This course presents a scholarly examination of the production of Latino/a identities in the US through an examination of a variety of texts, including sporting events, literature, film, music, and comic strips. We will consider Latino/a popular cultural in the context of global and local processes. Students will learn to identify transnational identities, discuss the politics of representation, and analyze cultural texts. In this course, we will discuss the political significance of Latino/a cultural production, considering cultural texts as sites where mainstream stereotypes are contested and counter-identities are constructed. In this course, Latino/a identities are understood as multiple and heterogeneous: in other words, there are many ways of being Latino/a and many Latino/a identities. Moreover, the very meaning of the term "Latino/a" is a site of political and cultural struggle. Finally, because struggles over popular culture occur in the public sphere they are linked to struggles for cultural and political citizenship in both local and global arenas.

Requirements:

1.**Midterm (20%) and Final (30%).** Exams will cover reading assignments, films, speakers, and PowerPoint presentations. Both exams are "closed book" and "open note." In other words, you may consult notes but you may not look in books. This kind of exam is meant to encourage you to take good, careful notes. You SHOULD take notes on the reading, on PowerPoint presentations and other lectures, on the films, and on the speakers. You will only be allowed to look at notes that are in your own writing.

2. **Final Project (25%):** Students will work alone or in teams to produce an analysis of a Latino/a cultural text or to create a new cultural text relating to Latino/a identities in the US. Creativity is encouraged: poetry, video, fashion shows, artistic projects, comic strips, digital creations, music. Time for presentation will be <u>extremely</u> limited so students should develop projects that can be shared quickly, preferably in a "museum" or gallery setting or else work together. Students will submit a one-page explanation of their project.

3. Four (4) Response Papers (15%): 1-2 pages typed, double-spaced, 10-12 point font, as assigned. NO LATE PAPERS. NO MAKE-UPS.

4. **Attendance and Participation (10%).** This class involves participation. More than two unexcused absences will negatively affect your grade.
