Quarter-to-Semester (Q2S) Conversion for the College of Public Health (CPH)

CPH Quarter-Based CPH Degrees and Specializations

The College of Public Health (CPH) currently offers a 20 quarter credit hour undergraduate minor in *Public Health*. A proposal was submitted January 18, 2011 requesting a name change to *Global Public Health* and was approved by the Council on Academic Affairs February 1, 2012.

CPH Q2S Conversion: Process

To initiate the process within the college, a CPH Q2S Committee was formed in December 2009 consisting of division chairs and faculty members representing each degree and program specialization plus representation from the CPH Academic Affairs Office of Academic Programs. The committee was chaired by the Senior Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. The committee's major roles were to interpret information conveyed by the OSU Office of Academic Affairs (OAA) and establish the related parameters and work plan for converting the courses and programs at the CPH division-levels. Course and program conversions were drafted, reviewed, revised, finalized and approved by the respective divisions. All course and program information submitted from the five divisions was reviewed and approved by the CPH Graduate Studies Committee and the Senior Associate Dean for Academic Affairs.

CPH Q2S Conversion: Undergraduate Courses

- Course Titles and Descriptions: Some of the titles and descriptions of the existing courses were changed to better reflect the content without deviating from the original course learning objectives.
- Course Codes: The course numbers were changed to comply with the new OSU 4-digit format and categories of levels. Seven-letter alpha codes will precede each number. Refer to the table summary below:

• Course Learning Objectives: Due to the recent (2009-10) CEPH and CAHME reaccreditation reviews and full-term approvals, relatively minor modifications were made to the quarter-based curricula, core and specialized goals (competencies), aligned course learning objectives, and assessment plan and process. Indeed, these are completely reflected within the converted semester-based program and specializations.

Credit Hour Conversion Factor: A 0.667 factor with rounding was used to convert from quarter-to-semester credits for approximately 100% of the existing quarter-based didactic courses within the college. For example, quarter-based lecture courses that are 4 quarter credit hours and 40 contact hours were converted to 3 semester credit hours and 45 contact hours. Refer to the table summary below:

CPH Q2S Conversion: Degrees and Program Specializations

- The title change of our undergraduate minor in Public Health to Global Public Health was approved by CAA on February 1, 2012. The change is appropriate because it better reflects the curricular content and what students are learning.
- The required 20 quarter credit hours (5 courses x 4 qtr. cr.) will be 15 semester credit hours (5 courses x 3 sem. cr.). Minimal changes were needed to the curriculum since the current topics within and content of the existing courses address domestic and international public health, thus collectively global public health, issues. However, some lecture modifications and focused assignments within courses were implemented.
- The undergraduate minor is in alignment with OSU's goal to increase internationalization of curricula and has been reviewed by the Office of International Affairs during Autumn 2010 when the College of Public Health participated in a pilot project.

CPH Q2S Conversion: Transition Plan

- The transition from a quarter-based to semester-based curriculum will be relatively straightforward for all the degrees and specializations. The courses and curriculum for the minor remain the same, only the credit hours differ (4 qtr. cr./course now 3 sem. cr./course; see below). Accordingly, the transition from quarter- to semester-based courses for the minor is essentially seamless.

UNDERGRADUATE MINOR IN GLOBAL PUBLIC HEALTH

Public health is an exciting field that concentrates on assuring and improving population health, and protecting against threats to health. Public health covers a broad range of disciplines and issues, including such topics as environmental pollution, access to health insurance, avian influenza, bioterrorism, and obesity. The minor can serve as a precursor to further study in public health, other health professions, or any fields in which the health of persons and populations is a relevant concern. In addition, public health is of interest for its own sake, as a component of a rigorous liberal arts education.

Requirements

The minor in public health requires 20 hours of course work plus one prerequisite course in statistics of four or more hours. The courses may be taken in any order. All courses in the minor are also available as electives to any interested undergraduate.

Prerequisite (minimum of 4 credit hours)

One introductory course in statistics (Statistics 135, 145, or equivalent) must be taken before or concurrent with the required course in epidemiology. No other prerequisites are required for the minor or for any of the required courses in public health.

Required courses (16 credit hours)

PUBHLTH 400 Introduction to Public Health (4 hrs. Autumn, Spring)
PUBHEPI 510 Introduction to Epidemiology (4 hrs. Autumn, Winter)

Any two of the following three courses (the other may be used as an elective):
PUBHEHS 530 Current Issues in Environmental Health (4 hrs. Winter)
PUBHHBP 520 The Role of Behavior in Public Health (4 hrs. Spring)
PUBHHMP 550 Health Care in America (4 hrs., Autumn, Spring)

Electives (minimum of 4 credit hours)

Any letter-graded course in the College of Public Health available for undergraduate credit is acceptable as an elective (i.e., courses graded pass/fail or S/U are not eligible). Courses from outside the College of Public Health that have a focus on analytic methods or issues related to population health may also be approved as electives. A list of courses already approved for this purpose is provided on the reverse of this page, and others will be added as they are approved.

Students or academic units may propose additional courses for inclusion in the minor. These will be reviewed by the Office of Academic Programs in the College of Public Health and approved as appropriate. Courses used as electives in the public health minor may not also be part of the student's major.

Overview

The 15 semester credit hour undergraduate minor in Global Public Health focuses on health issues affecting populations in the US and low-to middle-economic status countries worldwide. Students complete courses that provide content relative to presenting and discussing the type and scope of public health issues, factors that contribute to existing and emerging issues, applicable approaches to address and intervene. The program will augment and enhance many different undergraduate bachelor degree programs expands learners' knowledge and comprehension of issues affecting humans domestically internationally.

Competencies

Upon successful completion of the undergraduate minor in *Global Public Health*, students will be better prepared to:

- Compare and contrast examples of major domestic and international public health issues
- Discuss various global approaches/strategies for identification, response and intervention to address and attempt to resolve common public health issues
- Identify political, cultural, behavioral and socioeconomic factors related to global public health issues
- Work effectively in international settings

- Comprehend the international dimension of one's field of study.

Requirements

The minor in *Global Public Health* requires a minimum of 15 semester credit hours of courses plus one prerequisite course in statistics.

Prerequisite (minimum 3 semester credit hours):

One introductory course in statistics (STAT 1350 or 1450 or equivalent) must be taken before or concurrent with the required course in epidemiology.

PUBHLTH 2000 Intro to Global Public Health (3) PUBHEPI 2410 Introduction to Epidemiology (3)

Any two of the following three courses

(the other may be used as an elective): PUBHEHS 3310 Current Issues in Global Environmental Health (3)

PUBHHBP 3510 The Role of Behavior in Public Health (3)

PUBHHMP 4650 Health Care in America (3)

Electives (minimum 3 semester credit hours)

Elective courses must be letter-graded (i.e., courses graded pass/fail or S/U are not eligible). Courses in the College of Public Health available for undergraduate credit are acceptable as an elective course or courses from outside the College of Public Health that include focus on issues related to population health with global or international emphasis may also be approved as electives. Students or academic units may propose additional courses as electives for consideration. These will be reviewed by the Office of Academic Programs and Student Services in the College of Public Health and approved as appropriate. Courses used as electives in the public health minor must not also be part of the student's major.
