The Curriculum Committee of the Melton Center for Jewish Studies, led by Professor Matthew Goldish, Melton Center Chair in Jewish History, has completed and submitted its proposals for the semester versions of its programs:

B.A. in Jewish Studies
Minor in Jewish Studies
Minor in Jewish Oral History--new

The programs were reviewed and unanimously approved by the Arts and Humanities Disciplinary Advisory Panel for Curriculum within the College of Arts and Sciences on June 1, 2011. Please note that since these programs cross multiple units, only the first line on the PACER chart has been completed, and also note that the Jewish Studies BA filed an Assessment Plan with OAA verified October 15, 2010.

Most specifically, I have highlighted changes for the programs below:

BA in Jewish Studies: The BA in Jewish Studies was established and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no electronic ASC or CAA records that indicate approval or revision after 2006. The program converted from 50 quarter credit hours to 30 semester credit hours and maintained its quarter requirements of four categories: Jewish Thought and Practice, 2 courses from the same selected list of four units; Hebrew Language and Literature, 2 courses beyond the 1103 pre-requisite from any Hebrew course taught in the language; Jewish History, 3 courses of the x330 series; and 3 courses from an Electives category. They are retaining the quarter-system pre-requisite of Hebrew at the 1103 (104) proficiency and the exemption for students who have also completed Yiddish 1103 (104) proficiency to only take 2 courses from the Elective Category. The transition plan will count any quarter course on the semester version of the proposal.

Minor in Jewish Studies: The Minor in Jewish Studies was established and approved by CAA previous to 2006 as there are no electronic ASC or CAA records that indicate approval or revision after 2006. There were minor revisions to the program. The program converted from 25 quarter credit hours to 15 semester credit hours and maintained the requirement of four categories, but changed one of the names of the categorical requirements: Jewish Thought and Practice (formerly Jewish Philosophy), 1 course from a selected list (the same as the BA); Hebrew or Yiddish, 2 courses from any Hebrew or Yiddish course taught *in English*; Jewish History, 1 course of the x330 series; and 1 course from a Jewish Studies Electives category. The minor required five courses on the quarter system, and will translate to five courses on the semester system. Quarter courses will be applied toward the minor in semesters.

Minor in Jewish Oral History: The Minor in Jewish Oral History is a new program that the Melton Center for Jewish Studies has created. The minor comes out of the projects in oral history that faculty and students have created together over the past two years and that were funded by private donors. The affiliated faculty with the Center, and the Chairs and Directors of English, Folklore, Near Eastern Languages and Cultures, Germanic Languages and Literatures, Philosophy, and History have all contributed courses to the minor program and provided feedback and unanimous support of the new program. This is the first program of its kind in the country that uses oral history, and the application of those methods, to the gathering of the stories of survivors of the Holocaust and the displacement of Jewish immigrants. The program is four courses, 12 credit hours, and will begin under the semester system in Summer 2012.

We are sending these undergraduate programs forward for review and approval in the next stage of curricular review at the Arts and Sciences Committee on Curriculum and Instruction. The courses that are specific to all of the programs are listed under multiple Book 3 Listings. Dear Valarie, Larry, and Committee Members,

On behalf of the faculty of the Melton Center for Jewish Studies I would like to move that the semester versions of the **major and minor in Jewish Studies and the new minor in Jewish Oral History** be approved by the Council on Academic Affairs.

Our Curriculum Committee met to discuss the major and minor in Jewish Studies and the new minor in Jewish Oral History. The committee decided that the JS major and minor were essentially fine the way they were. The only changes the committee recommended were to consider including a wider range of courses to fulfill some of the requirements (some of these courses are new in recent years), and to make minor changes in JS 201. The committee was also happy with the proposal for the new minor but left the details of its constituent courses up to Professor Shuman and me.

At the Melton Center faculty meeting on 26 May 2011 I discussed these semester conversion matters with the full board. After very brief discussion we received the board's approval of the recommendations from the committee and those working on the new minor. We also added one other small change, a request to make the Jewish Studies internship repeatable for two semesters, based on recent experience with this course.

Program Rationale:

Jewish studies were introduced at The Ohio State University in the fall of 1966 with the establishment of the Samuel and Esther Melton Chair in Jewish History and Institutions. In the fall of 1976, the Samuel M. Melton Center for Jewish Studies was established at The Ohio State University. The Jewish Studies BA program provides undergraduate majors with general knowledge of Judaism, Jewish culture and history from ancient times to the present. Given the large number of Jewish and non Jewish students on The Ohio State University campus, there is interest in learning how Judaism has contributed to our global civilization and how Judaism serves as foundation for other religious systems. The overall goal of the Jewish Studies Major is to: prepare students for careers in the rabbinate, Jewish education, Jewish communal service, and graduate careers in which training in language, culture, and history would enhance academic and professional preparation.

In preparation for the semester system, we converted from quarters with minimal changes to program goals and curricular activities. Given that our program is interdisciplinary, we reviewed the courses within the Jewish Studies Major and within the departments that provide courses for the major. We decided to add a few new courses to enhance our undergraduate research sequence and a 5000 level group studies option. Under semesters the BA in Jewish Studies will remain the same in terms of the number of courses in the major as it was under quarters.

Students enrolling in the Jewish Studies Major will take courses in four content areas: Jewish Thought and Practice, Hebrew Language and Literature, Jewish History, and Electives in Jewish Studies. Three semesters of Hebrew are required prior to admission to the major. Thirty semester credits are required to complete the program.

Requirements for Jewish Studies Major

Undergraduate students can develop a comprehensive and well-rounded interdisciplinary major in Jewish Studies. This 50-hour major calls for:

Four quarters of Hebrew language (101-104) or its equivalent as the basis upon which the major program rests. In addition, the following are required:

A. Jewish Thought and Practice.

Two courses chosen from Jewish Studies 201, Philosophy 321, Philosophy 323, Philosophy 521, Hebrew 376, or CMRS/Hebrew 216 10 hours

B. Hebrew Language and Literature

Two courses beyond the 104 level in the original language.

C. Jewish History

Two of these must be chosen from History 330.01, 330.02 and 530.02. At least one course must be taken at the 500 level or above. 15 hours

D. Jewish Study Electives

Courses must be at the 200 level or above, with at least 10 hours at the 400 level or above. Jewish Studies 489 (Jewish Internship) may be applied toward the elective requirement. (Students who have completed Yiddish 101-104 need only complete 10 elective hours, 5 of which must be at the 400 level or above). 15 hours

Transition Plan for Jewish Studies Majors
Melton Center for Jewish Studies

The Jewish Studies Program is committed to enabling students to complete the major begun under the quarter system without delay or disruption to their current program plan of study.

The Program has established general principles that assist students in the major through the transition:

1. The Program Director, Jewish Studies will consider the needs of the student in relationship to program requirements. The proposed major has the same number of courses in semesters as in quarters. Courses that were available to the student in quarters are available to the student in semesters.
2. The semester program has not added any new requirements for the major.
3. In the event that there is a conflict with required courses or a course is not offered, the program director will work with the individual student to find a suitable course replacement, group study option, or independent study project which meets the intent of the major requirements.
4. Students currently enrolled in the major will receive a document listing new course numbers.
5. Given that the major requirements have not substantially changed from the requirements in the quarter system, there should be few if any issues regarding the transition. In cases where a course offered by units outside Jewish Studies is not available, a suitable substitute course meeting the intent of the original quarter course will be used. If a course is not available, an individualized study experience will be designed for the student. The Program Director in consultation with Jewish Studies faculty in allied units will determine alternative courses or independent study experiences.
