SYLLABUS SUBJECT TO CHANGE

This Study Abroad course will focus on arts and cultural practices in schools, colleges, museums, and cultural institutions in Jamaica. Students will explore and analyze policies, practices, content and pedagogies of the arts in Jamaica in comparison and contrast with our understandings of such in the United States. Additionally, students will work on their visual literacy skills by reading and critiquing visual and contextual representations of Caribbean arts and culture. Such an analysis is meant to broaden our understanding of arts and culture in general and specific to Jamaica, particularly cultural practices we have often come to accept within our national and local experiences. Students will be lead through investigations about race relations, culture, and language in Jamaica. Students will be asked to reflect on their learning through writing and visual creation. These products of learning will be assessed based on students' reflections of cultural similarities and differences and their impact on the practices we observe and experience in the settings described above. Students will be asked to reflect on personal experiences in the arts as a point of reference and as a space through which to critically analyze cultural norms and accepted practices.

Partner Institution

Our partner institution in Jamaica is the Edna Manley College of the Visual and Performing Arts (EMCVPA), which is a Government Institution and funded by government. It is the first institution of its kind within the English Speaking Caribbean to provide professional and technical education and training in the Arts, offering qualification at the Bachelor, Associate Degree and Certificate levels. In 1983 the Organization of American States designated the institution the Inter-American Centre for Caribbean Cultural Development thus recognizing it as a regional cultural resource institution.

Learning Objectives

Students will:

- 1. Consider similarities and differences in arts and cultural practices, procedures, content, and policies in Jamaica (compared and contrasted to that in the U.S.).
- 2. Be exposed to arts practices in schools and colleges in Jamaica by leading arts educators and cultural practitioners.
- 3. Explore and analyze cultural institutions, such as museums and arts organizations, that offer educational opportunities.
- 4. Reflect on their own and others' cultural identifiers as they relate to arts and cultural practices.
- 5. Critically analyze Western representations of Caribbean identity, culture and art.
- 6. Identify relationships between Western perceptions and actual lived experiences of Caribbean people and their art.

Student Assessment (100 points total)

Students will be required to:

Participate in online and in-class discussions on required readings, films, videos, etc. Your active participation will be considered by the quality of your discussion responses, listening as well as responding, reflecting, and being an engaged and active part of the class. **40 points.**

Prior to departure, you will complete an independently written visual research paper on socio-cultural considerations within the nation of Jamaica. Students will select an area of focus and identify literature and other quality materials through which to share online with the class. **20 points.**

Submit a post-trip reflective portfolio. Students will produce a portfolio (documentation) containing layers of images, text, and/or other (video) material and visual culture based on identified themes of learning. The final product may take on a traditional "portfolio," it may be done in digital format, online, etc. **40 points.**
