Course Description:

This course offers a survey of lyric diction to acquaint future singers and teachers with basic concepts and skills for the English, German, French, Latin, and Italian languages. Students will review the rules and symbols of the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA).

Enrollment Eligibility:

This course is open to undergraduate Music Education majors, as well as graduate Choral Conducting and Music Education students, or any student with permission of the instructor.

Course Goals:

Written, verbal, and aural skills are required for this class. Students will acquire knowledge with IPA symbols and rules associated with English, German, French, Latin, and Italian languages. In addition, students will become familiar with the pronunciation of vowels and consonants in these languages. Assignments will include singing excerpts, written tasks, and aural exercises.

Course Objectives:

As a result of the experiences and opportunities, students will:

• Learn and memorize the sounds associated with each consonant and vowel, and the corresponding IPA symbols;

• Listen critically to frequent readings and/or recordings of languages (texts) and evaluate the accuracy of the pronunciation;

• Perform in class excerpts in order to demonstrate their understanding of the rules and pronunciations.
