# Syriac II

# NELC 5126 (3 Units)

Continuing from "Syriac I," which introduced the grammar and basic vocabulary of Syrian Aramaic, this course has two components: 1) intensive practice of reading Syriac prose and poetry from a variety of periods and genres, including philosophical prose, verse homilies, and historical narratives; 2) a hands-on introduction to research tools available for the study of Syriac tradition, including encyclopedias, lexica, editions, series of studies, etc.

Weekly lessons outline the history of Syriac culture from antiquity to the Middle Ages, focusing on the efflorescence of Syriac literary production (roughly the third to the eighth century).

By the end of this course, students will have a greatly increased speed and comprehension of the language and will have acquired a substantially increased recognition vocabulary in the language. Students will become familiar with a range of literary genres in Syriac and will have experience in reading texts as preserved in ancient manuscripts. Students will be accustomed to using the fundamental research tools for Syriac studies.
