Rationale

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Members of the tenure track faculty of the School of Music led by eight academic area heads are responsible for crafting and delivering the curricula. Beginning in Winter Quarter, 2009, a task force began discussions and identified principles by which the conversion would take place. After comparing the semester systems used by peer institutions, the decision was made to minimize changes to OSU program goals and/or curricular requirements. Led by the Associate Director of Undergraduate Studies and the Chair of Graduate Studies, three committees, including the curriculum, graduate studies, and administrative (comprising the eight area heads), continued their deliberations. Administrative committee discussions yielded the decision to renumber the School's courses based upon the current numbering system rather than developing a new system.

For the remainder of the academic year, each area began to convert its courses to their semester equivalents. In the summer of 2010, new course information was collected to enter the School's 700 courses into the CUT spreadsheet. Also, during the summer of 2010, the Associate Director, in frequent consultation with the area heads, drafted semester programs, four-year plans, and curriculum maps. Each area vetted drafts of these documents at the annual faculty retreat in September of 2010. Simultaneously, the Chair of Graduate Studies, through consultation with area heads and the Graduate Studies Committee, revised the curricular sheets for the graduate degrees. Further modifications were made to these documents through October, and near-final drafts were properly vetted through the curriculum committee, Graduate Studies Committee, and administrative committee during that period. The full faculty approved all semester programs on October 27, 2010.

Transition Plans

In the Autumn of 2010, the School faculty began to advise its students of the approaching conversion to semesters: 1) during the annual welcome convocation, the Associate Director spoke with students about the conversion process and how it will affect them; 2) on the same day, a portion of the School's website was dedicated to the semester conversion. Documents contained therein discuss the semester numbering system, the university's commitment to students, and advice for the students as the semester change approaches. Over time, these web pages will contain more specific information providing details on program and course conversion. Furthermore, the SOM Associate Director will create a spreadsheet that will show current quarter system course numbers and titles and their semester equivalents. During the 2010-2011 school year, the Associate Director will also meet with student organizations such as the Undergraduate Music Council, to discuss the conversion process in detail, and to provide the aforementioned documentation to the students.

In the Autumn of 2011, the Associate Director will offer an extensive group advising session for all undergraduate students on the day prior to the start of classes. Soon thereafter, during "Advising Fairs," members of the SOM faculty, even those not regularly assigned advisory duties, will offer special (one-time only) individual advising sessions in preparation for the School's conversion to semesters. Furthermore, several times in each quarter of 2012, the Associate Director will offer additional undergraduate group sessions which will be advertised by email, web communication, and posted flyers. One-on-one advising sessions

with each student's regular advisor, undergraduate and graduate, will serve as follow up during the normal advising period. In determining eligibility for students enrolled in the School's minor programs, those courses taken in the quarter system will be honored using a 1:1 ratio.

It is anticipated that, for a number of upperclassmen in the School, flexibility will be required to prevent delays in the time it takes them to graduate; the School intends to use substitute courses within each student's program to alleviate this problem. Moreover, those students who have been away from campus or have fallen behind in their programs will need special guidance to access the correct course sequence and fulfill the necessary prerequisites. For example, any student midway through a sequence in Music Theory or Music History will have course options which are designed to overlap slightly with courses already taken and those yet to be taken. A specific scenario might describe a performance major who has completed Music 421 (the fourth of six quarters in theory) in the quarter system and needs to complete the sequence in the semester system by taking a seven-week course, designed to serve as a bridge between 421 and 3422, the fourth of four semesters in theory. History sequences will be handled in similar fashion; the attached four-year plans will be of great assistance to all involved in this process.

For those graduate students who matriculate under the quarter system and are transitioning into the semester system, then: 1) no student will have their progress delayed by the change to semesters, 2) any required course that has been modified will be counted in either system, and 3) if, for whatever reason, a student is unable to take a required course, then upon the recommendation of the advisor, either a substitute course will be allowed or the course will be waived by the Chair of Graduate Studies.

I would like to acknowledge the dedicated work of the Associate Director for Undergraduate Studies, Tim Leasure, and the Director of Graduate Studies, Pat Woliver; the documents shepherded by these two gentlemen throughout this time-consuming and frequently overwhelming task are monuments to their commitment, skill, and perseverance.

Undergraduate Program Rationales

Music Core Courses

In the conversion, the music theory core has dropped from 30 quarter hours to 16 semester units. This accounts for an overall drop of 4 credits relative to two-thirds of the total credits in the quarterly music theory core. In the music history core, the number of semester credits is 12, a drop from the 15 quarterly credits in this area. The drop in history credits represents an increase of 2 credits relative to two-thirds of the credits in the quarterly history core. Overall, the changes to the School's theory and history core courses are the source of a 2-credit drop in each of the School's programs relative to two-thirds of each program's quarterly credit totals.

General Education

The School has decided to continue the dual role that a number of the required music history and music education courses play in the GE categories. Music 2240 and 2241, Music History I and II, will continue to serve in the Historical Studies GE category as well as acting as the Global Studies course. Music 3351, World Music, will serve as a Culture and Ideas/Open Option GE as well as a Global Studies course. Music 2470, Introduction to Music Education, will continue as the GE Writing Level II course in the Bachelor of Music Education programs only. The Bachelor of Music in Musicology has, historically, had different GE requirements than the rest of the School's tagged programs, so under the semester program, the School is bringing the GE requirements of the Musicology program in line with the other tagged music degrees.

Bachelor of Arts in Music

The Bachelor Arts in Music (see Appendix A) has been converted with minimal changes with respect to the total number of credits in the program relative to two-thirds of the credit total in its quarterly equivalent. The quarter program consists of 181 credits, and, under the semester system, the program will consist of 121 credits. This reflects neither an increase nor a decrease relative to two-thirds of the quarterly credit total.

However, one significant curricular change was made in the program in response to concerns voiced by the School's accreditation body, the National Association of Schools of Music. NASM noted that the number of applied lesson credits required in the program was too low and, in response, the School has added two years of applied lessons to the semester program. Specifically, courses added to the Applied Study and Ensembles category are:

- Music 2201.xx – Applied Music, Principal (2 registrations/2 credits each)
- Music 3403.xx – Applied Music, Principal (2 registrations/2 credits each)

The credits for the new courses were taken from university electives.

Bachelor of Music in Composition

The Bachelor of Music in Composition has been converted with minimal changes to the total number of credits relative to the quarterly program. Under quarters, the program consists of 182 credits and, under the semester system, the program will consist of 124 credits. This reflects an increase of 3 credits relative to two–thirds of the quarterly credit total.

However, curricular changes in the program were made in response to concerns noted by the School’s accreditation body, the National Association of Schools of Music. While their concerns are with the current quarterly version of the program, the School feels it appropriate to change the semester program to reflect the proposed quarterly program revisions. Specifically, NASM was concerned by the number of composition lessons required in the major area of the program (see BM Composition curricular sheet, Appendix A, the section entitled “Music Theory & Composition”). In the semester version of the program, the School has added the following courses to the Music Theory and Composition category:

- Composition II (Music 5635)
- Senior Composition Project (Music 4679.02)
- Extended Tonality (Music 5620)

- Theory and Analysis, 20th Century (Music 5623)
- An upper-level music theory/composition elective option of 5600-level courses.

The credits for these courses were taken from the music electives category in the quarter version of this program.

The Composers Seminar course (Music 5630) is a new addition to this category as well. The course previously resided, as Music 630, in the “Ensembles” category. There are no other significant changes to the Bachelor of Music in Composition.

Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies – Performance Specialization

The Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies program has two specializations, Performance and Composition. The Performance specialization has been converted with significant changes to its curriculum. Under quarters, the Jazz Performance program consisted of 196 credits and, under the semester system, the program will consist of 135 credits (see Appendix A). This reflects a total increase of 4 credits relative to two-thirds of the quarterly credit total.

The Performance specialization has had, historically, an undervalued applied lesson requirement relative to the classical performance program (See Bachelor of Music in Performance – Orchestral Instruments curriculum sheet, Appendix A). To compensate for this somewhat in the semester program, the School has increased the number of credits in each applied course during the third year to 4 credits. This change has resulted in a net increase of 2 units relative to two-thirds of the quarterly credit amounts in this category. The School notes that, even with this increase, the program is still undervalued in this category when compared to the classical performance program.

Courses in the category entitled “Jazz Studies” are largely unchanged with respect to content. The three courses in Jazz Improvisation (Music 2209, 3210, 4510) have remained 3 credits each in the conversion as has Jazz Styles and Analysis (Music 3446). The other courses in this category, originally 3 credits each, have moved to 2 credits in the conversion. The School has modified Music Industry (Music 591) and renamed it Introduction to Music Enterprise (Music 2271). The goal of this course is introduce students to concepts from cultural, economic, media, and marketing theories as they apply to the musical experience. The School feels that the skills and knowledge developed in this course are critical to performing musicians, particularly in the current economic climate. The course has also been moved out of the Jazz Studies category and into its own category. The net effect of these changes in the Jazz Studies category is zero credits relative to the quarterly version.

All other courses in the Jazz Performance program have been converted with no changes.

Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies – Composition Specialization

The Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies – Composition specialization (see Appendix A) has been converted with minimal changes to its curriculum. Under quarters, the Jazz Composition program consists of 189 credits, and under semesters, the program will consist of

128 units. This reflects a total increase of 2 credits relative to two-thirds of the quarterly credit total.

In the category entitled “Jazz Studies”, the School has made three significant curricular changes. As occurred in Jazz Performance, Music Industry (Music 591) was removed from this category and replaced with Introduction to Music Enterprise (Music 2271) in its own category. (See rationale in Jazz Performance description above.) Jazz Improvisation 3 (Music 211), was converted to semesters as Music 4510, however, it was removed in the semester Jazz Composition program. The total time allotted overall to improvisation in the program has remained the same, one-year each for the quarterly and semester programs. Lastly, Survey of Jazz Styles (Music 446) and Modern and Contemporary Jazz Styles (Music 566) were combined into one course, Jazz Styles and Analysis (Music 3446). Several of the courses in this category remained at 3 credits in the conversion due to the amount of work involved. This offsets, somewhat, the drop in credits in the applied music and music theory categories relative to the totals in those categories in the quarterly program.

Bachelor of Music in Performance – Brass, Harp, Percussion, Strings, or Woodwinds

The School has changed the name of the Bachelor of Music in Performance – Orchestral Instrument to Bachelor of Music in Performance – Brass, Harp, Percussion, Strings, or Woodwinds (see Appendix A). It has been converted with minimal changes to the total number of credits relative to two–thirds of the quarterly program. Under quarters, the program consists of 183 credits and, under the semester system, the program will consist of 125 units. This reflects an increase of 3 credits relative to two–thirds of the quarterly credit total. The School has added two courses to this program's curriculum:

- Career Development in Music (Music 5591)
- Senior Pedagogy Project (Music 4679.05)

Both courses were added in response to fundamental realities facing the School's graduates. Music 5591 educates them in entrepreneurial opportunities in the field and provides tactics for

self-promotion and marketing. Music 4679.05 is a pedagogy project related to each student's primary instrument for use in the student's private teaching studio following graduation.

The Bachelor of Music in Performance – Piano (see Appendix A) has been converted with minimal changes. The Music, Media, and Enterprise minor requires a minimum of 22 credit hours of course work. Students are required to take courses in Music, Communication, and Business and to select at least one course from outside their major. The music minor is organized to allow for student flexibility and to balance academic and applied course work in music. Through this integrated approach a student completing the minor will emerge with an informed perspective on the field.

The minor in Music consists of 20 credit hours of course work in music. Students will have the flexibility to select coursework from musicology, music theory, ensembles, applied classes, and electives with maximum credit hours for each as follows:

Musicology: no maximum

Music Theory: no maximum

Music Ensembles: maximum of 8 credit hours applicable to the minor

Applied Classes: maximum of 8 credit hours applicable to the minor

Electives: maximum of 8 credit hours applicable to the minor
