Dear Brigitte,

I am writing to let you know that your Freshman seminar, Once Upon a Time: The History of Children in the Western World, has been approved by the Curriculum subcommittee. The syllabus contains wonderful readings and the scholarship component is clearly visible. They have the following recommendations for you:

- The workload is difficult to assess because the number of pages for reading assignment is not given. Please add these to the syllabus.
- No specifics are provided for take-home assignment and final exam: Please add these to the syllabus.
- There was some concern that a third of the final grade is riding on just one previous take
 home assignment- that students will need to turn in final exam (35%) when there has only
 been one take-home assignment before this. The committee is encouraging you to remove
 some of the emphasis on final grade- maybe ask students to submit final paper drafts or
 an outline for feedback before final take home assignments are due. This way you may
 reward this particular effort as part of the final grade.
- Syllabus indicates that more than 2 unexcused absences leads to a grade of 0 for the class participation component of the student's grade. Since class participation accounts for 50% of the grade, students can fail class for missing 2 classes. Class only meets once a week.
 Two unexcused absences is 20% of the class time. The committee suggests that the importance of this clause be emphasized and specify what an unexcused absence is.
