COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course introduces the main elements of Biblical Hebrew grammar and syntax. Hebrew is the primary language of the Old Testament. An ability to read Hebrew biblical texts unlocks the beauty and subtlety of Biblical poetry and prose. Command of Biblical Hebrew is advantageous for the study of religion and history in the ancient and late antique Mediterranean. The course assumes no prior experience with the Hebrew language but expects students will have at least moderate experience with learning *some* other language, whether modern or classical, and asks students to familiarize themselves with the Hebrew alphabet before the beginning of the course. By the end of the semester students will be familiar Biblical Hebrew, able to translate sentences and recognize grammatical features.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES: At the successful completion of the course, students will demonstrate:

• A moderate vocabulary of Biblical Hebrew words

- The ability to accurately translate Hebrew biblical prose
- The ability to parse the grammatical features of individual words
- A beginning ability to translate from English into Biblical Hebrew

TEACHING METHOD: Class will be a combination of lecture, discussion, translation and oral grammatical exercises.

There will be written assignments to be completed twice a week. These will be exercises supporting the previous lecture. Written exercises are due at the beginning of the *following* class. Exercises should be completed on your own and then you should consult the *Annotated Key* and correct your mistakes in another color ink. *Note: There are some intentional wrong answer provided in the Annotated Key so be on the lookout for them, and write any questions about such possible wrong answers on your papers.* Hand in the corrected exercises to me.

This means that each day you will complete exercises practicing what we have discussed in class that day, as well as read chapters about new material that we will discuss in the following class.

Quizzes

There will be in-class vocabulary quizzes based on the assigned vocabulary in Lambdin's textbook. All vocabulary lists from each lesson assigned should be learned but only selected written exercises from each lesson are to be completed.
