Continuing from "Syriac I," which introduced the grammar and basic vocabulary of Syrian Aramaic, this course has two components: 1) intensive practice of reading Syriac prose and poetry from a variety of periods and genres, including philosophical prose, verse homilies, and historical narratives; 2) a hands-on introduction to research tools available for the study of Syriac tradition, including encyclopedias, lexica, editions, series of studies, etc.

Weekly lessons outline the history of Syriac culture from antiquity to the Middle Ages, focusing on the efflorescence of Syriac literary production (roughly the third to the eighth century).
