Cover Letter and Program Rationale (Undergraduate Programs in Dance)

Process: The Department of Dance recommends for approval that the following undergraduate programs be converted from quarter to semester delivery system. During the summer of 2009, the Department met for a retreat where the switch to semesters was discussed across programs. During the academic year 2009-2010 areas within the Department met to form recommendations, programs were reviewed at both U and G levels, and an *ad hoc* semester conversion committee chaired by Professor Melanie Bales was convened. The conversion committee has met weekly to finalize the conversion from quarter to semester format, working with Associate Dean Valarie Williams. During Winter Quarter 2010, the conversion committee distributed projected curriculum plans across programs to all regular faculty for their feedback and input.

Rationale: It was decided that our BFA in Dance, which had some structural changes approved by CAA in 2006, the GEC reaffirmed in 2008, and the Minor in Dance would be retaining their basic content and program goals. At that time the faculty felt that improvements could be made in some areas through relatively minor changes that supported inter-and intra-disciplinary. We retained the requirements of the current GEC. We require 12 courses on the quarter system and we will require 12 courses on the semester system. The technique requirement of 48 quarter hours is translated to 30 semester hours. The Foundation requirement of 51 quarter hours is translated to 32 semester hours. The Contract requirement of 30 quarter hours and the Advising Colloquium of 2 quarter hours is translated to 22 semester hours with University Free Electives of 6 semester hours. It was decided that our BFA in Dance Education would be deactivated at this time. The program is being deactivated rather than terminated in the hopes that we will eventually have the faculty to support the program. No transition plan is necessary as our last dance education students graduated in June 2009.

Following the adoption of those plans, the *ad hoc* committee in consultation with the Chair is prepared to recommend the following programs for conversion at this time.

Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) in Dance Converted with minimal changes (191 total credits to 127 total units)

Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) in Dance Education Deactivated

Minor in Dance Converted with minimal changes (25 total credits to 16 total units)

Dear Department of Dance student,

As you know, The Ohio State University is moving from quarters to semesters starting in Summer 2012. This affects course sequencing, numbering, scheduling, crediting and advising within the major and in the general education curriculum.

Here in the Department of Dance we have been working since 2009 on the conversion of the curriculum and the transition plans for each class that enters 2009, 2010, and 2011. This includes the Minor in Dance, BFA, MFA, and PhD in Dance Studies.

I assure you that the Department of Dance is attending to the complexities of converting Quarter courses and credit hours to Semester courses and unit hours. We will support your time to degree, making sure there is no undue hardship as a result of the conversion. Substitutions will be applied to allow appropriate advancement through the curriculum, and any requirements that change due to the conversion will be honored in the transition.

For students who entered in 2009, you will be in your final contract year and will still be able to fulfill your requirements as many of the courses remain the same (Senior Seminar and Senior Project). Many of the courses listed under contract are a one-to-one translation.

For students who entered in 2010, you will be finished with most of your foundation course work by Autumn 2012. As you choose your contract courses you will select them from the new semester course list. Therefore we anticipate a smooth transition.

For students who enter in 2011, you will be taking the current first year of the current BFA in Dance. The following year you will move to the semester requirements. Most of the courses required during your Freshmen and Sophomore years are a one-to-one translation. Attached is a sample plan of your first two years.

Thank you in advance for your patience as we continue to deliver a quality dance program, even while attending to the infrastructure changes.
