The chairs and directors of the visual and performing arts units met on November 3, 2010 with Interim Divisional Dean Mark Shanda and me to review and approve the following visual arts programs: Bachelor of Arts in Art, Bachelor of Fine Arts in Art, Minor in Art; Bachelor of Art Education, a new program Bachelor of Arts in Arts Management, and the minor in Arts Entrepreneurship; Bachelor of Science in Design in Industrial Design, Bachelor of Science in Design in Visual Communication Design, and the Minor in Design; the Bachelor of Arts in History of Art, and the Minor in History of Art.

The Arts chairs and directors reviewed the programs with the accreditation requirements for each major in mind. All four visual arts units are accredited by the National Association of Schools of Art and Design, and they will be reviewed by NASAD during 2012 – 2013 with a complete self-study and on-site visit. I have enclosed our accreditation agreement that we will be reviewed in the 2012-2013 academic year.

The tagged degree programs in the arts, including their GEC components, were first approved by CAA in May of 1991 and reaffirmed in March, June, and October in 2008 by CAA. The tagged degree programs in the arts are retaining their General Education exemptions and have converted with a one-to-one parallel of the quarter-based GEC to the semester-based GE. The GE component is an integral part of the arts programs; the GE component is threaded throughout the advising sheets or four year plans for each individual tagged degree. Unlike a traditional untagged B.A. or B.S. degree, the tagged arts degrees consider no part of the GE ancillary to its program. As such, the GE requirements are included within the degree total for each undergraduate major. There is no one common GE for all arts programs; each program has a different formulation. Please keep this in mind as your subcommittees review the multiple programs from the tagged degrees in the arts.

The eight chairs and directors enthusiastically endorsed the programs, and I have included a cover letter for each individual unit. Therefore, I am submitting for approval the proposals for the semester versions of our undergraduate visual arts tagged and untagged degrees. Dear Sarah,

I am in receipt of your email of January 13, 2010, and we are following up with revised dates the accrediting body will accept. The new date of postponement to 2012-2013 will affect the accredited units at The Ohio State University: the Departments of Art, Art Education, Design, and History of Art, which are accredited by NASAD; the Department of Dance, which is accredited by NASD; the Department of Theatre, which is accredited by NAST; and the School of Music, which is accredited by NASM. As we discussed, 17 Ohio universities are making the conversion from quarters to semesters with an implementation date of August 2012.

We are requesting a postponement until 2012-2013 of our accrediting self-studies and site visits for Art, Art Education, Design, History of Art, Dance, and Theatre. While we originally determined that self-studies and site visits will be more productive and will provide us with the most valuable feedback after we have been through a Fall and Spring Semester cycle, we will meet your deadline of 2012-2013 for self-study and site visit. The School of Music has recently undergone a self-study report and site visit, and therefore will submit the semester version of the quarter programs as we discussed: the documents presented to OSU curricular bodies and the addendum that addresses any changes from within the categories in the table of contents of the NASM handbook.

Thank you for working with us as we take on the exciting process of delivering our undergraduate and graduate programs on the semester calendar. Please let me know if you find the proposed time frame acceptable for the accrediting agencies.

Dear Larry,

We are submitting the semester versions of the Department of History of Art's undergraduate programs: Bachelor of Art in History of Art and the Minor in History of Art. The semester degree proposals were reviewed and approved by the Department of History of Art, reviewed by me at various stages, and reviewed by the chairs and directors in the arts units with Divisional Dean Mark Shanda. Since the Department of History of Art is one of four units that make up the National Association of Schools of Art and Design accreditation, the chairs and directors of the visual arts units from the arts functioned as a NASAD standard and curricular review body. They unanimously approved the programs at their November 3, 2010 meeting.

Bachelor of Art: The BA in History of Art was approved by CAA in May of 1991 with the group of accredited degrees from the arts, and revisions were last made and approved by CAA on October 8, 2008. The quarter-based degree was 181 credit hours with 60 credit hours in the major program (twelve 5-credit hour courses) and its semester-based version is 121 credit hours with 39 credit hours in the major program (thirteen 3-credit hour courses). There were no major revisions to the program. The courses, which are non-sequenced, were translated on a one-toone course basis, there are still the same four requirements listed out as "A," "B," "C," and "D," and the six separate areas from which students make their choices in Group C remained the same. The courses that were required under quarters are required under semesters, with the addition of HA 4010, Introduction to the Methods and Theories of Art History. This course is counted in "Group B" on the semester advising sheet. The department has made an example four-year plan for students entering in Au 2011 on the quarter-system and continuing the degree on semesters. Goals 1, 2, 3, 4 on the Curricular Map correspond directly to the four goals found on the front of the PACER sheet. The courses in the Curricular Map correspond to the baskets of courses on the advising sheet. Please note that the BA in History of Art has an assessment plan on file with OAA, confirmed October 15, 2010.

Minor in History of Art: Revision to the Minor in History of Art was approved by CAA on June 2, 2010. There were no major revisions to the proposed semester-based program. The program converted from 25 quarter-credit hours (five 5-credit hour courses) to 15 semester-credit hours (five 3-credit hour courses). This one-to-one translation of courses will still require 5 courses that are available on semesters, just as they were on quarters.

The courses that are specific to all of the programs are listed under History of Art in PACER and have been advanced along with the program forms. All programs from History of Art have the approval of Arts and Humanities. As these undergraduate proposals travel from the Department of History of Art through the curricular approval process, please include these majors in a bundle with the undergraduate majors from the Departments of Art, Design, and Art Education. I. Letter from Program-Offering Unit (including Program Rationale Statement)

The Faculty of the **Department of History of Art** took the University's conversion from quarters to semesters as an opportunity to assess its curriculum and programming at all levels of instruction. Initially, individual faculty members were invited to make recommendations on the treatment (conversion; revision and/or combination/merging of two or more courses; elimination) of existing courses for which they serve as sole or primary instructors as well as to propose new courses that they would like to implement as part of the conversion process. Simultaneously, we had a series of "brain-storming" sessions during each of our faculty meetings for the 2009-2010 AY on the topic of "an art history curriculum for the 21st century." The point of departure for these discussions was a summary of existing degree programs and undergraduate and graduate curricula at several of our key peer or aspirational peer institutions (UC-Berkeley, Columbia, Michigan, Northwestern, Texas, Yale) prepared by the chair and presented to the entire faculty. We found that our existing programs and curricula, all of which had been subjected to more-or-less extensive revisions in recent years, fulfilled the needs of our undergraduate and graduate students and were in keeping with the policies and practices of the leading institutions in our discipline. Thus the decision was made to convert our degree programs (the BA degree. the undergraduate minor, the MA degree and the PhD degree) with minimal changes.

Faculty recommendations regarding individual courses were submitted to an ad hoc committee consisting of the chair of the department as well as the chairs of the Graduate Studies, Undergraduate Studies, Curriculum and Personnel Committees and the Chair of GILD (Group for the Intellectual Life of the Department). This group ruled on the individual recommendations as well as on departmental courses that did not fall under the "jurisdiction" of any particular faculty member. They also advised the chair on the leveling and numbering of courses within the semester course numbering taxonomy. These decisions were discussed with and adopted by the entire faculty at faculty meetings during the Spring 2010 quarter. The final documents relating to semester conversion were generated by the chair over the summer of 2010 and submitted to the associate dean in charge of curriculum of the Division of Arts and Humanities.

Program changes/rationales:

BA Degree

The Department of History of Art is converting our **BA program**, which we feel is strong, from quarters to semesters with minimal adjustments. The only significant change we are making is the addition of a new course requirement, **HA4010**: **An Introduction to the Methods and Theories of Art History**. This course will provide our undergraduate majors with a more indepth and focused investigation of the methods and theories of art history than they currently receive in their other coursework. Because such a course is a standard component of art history programs at our peer institutions, we feel that its implementation at OSU would also make our majors better prepared for graduate study.

The CH requirement for the BA degree will be **39**, derived from the current 60-CH requirement according to the 2/3 conversion ratio recommended by the university. All our regular undergraduate courses will carry the value of 3 CH. Except for the addition of HA4010, the individual course requirements will remain the same as they are under quarters: HA 2001: Western Art of the Ancient and Medieval Worlds; HA2002: Western Art from the Renaissance to the Present; HA2003: Asian Art *or* HA2101: Introduction to African Art and Archaeology; HA4001: Writing Seminar in History of Art; and HA4005: An Introduction to Artistic Media and Technology

or a course in studio art. In addition, students will be required to take at least one upper-level (4000- or 5000-level) course in four of the following six areas: Central/West/South Asia; China and Japan; Egypt and Africa; Ancient and Medieval; Renaissance & Baroque (including 18th Century); Modern & Contemporary (including America). Students will also have to fulfill the department's recently implement "independent writing requirement." This requires students to produce and submit for approval to the Chair of the Undergraduate Studies Committee a sustained piece of analytical writing that demonstrates their abilities to pose and resolve specific art historical and/or critical questions. This paper is normally generated as part of the student's advanced course work (i.e., at the 4000- or 5000-level).

I am confident that the proposal for semester conversion offered in these pages by the Department of History of Art reflects the current best practices of our discipline and will serve students at all levels of instruction well. I thereby respectfully request the approval of our proposal.

VI: Transition Policy

In planning and implementing its conversion from quarters to semesters for summer 2012, the Department of History of Art is committed to protecting the academic progress of its students. Students should find that the shift from quarters to semesters does not disrupt their progress towards degree if they

- 1. declare their major in accordance with the timetable for a four-year degree;
- 2. meet the university's and department's standards for course-load and progress towards degree;
- 3. work in close consultation with their academic and faculty advisors.

To ensure that conversion will not harm students' progress, the Department of History of Art will provide all its majors with effective, purposeful advising (majors will continue to be advised individually by faculty members serving on the Undergraduate Studies Committee). We will also make sure that all semester versions of required courses are offered with the necessary frequency to ensure that students are able to meet degree requirements without delay. Should a particular course not be available to a student who needs it to graduate, that student will be invited to petition the Undergraduate Studies Committee for permission to use another course as a substitute for that degree requirement.
