Proposal: Study Course in Trim, Ireland

1. Overview

The proposed course would provide an in-depth experience of the world of medieval Ireland, beginning with a classroom-based orientation in Columbus and continuing with hands-on and on-site experiences in Ireland. The course will cover the following broad academic areas:

- **a. Medieval History** (focusing specifically on the early history of Ireland and the role of the founding Vikings)
- b. Medieval Religion (including both Viking religion and the role of Christianity) c. Archaeology & Anthropology (incorporating both traditional structure-based archaeology and bioarchaeology, as the site to be visited includes both architectural and human remains.

2. Proposed Student Audience

The proposed course will be of interest to History majors, Medieval & Renaissance Studies majors, and Anthropology majors. A preliminary meeting to discuss the possibilities of such a course attracted students from each of these majors! Over 30 students have expressed serious interest in enrolling in the course. History is willing to let the course run with as few as 6 students, and the directors of the Field School in Trim suggest 20 as an ideal number. I will offer a second, more detailed information session if the course is approved, at the beginning of Spring Semester 2013. I will also produce posters for distribution to History, Medieval & Renaissance Studies, Anthropology, and other departments and programs with medieval components such as English and Religious Studies.

3. Academic Credit

Students would receive 3 academic credits toward their major in History or Medieval & Renaissance Studies. The course would eventually be assigned a number (History 3798 or 4798) and the application of credits should be seamless. I would expect departments beyond History to accept the credits as they would for any history course offered at OSU.

4. Host Institution (source: iafs.ie)

The Irish Archaeology Field School (IAFS) is Ireland's leading provider of university accredited, site-based archaeological research and training. The ethos of the school is to provide an opportunity for students and enthusiasts of archaeology and anthropology to experience at first hand the excitement of archaeological excavation in a teaching environment. Excavations are undertaken within an established research framework led by a team of highly qualified and experienced archaeologists. They carry out archaeological research excavation, with a strong teaching component, to allow students and visitors a first hand and unique experience of discovering the past. Students of the school will undertake all aspects of an archaeological excavation and discovery at the site and contribute to the community project. The IAFS provides direct assistance with all local arrangements, including housing, transportation, food, and excursions.

5. Health, Welfare & Safety

I anticipate no problems with issues of health (the dead people we may contact are long dead...), and Trim and Ireland are generally safe and welcoming to Americans. We will be in both urban and rural areas.

Program

This is an intensive Maymester course designed to offer students the opportunity to experience first-hand the history of medieval Ireland. The program begins in Columbus with an intensive classroom-based introduction to the history of medieval Dublin, with a special focus on the religious landscape of the area and an introduction to the field of bioarchaeology. Students will then travel to Trim, Ireland for a first-hand experience of discovering the past. The group will spend three weeks participating actively in an archaeological excavation of a medieval monastery and cemetery: the Black Friary. In Trim, students will be trained in excavation methods by a team of professional archaeologists from the Irish Archaeology Field School. Students will also participate in group field trips to Dublin (with a special focus on Viking Dublin) and the surrounding area, and have the opportunity to explore on their own.

Location

The Black Friary is located in the town of Trim, County Meath, Ireland. This is a small town approximately 40 minutes from the city of Dublin. Trim retains much of its medieval street pattern, with buildings of archaeological and historical importance including the surviving elements of the original medieval town wall, church buildings dating from the thirteenth century. The town is dominated by Trim Castle, the largest Anglo-Norman castle in Ireland. Trim is also a vibrant market town with shops, cafes, and walking trails.

Course Credit

The Discovering Medieval Dublin program will offer 3 semester hours of Ohio State credit though the History Department.

Accommodations

Students will be responsible for organizing their own housing in Columbus prior to departure for Ireland. In Ireland, students will live in group houses with common kitchen facilities in the town of Trim. Students and instructors will prepare and share group meals. Students should plan to bring approximately \$200 for food.

Application Information

Applicants must submit the Office of International Affairs Study Abroad via Buckeyelink. Please note that upon application, a \$150 application feel will be assessed to your Statement of Account. The application feel will be refunded only if you are not accepted or submit a written request to withdraw your application prior to the application date. The application will require students to submit a personal statement. The deadline for application is 1 February 2013.
