BSBA-BS Dual Degree Program Rationale

The Fisher BSBA and Arts and Sciences BS dual degree program had its inception in the late 1970's with an articulated program leading to the BSBA in International Business and the BA in German. Over the next several years following, the program was expanded to include all languages, then further expanded to include all Arts and Sciences programs leading to the BA, BS, or BA in Journalism (but not tagged degrees other than Journalism).

The dual degree option permits students to combine a liberal arts degree with a major in a traditional arts and sciences discipline and a general business degree which includes depth in one or more business specializations. Usually these are complementary programs, such as Economics or mathematical sciences and Finance, or a pre-professional major with a business specialization. The disciplines can also be as disparate as a student's interests (a recent graduate completed degrees in Physics and Accounting, for example).

The dual degree program consists of several elements. General Education requirements (which have significant similarities for the BSBA and the BS) are articulated between the two programs, with both programs following the GE requirement for the program having the more extensive and/or more highly specified requirement. For example, while BS students are required to take Math 152 (1151 under semesters) to satisfy the Math and Logical Analysis requirement within the Quantitative and Logical Skills category, Business students are required to take Math 132 (1131) or 152 (1151 under semesters), so both degree programs specify Math 152 (1151 under semesters) for that requirement in the articulated GE. Similarly, Business students are not required to take foreign language (except for International Business), but Arts and Sciences BS students are, so a dual degree student takes a foreign language irrespective of the specialization in Business.

In addition to the articulated General Education requirements, dual degree students are required to complete all courses for the Arts and Sciences major not covered by General Education and all Business core and specialization courses for the BSBA not covered by General Education.

Under quarters, the total minimum number of hours required for the dual degree program is 216. This is 30 hours beyond the degree with the highest number of total hours required (Business requires 186; 186+30= 216). This compares to the 45 minimum hours required for a second baccalaureate when completed after a first baccalaureate where no dual degree arrangement exists, so BSBA-BS students have at minimum one quarter of coursework economy as a result of the dual degree arrangement. With early identification and good academic planning, both degrees can currently be completed in a little over four years. Degrees are generally awarded concurrently, but can be awarded consecutively if preferred by the student.

Currently, over 200 students are enrolled in the Arts & Sciences/Business dual degree program (both BA & BS) with about 40 students graduating each year. The substantial majority of these are BA students, but there are a few students pursuing the BSBA and the BS.

Conversion to semesters is quite straightforward. Dual degree students will still complete the Arts and Sciences major requirements and the Business core and specialization requirements in addition to completing a revised set of General Education requirements that articulates the new GE requirements for the two degree programs. Total number of hours required for the dual degree will be 141 semester hours (121 +20). With early identification and good planning, students should still be able to complete both degrees with one additional semester or two summers.

Transition Plan for BSBA BS

Transition policies for the BSBA/BS essentially follow the underlying programs. Because there are so many possible plan combinations (13 Business Specializations and 18 Arts & Sciences Majors), historically, students have developed individualized program plans in consultation with Business and Arts & Sciences academic advisors and their major advisor. This process will continue under semesters. Transition students will need to work carefully with their advisors following the transition plans of the underlying individual degree programs.
