Description

Continued development of language skills through reading and evaluating a variety of authentic Arabic texts and genres; writing compositions on various aspects of Arabic culture.

Rationale

This course is designed to help students develop the language skills which will prepare them to work with authentic Arabic texts at an advanced level.

Expected Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- Read a range of styles in Arabic, from formal to informal and journalistic to expository.
- With economical and intelligent use of a dictionary, understand texts of general interest.
- Carry out basic research and understand main ideas in non-technical writing.
- Use context and grammar to identify the form and deduce the meaning of unfamiliar words.
- Initiate and sustain discussion on topics of general interest.
- Be able to write essays and opinion pieces on topics you have studied.
- Read, write, and speak with increasing grammatical accuracy.
- Identify a range of important figures and ideas and cultural history.

Homework:

Homework assignments will be posted on Carmen at the end of the week for the following week. Late homework will be graded, but no credit will be received for it, unless a valid justification is provided.

Missed quizzes and exams:

A make up for missed quizzes and exams will be possible, IF the student provides a valid written justification for not attending the quiz or the exam.

Journal:

Students will submit a journal at the beginning of the week for the past week. You may talk about your activities during the week or about any other topic that you find interesting. Please be ready to talk about this in class. This should be about one page (100-150 words) and will be part of your homework grade.

Presentation:

Each student needs to choose a topic for their presentation before the end of the eighth week of class. The presentation should be related to Arabic language, literature, culture, civilization, society, or cultural institutions. Student needs the approval of the instructor for this assignment. The presentation will be conducted during the last week of classes and submitted at the end of class in written form. Students should not simply read their presentations, but may have notes to help them remember key information.

How to do Well in This Class:

Read the *Preface* **on page vii in your textbook** and follow the recommendation of the authors of the book. It is the manual that explains to you how to use the product.

Prepare for active participation in class. Practice new vocabulary aloud until you can produce it easily, listen/read texts several times until you are ready to answer questions on them, practice new grammar by using them in sentences.

Personalize the vocabulary and try to think in Arabic. Make words relevant by thinking of what you can say about yourself with them. Write extra sentences that are meaningful to you so that the vocabulary becomes yours.

Language is context. The communicative approach to language learning encourages the learner to use what they know to derive what they do not. Try to guess the meaning from the context and look for all the clues that may be helpful for you to do this.

Good learners learn from their own mistakes and those of others. When you listen to Arabic, be an active listener by listening to both what is said and how it is said. Think of how you can express what you hear in different other ways.
