ARABIC 608 ADVANCED TOPICS IN ARABIC

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Course Description:

Advanced discussion of Arabic morphology and syntax, with readings from both modern and classical texts from various genres.

Readings and class activities are drawn each week from three sources: i) Ryding's *Reference Grammar of Modern Standard Arabic*, ii) selected classical and modern texts, and iii) the exercises and examples in *The Connectors (Adawāt al-rab')* by al-Warraki and Hasanein.

Rationale:

The course is intended for advanced students of Arabic and is one of the last requirements for the completion of the Arabic language curriculum. Part of the content is review and reinforcement; most of it will be new material. Students will explore specific topics in grammar, syntax and stylistics that are customarily left untreated or underrepresented in most Arabic language instruction. By reviewing and going into greater depth in the treatment of grammatical topics, the course will provide students with greater understanding of how the language works and prepare them for dealing with the challenges faced by the student (and teacher) of Arabic. Although it is not a pedagogy course, the course will ensure that those who teach Arabic in the department have the necessary grammatical background to do so.

Prerequisite:

Arabic 603 or permission of instructor

Expected Learning Outcomes:

The advanced students who complete this course will acquire a deep understanding of complex issues of Arabic grammar, syntax and stylistics. They will be ready to take any level of Arabic course offered at OSU, and they will have the background to teach the language at the first and second year levels.
