Dear Professor Krissek:

The Undergraduate International Studies Program (UGISP) is home to the International Studies (IS) major (BA) with ten specializations, which are:

- 1. Africa;
- 2. East Asia;
- 3. Eastern Europe;
- 4. Latin America;
- 5. Middle East;
- 6. Western Europe;
- 7. Development;
- 8. International Relations & Diplomacy;
- 9. Security & Intelligence;
- 10. World Economy & Business.

UGISP is also the home of the Globalization major (BA).

An external review team (ERT) assessed the IS program and its ten specializations and minors at the end of 2007. While recognizing the quality of the IS major, the ERT thought that the foreign language requirement could be strengthened and that some additional in-depth, upper division rigor would improve the major's quality. In response to these suggestions, UGISP's semester conversion plan has added the requirement that majors take a minor in a foreign language and added an additional upper division required course.

The Social Sciences Disciplinary Advisory Panel (SS DAP) reviewed the specializations of the IS major and made suggestions to improve an already well thought out conversion plan. With the inclusion of these suggestions the SS DAP and I enthusiastically endorse the IS major and its ten specializations and submit them to you for CCI's review.

The Globalization major is independent of the IS major and relatively new. Nevertheless it was determined that the Globalization major should adopt the recommendations of the ERT for UGISP to strengthen the foreign language requirement by requiring a minor and add an in-depth upper division requirement. The SS DAP reviewed the Globalization Studies major and recommended some improvements to the very good conversion plan, which were accepted. The SS DAP and I then strongly endorsed the semester conversion plan for the Globalization Studies major and now submit it to CCI for its consideration.

Finally, UGISP also sponsors ten minors, nine of them related to International Studies specializations and one tied to the Globalization Major. They are:

- 1. African Studies
- 2. Development Studies
- 3. East Asian Studies
- 4. International Relations & Diplomacy
- 5. Latin American Studies
- 6. Middle East Studies
- 7. Security & Intelligence
- 8. Slavic & East European Studies
- 9. West European Studies
- 10. Globalization

These minors were reviewed by the SS DAP, which made suggestions for minor improvements to semester conversion plans. These suggestions were incorporated into the plans and SS DAP and I strongly endorse the conversion plans and submit them to CCI for its consideration.

<u>Cover letter for Quarter-to-Semester (Q to S) Proposals from the Undergraduate International</u> <u>Studies Program (UISP)</u>

This letter is intended to lay out the proposed changes to the Globalization Studies (GS) minor offered under the auspices of UISP under the Q to S conversion in 2012. This minor was initially created within UISP and was later to become a major designed by a group of arts/humanities and social science faculty members. The goal with the major was to design a program that would force students to be broadly interdisciplinary by obliging them to take arts/humanities and social science courses in equal number. For the semester conversion, the minor has been redesigned to reflect this goal to the extent possible. Specifically, students must now take two introductory courses, one offering a social science perspective on the meaning and content of globalization and the other a cultural perspective. Students then take one elective from each perspective and a third from either to complete the minor.

The addition of a second, culturally focused compulsory course is the one big change from the quarter-based globalization curriculum. A smaller change is that, after an extensive review of current course offerings across the university, new courses have been added where appropriate and some others have been dropped because they are no longer offered.

The GS minor is located in UISP for administrative and advising purposes.

Globalization Studies

This minor is 15-semester hours in length and draw on courses from teaching units across the campus. The two introductory courses are compulsory and the remaining elective courses in each specialization are chosen in consultation with an IS advisor.
