Dear Professor Krissek:

The CCI's Arts and Humanities 2 subcommittee met on May 25, 2011, and reviewed the semester plans for the BA and minor interdisciplinary programs in Sexuality Studies, which reside in the Diversity and Identity Studies Collective at OSU (DISCO). The committee voted unanimously to forward the proposals to the full CCI for review. We did, however, request changes to the BA proposal, and it was sent back for revision. However, given the short time line, it may not have been possible to make the changes before the CCI's meeting, so I list below the changes our subcommittee recommended. The committee felt the minor needed very few changes (also listed below), so it was not sent back.

Sexuality Studies BA

- Needs a letter from D. Moddlemog.
- p. 1: The current program name should be "Sexuality Studies BA," rather than "Interdisciplinary Major in Sexuality Studies"
- pp. 1-2: Remove the assessment plan (which is not needed since the program has already been approved).
- pp. 2-3: In the program rationale delete this section (again, because this is not a new program so this section is not relevant).
- On the last page, "Transition Policy: We will apply quarter courses toward the GIS," should say "toward the major."
- On the advising sheet, 6783H should be replaced by 4998(H) and 4999(H), and 5693 should be 5193. In addition, all these courses should be included on the curriculum map.
- Also on the advising sheet, delete the Sexuality Studies major program guidelines altogether.
- Remove track changes from the curriculum map.
- On the list of courses (two places) and curriculum map there are two courses numbered 4845 but with different titles.

Sexuality Studies minor

- There are three places in the proposal where "Art Education xxxx" is referred to. These should be changed to "Art Education 4835."
- On the last page, "Transition Policy: We will apply quarter courses toward the GIS," should say "toward the minor."

The Faculty Steering Committee has completed and submitted its proposal for a semester version of its interdisciplinary programs: GIS in Sexuality Studies, Major in Sexuality Studies, and Minor in Sexuality Studies. The programs were reviewed and approved by the Arts and Humanities Disciplinary Advisory Panel for Curriculum within the College of Arts and Sciences on June 1, 2011. Please note that since these programs cross multiple units, only the first line on the PACER chart has been completed, and we have included a Book 3 Listing request for Sexuality Studies with the semester conversion proposal. The programs which were previously housed in the Office of Interdisciplinary Studies in ASC under quarters, will now be administratively housed in the Office of Diversity and Identity Studies Collective, "DISCO," and heavily contributed to by Women's Studies, Comparative Studies, Sociology, Social Work, and Art Education. The Director of DISCO, Debra Modellmog, and the Co-Director of Sexuality Studies, Professor Mollie Blackburn serve as the Co-Directors for the Sexuality Studies program and share academic advising with a full time GA and part-time staff member. Please note that the Sexuality Studies BA filed an Assessment Plan at the February 2011 CAA meeting with its full proposal.

Most specifically, I have highlighted the small changes for the programs below:

BA in Sexuality Studies: The BA in Sexuality Studies was established and approved by CAA on February 23, 2011. There were no revisions to the program, and in fact, when the major was submitted in February, the semester version was also sent forward. The proposal here is the semester version from February. The program converted from 50 quarter credit hours to 30 semester credit hours and maintained the requirement of two Core Cluster Courses: Comparative Studies/EDU PAES 2214 (214) and a choice of one required GLBT-focused course from the same list under semesters as under quarters, with one additional choice of Social Work 5501. The Focus Area Category requirement of three courses under quarters remains the same under semesters with the inclusion of a course from Art Education in the GLBT category. The Sexuality Studies Electives Category remains the same with 25 quarter credit hours translating to 15, and the requirement of 200-level course work translating to 3000-level coursework. The major, implemented for this upcoming Fall 2011 will have students who transition to semesters, and the transition plan will count any quarter course on the semester version of the proposal.

Minor in Sexuality Studies: The Minor in Sexuality Studies was established in 2002 with revisions approved by CAA on April 22, 2009. There were no major revisions to the program. The program converted from 20 quarter credit hours to 12 semester credit hours and maintained the requirement of two Central Courses. The selection lists of the Central Courses and the

Elective Courses have been modified as some courses have “gone away” in semesters and some courses have remained.

The minor typically required four courses on the quarter system, and will translate to four courses on the semester system. Quarter courses will be applied toward the minor in semesters.

Graduate Interdisciplinary Specialization in Sexuality Studies: The GIS in Sexuality Studies was established and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no records in ASC that indicate approval afterwards. There were no major revisions to the program. The program converted from 20 quarter credit hours to 12 semester credit hours and maintained the requirement that three-quarters (three of the four classes) must be taken outside the student’s home unit. The selection list of courses has been modified with the inclusion of five new semester courses. Quarter courses will be applied toward the minor in semesters.

We are sending these undergraduate programs forward for review and approval in the next stage of curricular review at the Arts and Sciences Committee on Curriculum and Instruction. The courses that are specific to all of the programs are listed under multiple Book 3 Listings. To whom it may concern,

I am writing in support of the semester conversion plan for the interdisciplinary major in Sexuality Studies as submitted by Mollie Blackburn, Coordinator of the Sexuality Studies Program. Because the major was formally approved by CAA this past February, we have only minimal revisions to make. Most of these revisions are required because of changes that departments have made to their Sexuality Studies courses under semesters. In particular, a number of these courses were changed from 500-level to 2000- or 3000-level, so we need to loosen the restrictions on using lower-level courses as electives and for the Focus area. In addition, a few of our central courses were eliminated or reconceived by departments, and others were added, so we have made those adjustments as well. Finally, we will convert our Sexuality and Violence course, which was approved concurrently with the Major, to Sexuality Studies 5620, but we cannot make that conversion until Sexuality Studies is given a Book 3 listing, which we are requesting simultaneously with our conversion plan.

Sexuality Studies is part of the Diversity and Identity Studies Collective at OSU (DISCO), which is supported by the College of Arts and Sciences and reports to Arts and Humanities Divisional Dean, Mark Shanda. I am the Director of DISCO, which is why I am writing this letter of support. Please let me know if you need additional information.

Assessment Plan: We will use the same assessment plan as we are using on quarters.

Credit Hour Requirements:

Current Minimum: 50 hours

Proposed Minimum: 30 hours

Rationale: The major in Sexuality Studies will undergo a direct conversion, with the change of one rule and the addition of three courses to our list of electives (see below). In addition, Sexuality Studies 5620 has recently been approved by the relevant curricular committees,

and will be submitted for semester conversion once we have a Book 3 listing for Sexuality Studies.

The rule change: Under the quarter system, we had a rule that stated, “No more than ten credit hours of course work at the 300-level or below may count toward the focus area, and no more than five credit hours of electives can be taken at the 200 level.” Although this would neatly translate to “No more than six credit hours of course work at the 3000-level or below may count toward the focus area, and no more than three credit hours of electives can be taken at the 2000 level,” such a neat translation is impossible to implement since some of the courses that were at the 500 level on the quarter system have been changed by their departments to 3000 and 2000 levels on the semester system. Such a translation would result in our losing at least two of our nine focus areas. Alternatively, we propose that in the semester system the rule be: “No more than 3 hours at the 2000-level can count toward the focus area, and at least 9 of the 15 hours of electives must be at the 3000-level or above.”

The additional courses are:

1. Education: Physical Activity and Educational Services 5270: Love, Sex, and Relationships (3)
2. Social Work 5501: Clinical Social Work Practice with GLBTQ Individuals, Couples, and Families (3)
3. Women’s, Gender, and Sexuality Studies 4405: Race and Sexuality (3)

Social Work 5501 was changed during the semester conversion from a graduate course to a U/G course, so it can now apply toward our Major. EDU PAES 5270 and WGSS 4405 were added by their departments during their semester conversion, and their focus makes them appropriate for the Sexuality Studies Major.

Sexuality Studies is an interdisciplinary field devoted to the analysis of human sexuality. It explores the historical, political, biological, cultural, sociological, educational, legal, health, aesthetic, and psychological contexts of human sexuality. The Sexuality Studies program at OSU pays particular attention to processes and practices of normalization in different cultures and times through which certain sexual behaviors, expressions, or identities are esteemed and others devalued. It also investigates the ways in which sexuality is shaped by other social differences such as race, gender, class, dis/ability, religion, nationality, and ethnicity.

This major requires at least 30 credit hours, six hours of which must be a core cluster consisting of Comparative Studies/PAES 2214: Introduction to Sexuality Studies and a course with a GLBTQ focus. Of the remaining 24 hours of course work, nine will constitute a focus area selected from one of nine tracks (see below) or from a topic approved by one of the Directors. The remaining 15 hours will be Sexuality Studies electives. A thesis or academic internship is highly recommended; thus, three hours of 4998, 4998H, 4999, 4999H, or 5193 can count toward the electives or toward the focus area.

No more than 3 hours at the 2000 level can count toward the focus area, and at least 9 of the 15 hours of electives must be at the 3000-level or above. Students and faculty may petition the Directors to count courses other than those listed here to fulfill the requirements of the major. To be approved, at least 50% of the course content must address human sexuality. After one of the Directors for the Sexuality Studies Major has approved the student's Major Program Form, the student must file the form with the Arts and Sciences Advising Office. For further information, contact one of the Directors listed above.

Focus Area (9 hr.; no more than 3 hr. at 2000 level)

Students choose one of nine tracks (see below) that align the Major with their academic and career interests. If none of the nine suits a student's needs, then he/she may construct an alternative track in consultation with one of the Directors. Many of the Focus Areas include more than 9 hours to show the range of courses from which a student might choose. In addition, other approved courses can be added by the Directors on a case-by-case basis. If a student is doing a thesis or internship in the focus area, then three hours of 4998, 4998H, 4999, 4999H, or 5193 can count toward it.

Sexuality Studies is an interdisciplinary field devoted to the analysis of human sexuality. It explores the historical, political, biological, cultural, sociological, educational, legal, health, aesthetic, and psychological contexts of human sexuality. The Sexuality Studies program at OSU pays particular attention to processes and practices of normalization in different cultures and times through which certain sexual behaviors, expressions, or identities are esteemed and others devalued. It also investigates the ways in which sexuality is shaped by other social differences such as race, gender, class, dis/ability, religion, nationality, and ethnicity.

This major requires at least 50 credit hours, ten hours of which must be a core cluster consisting of Comparative Studies/PAES 214: Introduction to Sexuality Studies and a course with a GLBTQ focus. Of the remaining 40 hours of course work, 15 will constitute a focus area selected from one of nine tracks (see below) or from a topic approved by one of the Directors. The remaining 25 hours will be Sexuality Studies electives. A thesis or academic internship is highly recommended; thus, five hours of 783, 693, or 489 can count toward the electives or toward the focus area.

No more than 10 credit hours of course work at the 300 level or below may count toward the focus area, and no more than five credit hours of electives can be taken at the 200 level. Students and faculty may petition the Directors to count courses other than those listed here to fulfill the requirements of the major. To be approved, at least 50% of the course content must address human sexuality. After one of the Directors for the Sexuality Studies Major has approved the student's Major Program Form, the student must file the form with the Arts and Sciences Advising Office. For further information, contact one of the Directors listed above.

Many of the Focus Areas include more than 15 hours to show the range of courses from which a student might choose. In addition, other approved courses can be added by the Directors on a case-by-case basis. If a student is doing a thesis or internship in the focus area, then five hours of 783, 693, or 489 can count toward it.
