DIRECT MEASURES

- (1) The Undergraduate Teaching Committee currently administer 10-question true/false quizzes in 100-level survey courses. Under semesters, we will continue to administer such quizzes in 2000-level courses that fulfill the General Education Historical Study requirement.
- (2) Currently, a subcommittee of the Undergraduate Teaching Committee blind-reviews a selection of final papers from History 598, the senior "capstone" seminar. We will modify this practice so that two different subcommittees review final papers from the junior reading seminar and the senior research seminar.

INDIRECT MEASURES

- (1) We will continue to use the Student Evaluation of Instruction for all History courses under semesters, as well as narrative evaluations of instruction.
- (2) We will continue to use student exit surveys to assess how students graduating with degrees in History rate their academic experience in History courses.
- (3) The Undergraduate Teaching Committee will continue to monitor the grades received in the required History seminars, as well as how these grades relate to the students' cumulative GPAs.
- (4) The Undergraduate Teaching Committee will continue to monitor syllabi of all required History seminars, seeking in particular to ensure uniform standards and requirements.
- (5) The History Department's undergraduate major, like all its programs, will continue to be subject to periodic review by outside evaluators.

The History Department is pleased to submit the enclosed materials for semester conversion for the following undergraduate program plans. This letter and attached materials focus on our undergraduate offerings. A separate letter will be used for graduate offerings.

BA in History
History Minor
BA/MA in Public History

The History Department approached Semester Conversion as a not-to-be-missed opportunity to reconfigure the History Major, Minor, and GE offerings in ways that would enhance the learning opportunities of Ohio State students. We approached conversion as a chance to take stock of what we do in the classroom, to revise and rethink certain components of our curriculum, and perhaps to reshape the heart of what we do as educators. To borrow from an image painted in 2009 by Interim Executive Dean Joan Leitzel, we approached conversion as the possibility to erase and wash clean the chalkboard on which our current curriculum was written and revised over many past decades, and to draw on a clean slate a new curriculum for the 21st century. We approached this work with the understanding that it might prove true that much of the new curriculum would look very much like the old curriculum, but that we might also decide to make crucial changes at critical junctures or even to engage in substantial redesign. In either case, we were determined to move forward with pedagogical practices and designs that we collectively and consciously have chosen rather than simply inherited. At risk of sounding hyperbolic, we believed that we had the opportunity to leave a lasting imprint on higher education for generations to come. Thus, we invested an enormous collective effort in this project.

The Process

We began deliberations in Autumn 2009, when the Department engaged in an extensive online discussion/brainstorming of our teaching practices and patterns. We began with two first-principles questions. 1) What do we want our students to learn from our classes and what do students need to gain (for instance, knowledge, analytical thinking, other skills, links to employment) from history classes in the 21st century? 2) How best should we reach these goals (in terms of class size/structure, types of courses, nature of assignments, major/minor requirements, etc.)?

In Winter Quarter 2010, a Semester Conversion Task Force (SCTF)—appointed by the chair, and including representatives from multiple fields and ranks within the department, as well as representatives from our regional campus faculty—met more than ten times to discuss/analyze the findings/opinions/ideas generated by the online discussion and to formulate specific proposals for the structure of undergraduate history education under Semesters. The SCTF also conducted extensive research into the undergraduate teaching patterns of curricula of our benchmark universities. Finally, the SCTF met with undergraduate history majors to elicit their opinions—both in person and digitally—on the future of the history program. The SCTF began with a discussion of Course-level Definitions under Semesters (appended below) and then focused on the Major, Minor, Honors, and GE offerings.

The Proposals that the SCTF developed by the end of Winter Quarter were then sent to the Department's Undergraduate Teaching Committee, Honors Committee, and Chair's Advisory Committee for comment and vetting.

The Revised Proposals (for the Major, Minor, Honors, GE, and Course-level Definitions) were then brought before the Department for extended discussion and faculty vote. In three successive Department meetings in April and May of 2010, the Department discussed and amended the initial proposals. The final proposals for the new curriculum passed unanimously.

During the Summer and Autumn of 2010 and Winter of 2011, Department faculty then went to work on deciding which courses to keep under semesters, which to eliminate, which courses to move from one course level to another or otherwise reconfigure, and what new courses to add in order best to fulfill this new curriculum. The final course numbering and decisions were completed at the end of Winter Quarter 2011.

The faculty added approximately 70 new undergraduate courses in order better to reflect the teaching interests of the Department, to keep us in line with our benchmark institutions, to offer students courses that fully enhance our academic goals of helping prepare them to understand the contemporary world, and to ensure that students had access to the most interesting and cutting-edge classes. Many of these new classes come out of our work in the Department toward developing thematic (across geography and chronology) “constellations” on various topics. This thematic focus, which is increasingly common in History Departments across North America and in which direction the Department had been moving for some years,

was also suggested by the External Evaluators during the Academic Performance Review of 2009.

The faculty also redefined the course levels of another approximately 40 already existing courses. These changes in course level were based upon the decisions of faculty as to where in the new curriculum structure and course-level definitions certain courses would fit best (and could be best taught to the advantage of the students).

We utilized the recommended 3 to 2 conversion ratio. The faculty overwhelmingly agreed that with only a few exceptions (e.g. individual study, thesis writing) all of the department's undergraduate courses under semesters would be 3 semester course hours. Almost all of our current courses are 5 credit hours. Using the 3 to 2 conversion rules, only minimal changes were necessary for them.

Changes to the Curriculum

Overall Goals of Changes:

In particular the new curriculum is designed:

- to focus a greater portion of our efforts on developing “life skills”: critical and analytical thinking skills, source and document analysis, modes of analysis, historical methodologies and ways of thinking, and other vital skills such as writing, reading, and discussion and public speaking, and listening;
- to increase the time that students spend in small, seminar style-classes where they can more readily develop these skills;
- to increase the opportunities for students to carry out independent research projects;
- to offer a progression of courses across the different levels, with clearly defined skills and knowledge-building at each level (see course-level descriptions below)

These changes are very much in line with recent changes to the teaching of History that are taking place internationally at the post-secondary level and are in line with suggestions made by the external review committee during the Academic Performance Review of the History Department in spring 2009. In particular, these changes move the Department away from a focus on the mastery of data (dates and events) to a broader focus that includes an emphasis on the development of analytical and critical thinking skills, and an introduction to historical methodologies and ways of thinking. These basic principles informed our changes to:

- I. Course-Level Definitions
- II. GE course offerings,
- III. the Major
- IV. the Minor, and
- V. the addition of a new BA/MA Program in Public History.

I. Semester Course Level Definitions in History

A **1000-level History course** is an introductory survey of a broad geographical and chronological topic, such as American/U.S. history, western civilization, or world history. These courses are aimed at students with little or no background in history who desire broad introductory surveys in which the focus is on mastery of subject matter, as well as those seeking teaching certification in Integrated Social Studies. Students are introduced to broad, introductory-level narratives of history, as well as to selected primary sources or excerpts of primary sources. 1000-level courses may not be counted toward the History major or minor and do not carry GE credit.

2000-level History courses are intermediate-level courses that serve as entry-level GE courses and also constitute the building blocks of the History major and minor. A 2000-level course offers an introduction to a certain geographical or thematic field, such as early modern European history, modern U.S. history, women's history, cultural history, environmental history, the history of war, or the history of love. It may also provide an introduction to a more focused subject or theme, such as migration in modern Europe, childhood in the western world, or the history of anti-Semitism.

A 2000-level course develops the following skills:

- Students should have a firm understanding of the difference between primary and secondary sources and of the manner in which each type of source is employed in the analysis of past events. Students will also be introduced to different types of primary and secondary sources.
- They should be able to identify, discuss critically, and analyze in writing the main argument in a secondary source.
- They should be able to write a summary or review of a primary or a secondary source. (2000-level courses stress foundational, university-level writing skills.)

A **3000-level History course** offers upper-intermediate, and often more specialized, training in the geographical and thematic fields introduced at the 2000 level, as well as in-depth training in more focused subjects, such as American presidential elections, the history of medicine in Latin America, magic and witchcraft in early modern Europe, science and technology in East Asia, or Jewish communities under Muslim rule. 3000-level courses comprise the core of the History major and minor. They carry GE credit and are open to non-History majors, as well. A student must take at least one 2000-level History course before enrolling in a 3000-level History course, although this requirement may be waived with permission of the instructor.

A 3000-level course develops the following skills:

- Students should be able to identify and appraise critically different scholarly interpretations of key events and phenomena as conveyed in secondary sources.
- Students will be introduced to different historical methodologies.
- They should be able to synthesize the information and/or interpretations contained in a variety of primary sources.

- They should be able to write an analytical paper that synthesizes information contained in a number of secondary and/or primary sources. (Writing assignments will be more intellectually complex than those in 2000-level courses, and will build on writing skills developed at the 2000 level.)

The **4000-level Reading and Research History seminars** are open only to History majors and minors. They stress critical reading and writing centered on a well-defined topic in a geographical or thematic field. Students are strongly encouraged to take the reading seminar first (usually in the junior year), followed by the writing seminar (usually in the senior year).

- The reading seminar ordinarily culminates in the preparation of an extended historiographical essay or an equivalent critical analysis of different secondary and primary sources. This course trains students to evaluate critically the contributions/interpretations of a number of primary and secondary sources to the study of a particular historical subject.
- The research seminar culminates in the preparation of a substantial research paper employing both primary and secondary sources. This course trains students to conduct historical research in primary and secondary sources and to synthesize the results of that research in a substantial analytical paper.

5000-level courses are designed for both Undergraduate and Graduate Students. The History Department generally offers very few of these combined courses. As per the University definitions, these are advanced Level courses providing undergraduate credit that may be counted toward a major or field of specialization. These courses also offer foundational coursework and research providing graduate or professional credit.

II. Changes to History GE Offerings:

The GEC Historical Study requirement included 2 required courses in Historical Study (one at the 100-level and then any other History course at the 100-500 level, often taken as a chronological sequence of two courses at the 100 level). Under Semesters, the new GE Historical Study requirement will be different: 1 required course in Historical Study and the option to take a second course in History in the Culture & Ideas and Historical Study category, and the option to take up to two other History courses in the two Open Categories.

The change to the GE system University-wide, which left only one required course in historical study, made our current structure of two-quarter geographical-chronological sequences redundant. In accord with these changes to the GE and with the Semester Course-Level Definitions arrived at by the History Department, the History Department faculty are excited to introduce the following structure for GE:

- 1) Students will take their first GE course at the 2000 level, and can choose to take any 2000-level course that interests them (excluding 2797 (“Study at a Foreign Institution”), 2798 (“Study Tour”), and 2800 (“Introduction to the Discipline of History”), which will not count for GE credit). See the Course-level Definitions above for the goals and aspirations for these 2000-level GE courses.
- 2) Students who wish to take more courses for GE in the history department can choose to take those courses at either the 2000 or 3000 level.
- 3) 2000-level courses for the GE fall generally into the following two broad types: courses that are focused thematically (for e.g., the Holocaust or Global Environmental history) and courses that offer a chronological overview of a certain place, people, or process, but not as chronologically very broad as our current 100-level courses. Both types of these more focused courses will allow students to take a fuller and more attentive look at a particular topic and to do so from a variety of methodological and historiographical perspectives. In this way, students will be better introduced to the discipline of history, its methodologies, and its analytical categories and approaches.

Rationale for the Changes to GE:

- 1) The GE shift to requiring only one history course makes fulfilling chronological breadth (a primary goal of the History GEC courses) impossible. At the same time, the plan of the History Department under semesters to focus more fully on historical analysis, critical thinking and questioning, methodologies, and skills (writing, reading, discussing, etc.) reflects a broader transformation in the field of history, and allows the History Department to remain on the leading edge of pedagogical changes nationally and internationally.
- 2) There is a strong conviction among faculty members that the current 100-level survey courses were not fulfilling their mission to introduce students to the methodologies, analytical structures, critical thinking, and life skills (such as writing, analysis, etc.) that make up “historical study,” and that there were better ways to introduce students to the study of history. Rather than courses with very long chronologies (in which only a small amount of time in any course was spent looking at a particular historical moment and in which the goal was to offer a broad survey of content and mastery of data), the History faculty felt strongly that history GE courses should focus more on how historians study the past and provide students a more sophisticated and analytical basis for understanding the complexities of the past.

III. Changes to the Major:

The last significant changes to the undergraduate History Major were made in spring 1996.

Credit Hours Required: In determining the number of credit hours required for the Major under Semesters—33 credit hours, usually 11 courses—we used the standard 3 to 2 correlation and rounded down: ie, 50 quarter credit hours = 33.333 semester credit hours. While a slight decrease in credit hours was required, this is an increase in the number of courses required from 10 to 11.

Seminars. Small seminars are, we feel, the most effective setting in which to inculcate these skills. We have therefore **increased the number of seminars** required for the History major. In addition to the “**gateway**” seminar (History 2800, History 398 under quarters, which remains unchanged in goals and focus), we have introduced a **4000-level reading seminar** (roughly the equivalent of History 598.01 under quarters before 2009) stressing historiography, analysis, methodology, and interpretation; and a **4000-level senior research seminar** (roughly the equivalent of History 598.02 under quarters before 2009) stressing the conduct of research, including research in primary sources, and the preparation of a research paper. It is our hope that students will take both their Reading and their Research seminar in the same field.

We have also altered the numbering of these seminars from quarters. If under quarters, all seminars were numbered 598 (with varying themes and topics taught under that number), the new semester numbering system offers greater “truth in advertising” by dividing the Readings and Research Seminars by topic and field so that a student can be clear on what the seminar will focus on, and so that the student’s transcript includes the correct name of the theme/field discussed in the seminar.

Breadth. At the same time, there is a consensus among History Department faculty that breadth and content are essential to the History major. We have therefore retained the current **geographical and chronological requirements** for the major, namely, a balance of courses focusing on the periods before and after 1750 C.E., and on “western” and “non-western” regions of the world. Recognizing the increasing importance within the historical discipline of comparative and transnational inquiry, however, we have added the requirement of one **comparative, transnational, transregional, or global** course.

Concentration. Recognizing the importance of intellectual coherence and focus to undergraduate education, we have retained the requirement of a concentration, consisting of at least 12 semester credit hours, within the major. In addition to **traditional geographical/chronological concentrations** (e.g., modern U.S. history, medieval European history, Latin American history), however, under Semesters we will offer **thematic concentrations**; some of these (e.g., military history, women’s history) are of long standing, but others draw on the History Department’s recently-developed **thematic constellations** (colonialism; comparative empires; environment and technology; power, culture, and the state; race and ethnicity; religion; war & diplomacy). This inclusion of thematic, trans-geographical,

and cross-chronological courses is reflective of a broader shift in the study and teaching of history across the country and results from the suggestions of the report from the Academic Performance Review of 2009.

IV. Changes to the Minor:

Significant changes were last made to the undergraduate History Minor in Autumn 2008.

The principal change to the History Minor under Semesters is the elimination of the “gateway” course (History 2800 under semesters, History 398 under quarters) as a requirement, and instead to require 12 credit hours in History, with at least 6 credit hours at the 3000 level or above.

History Department faculty chose to implement this change in order to make the History Minor as accessible and appealing as possible to as broad a range of undergraduates as possible. We strongly feel that these changes will encourage students from across the university to engage with the History Department, and the benefits of minoring in History will be available to a larger portion of the student body. Students will benefit from the Department’s diverse course offerings; from the development of writing/reading/discussion skills; from the development of analytical and critical thinking skills; and from a broader understanding of the past and the ways that it affects our current world (making the students more informed citizens).

V. New BA/MA in Public History:

We have also introduced a new combined BA/MA Program in Public History. This Program has been in development for several years, and the Department sees the beginning of semesters as an appropriate time for the program to begin.

In creating a combined BA/MA degree program, the History Department hopes to accomplish several goals:

- 1) We believe that offering this combined degree will attract more high-ability students to the department because it will constitute an academically rigorous and intellectually challenging program of the sort that these students seek out. Attracting more such students is a stated goal of the History Department.
- 2) We believe the BA/MA will provide a stepping stone for some of these students to attend graduate programs of the first rank. Students applying to such programs who already have an MA degree are necessarily more competitive than if they were applying simply with a BA. Placing students in top-rated graduate programs will, in turn, enhance the reputation of the department. This, too, is a stated goal of the History Department.

3) By providing students a path to a 5th-year MA we will offer one answer to that proverbial question: “What am I going to do with a History major?!” With a History MA and a specialization in Public History, students who complete the combined degree program will find a number of interesting career options open to them when they leave OSU, including private and public school teaching (provided the state-mandated certification requirements are met); work in non-profits (such as museums, archives, libraries, and historical societies); work in private sector consultancies (such as historic preservation and salvage archaeology); and government work at the local, state and federal levels.

This combined BA/MA program in History with specialization in Public History offers a unique combination of academically rigorous and experiential training that justifies a new transcript designation. Thus although the students will graduate with a BA and MA in History, future employers and academic review boards will be signaled that they have chosen a specific interdisciplinary focus within the offerings of the History Department that makes them uniquely qualified to work in private and government fields related to Public History.

The project-based nature of the degree also clearly differentiates it from a straight MA in History, and the transcript designation should make this training and concomitant skill set obvious. Students who hope to go on to further graduate training will also be able to point to the enhanced degree program they have completed and have its special nature be transparent.

I endorse all History Department undergraduate program proposals and request approval for conversion from quarters to semesters.

TRANSITION POLICY

History BA Major

- 19. Transition policy statement that assures those students who began their degree under quarters that the transition to semesters will not delay their graduation nor disrupt progress toward a degree.**

The Department of History will ensure that students will not find their progress impeded or carry any undue burden as a result of semester conversion. Advising of students during the transition will take place individually in order to tailor the program to the needs of the individual student. Advising will be carried out by faculty, by our Undergraduate Studies Coordinator, and our Academic Program Director.

For History majors: Pre-semester requirements will continue to apply to students who matriculate under quarters, although such students will be given the option to follow the semester requirements should they wish.

Thus, students who follow the quarter requirements under semesters will be required:

- to take 10 courses in total (which is the number of 5-credit hour courses needed under quarters to reach the 50-credit-hour quarter requirement). These 10 courses might include some 5-credit hour courses from Quarters and some 3-credit hour courses from Semesters. History will count a 5-credit-hour quarter course and a 3-credit-hour semester course as equivalent for these counting purposes.
- to take History 2800 (if they have not already taken Q398). This course will be the same in content and theme under semesters as under quarters.
- to take **only one 4000-level seminar** (if they have not already taken 598). They may take **either** the Reading seminar **or** the senior Research seminar (4000-level). The 4000-level seminars will be equivalent in theme and content to those taught in Q598.
- to fulfill all other current geographic, chronological, and distribution requirements as currently required under quarters. See <http://history.osu.edu/major-requirements>
- These students will **not** be required to take a **comparative, transnational, transregional, or global** course.

- No more than 3 credit hours of History 3193 or 4193 (“Individual Studies”) may be counted towards the Major Program.
- No more than 6 credit hours of History 2797, 2798, 3797, 3798, 4797, or 4798 (“Study at a Foreign Institution” and “Study Tour”) may be counted towards the Major Program.
- No more than 9 credit hours of 4998, 4998H, 4999, and 4999H may be counted towards the Major Program.
- With the Major Advisor's approval, up to 6 credit hours of courses from other Departments may be designated as part of Category B (Breadth) requirements for the Major Program in History.

Category A: Skills Acquisition (9 credit hours)

The following three seminars (9 credit hours) are required of all History majors.

A (1) History 2800: Introduction to the Discipline of History (3 credit hours)

The “gateway” course for History majors, which emphasizes critical reading and writing, and introduces students to the methodologies, approaches, and historiographies of historical study. To declare a History major, a student must pass History 2800 with at least a “C.”

A (2) One 4000-level Reading Seminar in History (3 credit hours)

One of the following reading seminars—normally taken in the junior year, and with focus on historiography, analysis, methodology, and interpretation—is required. Note: History 4193, 4194, 4585 and 4797-4999 do not fulfill this requirement. Another 4000-level course may be added to this list with Advisor approval.

Category B: Breadth

(12 credit hours)

Overview: Students are required to develop a program that includes chronological and geographic breadth. This includes:

- (1) 2 courses (6 credit hours) focusing chronologically on the period before 1750
- (2) 2 courses (6 credit hours) focusing chronologically on the period after 1750
- (3) 2 courses (6 credit hours) focusing primarily on Asia, Africa, Latin America, and/or the Middle East, Central Asia, and South Asia
- (4) 2 courses (6 credit hours) focusing primarily on North America and/or Europe
- (5) 1 course (3 credit hours) focusing on comparative, transnational, transregional, or global history

(Note: lists of courses that fulfill each of these requirements are below)

**** Please note:**

- Students are permitted to use one course to satisfy more than one of these five areas of breadth simultaneously. For example, a course on Ancient Rome would satisfy the pre-1750 requirement and a “Europe” requirement simultaneously. That is, geographical and chronological requirements can be fulfilled by the same course.
- In addition, the two 4000-level seminars can also fulfill any of these chronological and geographic requirements. That is, A. (2) or (3) can simultaneously satisfy any of the requirements in Category B. For Example, History 4211 (Readings in Roman History) would not only satisfy the A (2) requirement of on Reading Seminar but would also satisfy one pre-1750 requirement and one “Europe” requirement.
- Courses used to satisfy Category C (Concentration) can simultaneously count towards Category B (see below under Category C for further discussion), and vice versa.
- As a result, the total of the credit hours required for each of the 5 different sub-categories of Category B “Breadth” do not add up to the 12 credit hours required in this Category. However, as a result of double counting, both within the requirements of Category B and among Categories A-C, no student will be required to take more than 12 distinct credit hours in Category B.

FOR HONORS HISTORY MAJORS:

In addition to the requirements above, Honors students are obliged to complete the following additional requirements. This is a non-transcriptable difference in the History BA program.

1. Honors History majors must take **Honors versions of all three of the seminars** described above in **Category A: Skills acquisition (9 credit hours)**. If insufficient honors seminars are offered in a given semester, an honors History major must either **(1)** take a non-honors seminar as an honors Embedded course, or **(2)** request permission from the department Honors coordinator to substitute a non-honors seminar for an honors seminar. The honors Embedded option is offered solely at the instructor's discretion.
2. Honors students are encouraged to take Honors versions of the other 24 credit hours of other courses (discussed above), whenever possible.
3. Honors students are encouraged to take more of the 4000-level Honors Readings and Research Seminars than the two required for the Major (one Readings 4000-level seminar and one Research 4000-level seminar).
4. **Advanced training in foreign languages** is important for all Honors students choosing the History Major. Every Honors student choosing the History Major should develop proficiency (meaning the ability to read newspapers, magazines, scholarly journals, and novels) in at least one foreign language.
5. **Senior honors thesis:** Honors students wishing to graduate "With Honors Research Distinction" are required to write a senior honors thesis. In preparation, they are **(1)** required to take History 3800H, "Introduction to Historical Research," before they enroll for thesis hours (History 4999H), ideally in the Autumn or Spring Semester of their Junior year; **(2)** encouraged to use the research paper prepared in the honors senior research, 4000-level seminar as the foundation for the thesis.
6. Students completing a thesis and earning a degree "With Honors Research Distinction" must complete a major program totaling at least 39 credits (9 credit hours of which may be credit for History 4999H).

THE HONORS PROGRAM IN HISTORY

PURPOSE

The History Major emphasizes the development of research and writing skills, along with the acquisition of historical knowledge. Honors students majoring in history complete both the Major and the requirements for either "Honors in the Arts and Sciences" or "With Honors Research Distinction." In order for a history major pursuing a Bachelor of Arts degree in the Colleges of Arts and Sciences to maintain status as an Honors student, he or she must prepare and follow a program of study approved by the Arts and Sciences Honors Committee. Students earning a degree with "Honors in the Arts and Sciences" complete an "honors contract" approved by the ASC Honors Committee; these contracts provide for a rigorous program of study. Students earning a degree with "Distinction in History" complete a Senior Honors Thesis under the supervision of a thesis Advisor in the Department of History. Some history majors satisfy the requirement for both designations and receive both designations on their degree.

Honors students choosing the history major will engage in a course of study designed to sharpen writing, research, and analytical skills, to develop insights into how historians do their work, and to gain substantial historical knowledge. The History Department offers honors sections of its required courses in the major program. In these courses exceptional students challenge themselves to a rigorous study program and thereby enrich their educational experience. The History Major furnishes excellent preparation for graduate-level work, for professional schools including law school, and for careers in business and public service. Students enrolling in honors courses enjoy special opportunities to study with internationally-known scholars.

Honors students seeking help with their History Major should first see Dr. Richard Ugland, 132 Dulles Hall, 247-6037. He is available to discuss the honors requirements and to help with scheduling classes. Dr. Ugland also helps plan the section on the major in the honors contract required for receiving a degree with "Honors in the Arts and Sciences" and recommends faculty Advisors to the individual student. Students who undertake a Senior Honors Thesis also will have a faculty Advisor for that project and will enroll in History 4999H, "Honors Undergraduate Research Thesis."

EXPECTATIONS

Honors students enrolled in the Colleges of Arts and Sciences work closely with counselors and members of the faculty to develop a rigorous program of study. With the approval of the Arts and Sciences Honors committee, the program of study may approach requirements flexibly so long as the program includes special rigor and intellectual challenges. Honors students majoring in history thus must work closely with the Arts and Sciences Honors Program staff to ensure completion of the requirements of the Arts and Sciences Honors Program.

Honors students are also encouraged to include History 3800H, "Introduction to Historical Research," in their major program. This course offers training in techniques of historical research; students enrolled in it engage in a substantial research project in a seminar setting.

The faculty of the history department encourage the honors student to complete the degree "with Honors Research Distinction" through the writing of a Senior Honors Thesis. Completion of a thesis is important preparation for successful performance in a professional or graduate program. Thesis completion occurs through enrollment in History 4999H, "Honors Undergraduate Research Thesis." Three credits of History 4999H may replace the Honors 4000-level Research course in the History Major. Students completing a thesis and earning a degree "with Honors Research distinction" must complete a major program totaling at least 39 credits (9 of which may be credit for History 4999H). Students planning to write a thesis should, in consultation with their thesis advisor, define a topic and devise a plan of work at least 2 semesters prior to their anticipated graduation. They may also apply for the Arts and Sciences Undergraduate Research Scholarship competition.

REQUIREMENTS: ASC Honors Tracks

There are two components to the History Honors Program. The first is the Major Program in History; the second is the ASC Honors Program. The requirements for the Major Program in History for Honors Students have been described above. This section describes the various tracks the ASC Honors Program offers, along with Department of History requirements.

In addition to the above requirements, and as established by the ASC Honors Program and the Department of History, History Honors students must choose one of the following three tracks.

A. With Honors Research Distinction

The History Department Faculty recommends that History Honors students write a Senior Honors Thesis, because completion of a thesis prepares students for graduate or professional school or professional employment. Such modifications must conform to the policies of the Arts and Sciences Honors Committee.

A History Honors student planning to graduate *with Honors Research Distinction* will:

- Devise with the History Advisor at least two semesters before graduation a prospectus for the Honors Thesis. The ASC Honors Committee must approve the prospectus. While working on the Thesis, the student will enroll in History 4999H for up to 3 credit hours per semester for a total not to exceed 9 credit hours.
- Graduate with a GPA of no less than 3.4.
- Meet the prerequisites for History 4999H: the completion of at least 18 credit hours in history, with a grade point average in the history courses of at least 3.50.
- Enroll in a History 4999H, "Honors Undergraduate Research Thesis," that meets periodically, both for peer review of progress and for the public presentation of the research results achieved in writing the thesis.

Note: Honors students who earn credit for 4999H are encouraged to take the 4000-level research seminar but are not required to do so.

B. With Honors in the Arts and Sciences

History Honors students planning to graduate *with Honors in the Arts and Sciences* will:

- Fulfill an Honors Contract.
 - The Honors contract is devised by the student in consultation with the History and ASC Honors Advisors. It should be submitted as soon as possible and no later than early in the junior year, and it must be approved by the ASC Honors Committee
- 2. Complete the Required Honors 4000-level research seminar. (Not required for students earning credit for History 4999H.) Honors students are encouraged to take more of the 4000-level Honors Readings and Research Seminars than the two required for the Major (one Readings 4000-level seminar and one Research 4000-level seminar).

3. Graduate with a GPA of no less than 3.4.

C. Honors in the Arts and Sciences with Honors Research Distinction

History Honors students planning to graduate *with Honors in the Arts and Sciences* and with *Honors Research Distinction* will fulfill all of the requirements listed in A. and B. above.

Note: Under exceptional circumstances the Department of History is willing to modify the requirements of the Honors Program in History to fit the specific needs of individual students. Such modifications must conform to the policies of the Arts and Sciences Honors Committee.
