Music 294, Rap Music in Context Spring 1999 School of Music, Ohio State University G. M. Boone

What is musical about rap, what is expressive? How does rap do what it does, and why? In this course we will attempt to answer these questions by taking a close look at rap music in its content, its context, and its history. We will read extensively about it, and listen to examples of different styles and periods; we will write several papers about it, and go out to listen to it. Emphasis will be placed on student participation: this is a seminar, in which student initiative is necessary in learning about and making sense of rap, and every participant in the class will play an important role. For this reason, enrollment is limited (based on permission of the instructor). There are no other prerequisites—except for enthusiasm, an open mind, and a tolerance for technical discussions of musical detail.
