The Department of Greek and Latin will offer an INTENSIVE LATIN WORKSHOP during SUMMER QUARTER 2005. This Workshop will meet daily from 9:30-12:00 and from 1:00-3:30. Latin 270 is the sequel of Latin 170, and covers the equivalent of 2 200-level Latin courses. The five weeks will be spent reading major classical authors (Vergil, Cicero and Catullus). Other authors will be selected according to student interest.

This course will require a full-time commitment from both the teachers and the students. Typically there will be four to six hours of homework every day. Staff will be available for office hours before, during and after the workshop and students will be able to call instructors at home if there are difficulties with any of the evening assignment. The Computer Center will be open for students who wish to explore and use the Latin Home Page, which includes resources developed specifically for the Latin Workshop as well as interactive pages for help in memorization of forms and rules. We are committed to helping students learn to read and use Latin in a very short time and will do what we can to make this possible. It is NOT recommended that students hold down jobs or have other significant commitments during the Workshop.

Latin 270 will be offered during the second term of the summer, the class will read sections from major writers of the Classical and Medieval periods. We will offer Vergil, Cicero and Catullus in the morning sessions and will try to meet the interests and needs of students in the afternoon sessions. See further below.

Course Objectives: To introduce students to the problems and pleasures of reading real Latin for five weeks.

* Cover the equivalent of more than two 200-level Latin courses in five weeks

- Prepare students for advanced reading courses by Autumn 2005
- * Most students will be able to enroll in 600 level author and genre courses by the end of 2005-2006
- * Invited lecturers every Friday will get beyond the nuts and bolts

Class Schedule:

Morning: The Workshop will meet in 448 UH at 9 am. The schedule for the morning sessions is as follows:

During weeks 1 and 2 students will read Vergil, *Aeneid* IV. There will be daily quizzes, and this unit will be followed by a 3-hour exam on the Monday of week 3.

During weeks 3 and 4 students will read Cicero, *In Catilinam* I. There will be daily quizzes, and this unit will be followed by a 3-hour exam on the Monday of week 5. The remainder of week 5 will be spent reading selected poems of Catullus. There will be daily quizzes, and this unit will be followed by a 3-hour exam on the final day of class. Afternoon: The Workshop will meet in 448 UH at 1 pm. Readings for the afternoon session will reflect the interests and needs of the students in the Workshop. Choices will include the following: Roman historians (Livy, Sallust, Tacitus), Roman Love Elegy, Roman epistolography, Introduction to Medieval Latin, Golliard Poets, Saints' Lives, etc. The afternoon sessions will be divided into two sequences, each devoted to one of the selected topics and each followed by a 2 hour exam. Due to the amount of work required of the students, it will be acceptable to participate in the afternoon sessions by reading at sight. There will not be daily quizzes.

Attendance: Attendance is mandatory!! Due to the intensive nature of this course, daily attendance is essential.
