The Department of Spanish and Portuguese has completed and submitted its proposals for the semester versions of its nine undergraduate programs:

Major Programs:

Bachelor of Arts in Spanish
Bachelor of Arts in Spanish Honors
Bachelor of Arts in Portuguese

Minor Programs:

Minor in Spanish
Minor in Spanish Honors
Minor in Spanish Business
Minor in Portuguese

Minor Interdisciplinary Programs:

Minor in Andean and Amazonian Studies
Latino Studies Minor

The Arts and Humanities Disciplinary Advisory Panel for Curriculum within the College of Arts and Sciences reviewed, provided feedback to the department, and unanimously approved the undergraduate programs during its meeting on April 13, 2011. We are now forwarding them for review at full CCI. Please note that the Spanish BA, Spanish Honors BA, and Portuguese BA have assessment plans on file with OAA, verified October 15, 2010.

With regard to the transition plans, the Department of Spanish and Portuguese has provided a GE and pre-requisite transition plan, one that provides credit for quarter courses taken on the new semester program. For the GE/pre-requisites for the minor, the department has provided a detailed listing by chapter of the book *Amistades* for how the courses Spanish 101-104 translate to Spanish 1101-1103. For the language of Portuguese, students transition through individualized instruction, and Quecha has taken the semester conversion opportunity to now apply for GE status. As Dr. Unzueta's letter states, courses under quarters will be counted under semesters in this time of transition for programs and majors and minors housed within Spanish and Portuguese.

Most specifically, I have highlighted the important changes for the programs below:

Bachelor of Arts in Spanish: The BA in Spanish was last revised and approved by CAA on August 22, 2009. The BA in Spanish is changing with minimal conversion status. There were 50 credit hours required on quarters with 24 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 33 hours required under semesters with 15 credit hours in pre-requisites. The department chose to retain its four non-transcriptable tracks/concentrations: Peninsular Literatures and Cultures (name changed to Iberian under semesters), Latin American Literatures and Cultures, Hispanic Linguistics, and Hispanic Studies. Each track/concentration shares the same pre-requisites. The quarter version included 101-104 and 250 and the “SLRPE¹” exam, and the semester version includes the same 1101-1103, and 2202.01 or 2202.51-- .01 classroom and .51 individualized or self-paced study--, and the “SLRPE” exam. Each track/concentration has the same “Orientation Courses” required under semesters as it did under quarters, (3401 (401), 3403 (403), 3450 (450), and 3404 (404), and the same individual requirements, with Iberian, Latin American, and Hispanic Linguistics having common categories: Concentration Requirement, Diversification Requirement, Senior Seminar, and Electives. Hispanic Studies concentration has specific courses that are selected from various groupings and a Senior Seminar requirement. Quarter and Semester 4-year-plans that include major coursework and GE coursework are included for comparison. As detailed in Dr. Unzueta’s letter, the department took the opportunity to “housekeep,” and it moved content from one course to another, aligned credit hours so that their courses reflect the typical 3 credit hour semester course in all of their Orientation Courses, and included writing in courses at the 3000 and 4000 levels.

Bachelor of Arts in Spanish Honors: The BA in Spanish Honors was last revised and approved by CAA on August 22, 2009. The BA in Spanish Honors is changing with minimal conversion status. There were 50 credit hours required on quarters with 24 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 33 hours required under semesters with 15 credit hours in pre-requisites. The quarter version pre-requisites included 101-104, 250, and the “SLRPE” exam, and the semester version includes the same 1101-1103, 2202, and the “SLRPE” exam. There are three tracks or concentrations under quarters, and there are three tracks or concentrations under semesters. The “Orientation Courses” are the same three honors courses required under quarters (3401H (401H), 3403H (403H), 3450H (450H)). The program retains its Senior Seminar Requirement and its “Immersion” Requirement—an approved Study Abroad or Spanish in Ohio experience. The option of *graduation with distinction* remains the same, and is in addition to the Spanish BA Honors requirements, however requirements for *graduation with distinction* are noted on the Spanish BA Honors advising sheet in semesters just as they were under quarters.

Bachelor of Arts in Portuguese: The BA in Portuguese was last revised and approved by CAA on August 9, 2009. The BA in Portuguese is changing with minimal conversion status. There were 50 credit hours required on quarters with 10-20 credit hours in pre-requisites, and its semester-based version is 30 hours required under semesters with 6-12 credit hours in pre-requisites. The two required “Orientation Courses” under quarters, 401 and 450, are required under semesters as 3401 and 3450. The requirements of 2 courses at the upper division in “Advanced Language and Linguistics” and 4 courses at the upper division in “Literature and Culture,” and 2 courses (6 credit hours) of “Electives” are the same in semesters as they were under quarters. The department included in its semester proposal a quarter version of courses and pre-requisite coursework for both the major and the minor and the semester equivalents for

ease in reviewing, and a four year plan under quarters and under semesters for comparison purposes.

Minor in Spanish: the Minor in Spanish was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no electronic ASC records after 2006 that indicate approval. The minor is changing with minimal conversion. There were 20 credit hours required on the quarter version, and there are 15 credit hours required under the semester version. The requirement of the “Orientation Courses” is the same: Spanish 3401 (401), 3403 (403), and 3450 (450), plus the selection of two courses from a list of categories: Iberian Literatures and Cultures (changed from Peninsular), Latin American Literatures and Cultures, Hispanic Linguistics, and Electives. The pre-requisites for the minor were 20 credit hours under quarters and are 12 under semesters, with the same proficiency through 1103 (104).

Minor in Spanish Honors: The Minor in Spanish Honors was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no electronic ASC records after 2006 that indicate approval. The minor is changing with minimal conversion. There were 22 credit hours, five courses, required on the quarter version, and there are 15 credit hours, five courses, required under the semester version. The quarter requirements translate directly to the semester requirements of Spanish 3401H (401H), 3403H (403H), and 3450H (450H), plus the selection of two courses, one of which *must* carry the “H” status, from a selected list of categories: Iberian Literatures and Cultures (changed from Peninsular), Latin American Literatures and Cultures, Hispanic Linguistics, and Additional Course Options. The pre-requisites for the minor were 0-24 credit hours under quarters and are 0-15 under semesters, with the same proficiency through 1103 (104) and one additional course.

Minor in Portuguese: The Minor in Portuguese was last revised and approved by CAA on October 7, 2009. The minor is changing with minimal conversion. There were four courses required on the quarter version for a total of 20 credit hours, and there are four courses required on the semester version for a total of 12 credit hours. The choice from among the four courses is the same: one course from Portuguese 3401 (401), 3402 (402), or 3403 (403); 3450 (450); one course from Advanced Portuguese Language and Linguistics; and one course from Portuguese Literature and Culture. The pre-requisites for the minor were 10-20 credit hours under quarters and are 6-12 under semesters, with proficiency through the equivalent of 1103 (104).

Minor in Spanish Business: The Minor in Spanish Business was last revised and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no electronic ASC records after 2006 that indicate approval. The minor is changing with minimal conversion. There were 23 credit hours, five courses, required on the quarter version, and there are 15 credit hours, five courses, required under the semester version. The exact same five courses taught and required under quarters are required and taught under semesters: 3401(401), 3403, (403), 3406 (406), 2506 (506), and 4606 (606). The pre-requisites for the minor were 20 credit hours under quarters and are 12 under semesters, with proficiency through 1103 (104).

Minor in Andean and Amazonian Studies: The Minor in Andean and Amazonian Studies was approved by CAA on March 3, 2010. The minor is changing with minimal conversion. There were 25 credit hours beyond the 10 hours of pre-requisite credits under quarters and there are 15 credit hours beyond the 6 hours of pre-requisite credits under semesters. Students still take the same two required courses, choose 2 courses from a selected list of core courses, and are allowed 1 course from an electives category. The same two Required Courses are required under semesters as they were under quarters: History 2111 (368.02) and Spanish 2332 (332). The

same Core Courses listings are available under semesters as they were under quarters, and the Electives listings include new courses from History. Please note that previously this minor was housed in ASC Interdisciplinary Programs Office, and with the re-structuring in Arts and Sciences has moved to be administratively housed in the Department of Spanish and Portuguese. Due to a glitch in the computer program, PACER, we were unable to upload the program as “old” and instead we had to list it as “new.” The Credit Hour Explanation Chart only lists the number of credit hours required for the minor because the minor program includes courses from multiple units, and there is no one “unit” from which the minor draws.

Minor in Latino Studies: The Minor in Latino Studies was last revised and approved by CAA on January 21, 2009. The minor is changing with minimal conversion. There were 25 credit hours required under quarters and there are 15 required under semesters. Students choose one of three focus areas: Culture and Literature, History, or Social Issues, just as they did under quarters. The same core course Comp Studies 2322 (242)/Spanish 2242 (now cross-listed with Spanish) is required of all three focus areas. Several new courses have been added to the student choices for all three focus areas. Please note that previously this minor was housed in ASC Interdisciplinary Programs Office, and with the re-structuring in Arts and Sciences has moved to be administratively housed in the Department of Spanish and Portuguese. Due to a glitch in the computer program, PACER, we were unable to upload the program as “old” and instead we had to list it as “new.” The Credit Hour Explanation Chart only lists the number of credit hours required for the minor because the minor program includes courses from multiple units, and there is no one “unit” from which the minor draws.

We are sending these undergraduate major programs forward for review and approval in the next stage of curricular review at the Arts and Sciences Committee on Curriculum and Instruction and the Arts and Sciences Honors Committee on Curriculum. The courses that are specific to all of the programs are listed under Spanish, Portuguese, and Quecha. On behalf of the department of Spanish and Portuguese, I am pleased to submit and endorse our semester conversion plans.

While we took the opportunity to reassess our academic programs, in light of recent revisions to our undergraduate programs and regular updates to our graduate programs, we have decided to keep our programs relatively unchanged in terms of their course structure, and to follow the standard conversion of 5 to 3 credits from quarters to semesters. The programs were reviewed and the conversion plans subsequently prepared by the respective committees (Language, Undergraduate, Graduate). These plans were further discussed by the faculty in regular Departmental Council meetings, which voted to support the conversion plans.

The following lines list the different programs in the department and provide a bit more detail about the conversion:

- a) Undergraduate bachelors programs
 - Spanish major (regular)
 - Spanish Honors major
 - Portuguese major
- b) Undergraduate minors
 - Spanish minor (regular)
 - Spanish Honors minor
 - Spanish Minor for Business
 - Portuguese minor
- c) Undergraduate interdisciplinary minors
 - Latin@ Studies minor
 - Andean and Amazonian Studies Minor
- d) Graduate Programs
 - Spanish MA
 - Spanish PhD
 - Portuguese MA – proposed new program, submitted separately
 - Portuguese PhD - proposed, submitted separately
- e) Graduate interdisciplinary specialization
 - Latin@ Studies GIS

All programs were converted with minimal or minor changes. Below I outline the rationale for these changes.

Rationale for changes in the undergraduate curriculum

The Spanish and Portuguese majors underwent thorough review and changes which were approved and implemented as of Autumn 2009. In Spanish, we implemented new tracks (Hispanic Linguistics; Latin American literatures and cultures; Iberian literatures and cultures; and a more general track in Hispanic Studies). In the conversion to semesters, we have made some minor changes to adapt to update and enhance our recently revised programs. These are the changes included in the plan:

- The language programs (Spanish, Portuguese, and Quechua), in coordination with other Foreign Language departments and the GE review committee, converted the 4-quarter (@ 5 credits) GE language sequence into a 3-semester (@ 4 sem. Credits) sequence.
- Quechua will provide a GE language sequence under semesters (5501-5502-5503).
- The Portuguese major and minor have undergone a straight conversion.

Spanish:

SLRPE (Spanish Listening and Reading Proficiency Exam): No changes. Spanish majors and minors have to take Spa 2202 (250) after the GE language sequence and pass both the Listening and Reading parts of the SLRPE in order to take 3000+ (400)-level courses.

Minor changes in Spanish programs:

- We “standardized” our orientation courses (401, 403, 404, and 450, currently 4, 4, 3, and 4 credit hrs., respectively) to 3 semester hrs. (3401, 3403, 3404, and 3450, respectively), consistent with the vast majority of the rest of our courses across the curricula. More specifically, however, as students enter OSU with increasingly higher levels of Spanish language, the scope of the “orientation” courses needed some revisions and expansion to satisfy the changing interests of the students and that justify the changes in credit hours. We propose the following adjustments:
 - 3401 & 3404: Material was hastily being covered in both courses, and Hispanic linguistics professors found that core concepts were actually being covered/reviewed in the 4000-level courses. Subsequently, the 4000-level was re-numbered and re-evaluated and some material was transferred to these enhanced 3000-level courses.
 - 3403: With the major converting to concentrations, the Advanced Composition course, Spanish 603 (4603), was moved from the “Core” section of the Major program to the Electives section of the Major and deleted as a pre-requisite to the Spanish Senior Seminars in Literatures and Cultures (650 [5650] & 660 [5660]). In deleting this course as a core requirement, professors recognized the need for students to have expanded practice in writing at the 3000-level before reaching the 4000-level courses.
 - 3450: The course has been re-designed to better represent both Iberian and Latin American Literatures and Cultures, and expanded to include additional cultural expressions, such as film and music, in order to better prepare our Spanish Majors and Minors for the contents of the courses at the 4000-level.

- As 450 (3450) has always been the pre-requisite for 500 (4500) level Literatures and Cultures, and 430 (3450) for the 500 and 600 (4500 & 4600) level courses in Hispanic Linguistics, it only made sense to make them equal in credit hour assignment for the semester conversion. The current plan corrects this previous problem in our major.
- 595 and 680H changes to 4595 and 5680H to .01-.02-.03 sections: These changes now reflect the different “Concentrations” of the Spanish major. With the different “track” numbers we will be better able to track the direction of the students’ interests for different purposes, including: 1) study abroad locations, 2) estimating the number of courses in each concentration that we should offer per quarter (or semester), and 3) meeting the demand for particular Senior Seminars in each track (680H [5680.01-.02-.03], 650 [5650], 660 [5660], 630 [5630]).
- Before the change of the Major program in AU09, students needed 603 (4603) and two courses at the 500-level (4500) in order to take the Senior Seminars in Literatures and Cultures (680H, 650, 660) or 3 courses in Hispanic Linguistics at the 500 or 600 levels (4500 or 4600) to take 630 (5630). As of AU09: 650 (5650) is specific to Iberian Literatures and Cultures, and students need 2 courses at the 4500 in Iberian Concentration as pre-reqs. 660 (5660) is specific to Latin American Literatures and Cultures and students need 2 courses at the 4500 in Latin American Concentration as pre-requisites. 630 (5630) is specific to Hispanic Linguistics and Cultures and students need 430 (3430) + 2 courses at the 4500 or 4600 level in Hispanic Linguistics as pre-requisites. H680 (5680H) was for Honors students only, and only offered in topics for Iberian and Latin American Concentration.
- 595 (4595) represented study abroad courses with content appropriate for the core concentration level, but for which our department did not have an exact equivalent – our advisors found that these courses were particularly difficult to track in the DARS system for students, as they often auto-posted to the wrong category within the major program.
- These last two points highlighted the need for 680H and 595 to be divided into .01-.02-.03 categories, adding Hispanic Linguistics to the Honors Senior Seminar course concentrations, as well as an indication of the concentration toward which students were taking courses abroad.
- Finally, as part of our regular revisions and updates of the curricula, we are proposing a few new courses (4515, 4516, and 557.1).

Transition Plan

- Language programs: see attached document.
- Major and minor programs: We are not changing pre-requisites, requirements, or courses. Therefore, students should be able to transition without any difficulties from quarters to semesters.

The cultural, historical, economic, environmental, and geopolitical importance of this region of Latin America, which covers a vast expanse of South America, spreads through 9 different countries, has several climates, and encompasses a population of more than 70 million people, cannot be overstated. On the one hand, the Andes are the birthplace of some of the most advanced indigenous civilizations in the Americas, and the present location of vibrant indigenous societies and cultures. Quechua is spoken by approximately 10 million people, while Aymara is spoken by approximately 3 million. In addition, there are vibrant indigenous political movements seeking both revolutionary change and peaceful change within established democratic institutions. On the other hand, the Amazon basin covers 3,179,000 square miles which include the largest rain forest in the world, inexhaustible natural resources, an incredible biodiversity, and a multiplicity of ethnic groups who speak hundreds of native languages mostly related to the Tupi family.

The interdisciplinary minor in Andean & Amazonian Studies will fulfill the needs of students majoring in Spanish, Portuguese, History, Anthropology, Geography, International Studies, Political Science, and many other disciplines, who are interested in the region, its languages and peoples, its history and societies, its cultures and environment.

The undergraduate minor in Andean and Amazonian Studies requires completion of 10 prerequisite credit hours (see below) as well as a minimum of 25 credit hours in required, core, and elective course categories. Specifically, students are required to take History 368.02 and Spanish 332. In addition, students must take 10 credit hours from the listing of core courses, which contain a minimum of 75% content on the Andean and Amazonian region and 5 credit hours from the list of elective courses which contain a minimum of 25% content in the Andean and Amazonian region.

Prerequisites: (minimum 10 credit hours)

A minimum of 10 credit hours in Portuguese, Spanish or Quechua at the 200 level or above (not taught in English). Examples are: Portuguese 401 and 402 (10 hours), Spanish 250, 401 and 403 (12 hours), Quechua 501 and 502 (10 hours); or completion of a minor in Portuguese or Spanish. Courses taken in this category cannot be double counted for any other requirements of the minor.

The cultural, historical, economic, environmental, and geopolitical importance of this region of Latin America, which covers a vast expanse of South America, spreads through 9 different countries, has several climates, and encompasses a population of more than 70 million people, cannot be overstated. On the one hand, the Andes are the birthplace of some of the most advanced indigenous civilizations in the Americas, and the present location of vibrant indigenous societies and cultures. Quechua is spoken by approximately 10 million people, while Aymara is spoken by approximately 3 million. In addition, there are vibrant indigenous political movements seeking both revolutionary change and peaceful change within established democratic institutions. On the other hand, the Amazon basin covers 3,179,000 square miles which include the largest rain forest in the world, inexhaustible natural resources, an incredible biodiversity, and a multiplicity of ethnic groups who speak hundreds of native languages mostly related to the Tupi family.

The interdisciplinary minor in Andean & Amazonian Studies will fulfill the needs of students majoring in Spanish, Portuguese, History, Anthropology, Geography, International Studies, Political Science, and many other disciplines, who are interested in the region, its languages and peoples, its history and societies, its cultures and environment.

The undergraduate minor in Andean and Amazonian Studies requires completion of 6 prerequisite credit hours (see below) as well as a minimum of 15 credit hours in required, core, and elective course categories. Specifically, students are required to take History 2111 and Spanish 2332. In addition, students must take 6 credit hours from the listing of core courses, which contain a minimum of 75% content on the Andean and Amazonian region and 3 credit hours from the list of elective courses which contain a minimum of 25% content in the Andean and Amazonian region.

Prerequisites: (minimum 6 credit hours)

A minimum of 6 credit hours in Portuguese, Spanish or Quechua at the 3000 level or above (not taught in English). Examples are: Portuguese 3401 and 3402 (10 hours), Spanish 3401 and 3403 (6 hours), Quechua 5501 and 5502 (6 hours); or completion of a minor in Portuguese or Spanish. Courses taken in this category cannot be double counted for any other requirements of the minor.

Transition to semesters in language programs

General info: All language classes will meet Tuesday – Friday. Evening courses will meet 2x a week M/W and T/R.

The following plan is based upon our existing course materials, Carmen, and Media Manager that will be enhanced for 14 week courses.

A) Spanish Program

Regular semester courses:

1101.01 (*Amistades*, Chapters 1 – 6)

1102.01 (*Amistades*, Chapters 7 – 12)

1155 (*Amistades*, Chapters 1 – 12). This is an intensive Spanish course designed to attract students previously placed in 103.66 and 111.

1103.01 (*De paseo*/intermediate Spanish). This course is an enhanced version of current 104. We are requesting an individualized instruction version of this course, 1103.51, as part of the semester conversion package.

Transition courses (We don't believe we will need these courses for more than a year):

1102.34 (3 Sem. Credits. Current 103.01 course). This will cover current *Amistades*, Chapters 9 – 12. Will meet 2x a week for 3 hours. This course is for students who have completed 101.01, 102.01 or 102.66 and will prepare them for 1103.

1101.30 (1 Sem. Credit. *Amistades*, Chapters 5 – 6) this will be a hybrid course offered in Individualized to transition students into 1102. This is a one credit course and will be offered in the Individualized Instruction Center.

B) Portuguese Program. There are no transition courses for Portuguese 1101-1102-1103. Students may complete their coursework in the Individualized Instruction Center (1101.51, 1102.51, 1103.51).

C) Quechua Program. There are no transition courses for Quechua 5501-5502-5503. The small number of students in this program will be accommodated on an individual basis. Not currently a GEC language, however, we are requesting GE status for the semester calendar.
