Work career.

#### **METHODS OF INSTRUCTION:**

This course is intended to be taught in a seminar format and to involve significant student participation. Credentialed guest speakers will be invited to share information about their own professional career paths and provide tips on how to achieve personal career goals and means to integrate into the professional environment.

#### COURSE EXPECTATIONS:

Students are expected to fully participate in class discussions and presentations by expressing their concerns, ideas and beliefs and carefully listening to others. Students will have the opportunity to select reference or resources materials pertinent to the written assignments.

# <u>Report and Outline Format</u>: Written papers must be typed, doubled-spaced, and contain a cover page and page numbers.

#### A minimum of 75% of the points will be required for a grade of "S"

#### **CRITERIA FOR GRADING PAPERS**

The report and outline will be evaluated using the following criteria:

- Appearance and clarity of presentation of the career topic grammar, logic, organization of information.
- Thoroughness of the student's approach to the topic.
- The paper is coherent and focuses on the selected topic.
- Accurate details and research data are provided along with appropriate references.
- Overgeneralizations are avoided.
- Appropriate bibliography is cited or references used appropriately to emphasis points. References are not used to form each sentence or paragraph.
- Original thought is used throughout the paper.
- The paper is formatted correctly as required (headings, page numbers, cover page, etc.).

#### **COLLEGE INCOMPLETE POLICY:**

An Incomplete ("I") course grade will be considered only in relation to emergency and/or hardship situations. A request for such a grade option must be discussed with and agreed to by the instructor prior to final examination week. A date for completion of the incomplete work will be established with the student. University policies governing the circumstances under which "I" grades are given and deadlines for completion will be followed.

Incomplete work must be completed by the sixth ( $6^{th}$ ) week of the quarter following the quarter in which the "I" is received, unless an "I" with an alternate grade of "E" is assigned in a course which is a prerequisite to a course the student must take or needed the next quarter. Under these circumstances, the "I" must be eliminated and all requirements completed by the second week of the next quarter.

#### ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT:
