RE: Proposed Semester Conversion for Entrepreneurship Minor

On behalf of the Fisher College of Business, we recommend approval of the proposed revision to the existing Entrepreneurship Minor to accommodate conversion to a semester-system schedule.

The Entrepreneurship Minor consists of the following elements:

- Two introductory courses in Entrepreneurship
- Three elective courses to be chosen from additional courses in Entrepreneurship as well as related courses from other university departments. The elective courses are arrayed in three content areas.

Responsibility for the Minor is vested in the Undergraduate Programs in Business Committee (UPC). Professor Rao Unnava, Associate Dean for Undergraduate Programs, chairs the UPC. The Minor is supervised by Professor Michael Camp, Executive Director of the Fisher College Center for Entrepreneurship.

The proposed Entrepreneurship Minor is a straightforward conversion from Quarters to Semesters with some additional minor elective course options as enhancements. There are no changes in required courses. The proposed Entrepreneurship Minor draws on courses approved by the various Fisher academic departments during fall 2010 and approved by the UPC, as well as on courses from other university departments.

I write on behalf of the Undergraduate Programs in Business Committee (UPC) and the Fisher College of Business Faculty to recommend the proposed revision of the existing Entrepreneurship Minor to accommodate the conversion from a quarter system to a semester system schedule.

Background

The undergraduate Entrepreneurship Minor was first introduced in 2005. It was developed to provide students in other university colleges as well as Fisher College with the opportunity to study entrepreneurship, entrepreneurs, and the entrepreneurial process.

Designed for capturing the economic value in creative ideas for commercially viable products and services, this educational program enhances a student's understanding of entrepreneurship, encourages exploration into personal career opportunities through entrepreneurial studies, and develops specific competencies in the creation, growth, and leadership of entrepreneurial enterprises. The minor requires successful completion of a minimum of 15 hours and five courses.

Rationale

The Entrepreneurship Minor is undergoing a straightforward conversion from Quarters to Semesters with all Quarter courses having Semester equivalents. There are no changes in the structure of the minor curriculum, but several additional minor elective courses have been added as enhancements to the program.

Approval

The proposed Entrepreneurship Minor draws on courses approved by the various Fisher academic departments during fall 2010, as well as on courses from other university academic departments. The Entrepreneurship Minor curriculum was reviewed by Professor Michael Camp as director of the program and approved by the UPC.
