Course description

When pursuing a degree in psychology, it is important that students receive an enriched and challenging educational experience through diverse learning opportunities. Many of these opportunities may be found in the classroom, yet research has shown that active, engaged students benefit significantly from activities such as participation in student organizations, honor societies, study abroad programs, and internships.

Using psychological concepts and methods in real-world settings can be a source of considerable enrichment for your learning. You can apply classroom knowledge, test out your interests and skills in psychology, explore your career goals and values, and gain experience and training in a specialized area of psychology.

This course will take place online on Carmen. There are no classroom meetings. Each week, we will focus on a different topic that relates to internships and career development. We will explore these topics through readings, discussions, and written assignments. All readings and discussions can be found on Carmen, and assignments must be submitted to the dropbox on Carmen. There is no required textbook for this course. Along with course assignments, hours spent working at your internship site also count towards completion of this course. This course is graded Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory and will not factor into your GPA, but may count toward your Psychology major requirements.

Course learning objectives

By the end of this course, students should:

- Acquire new skills at a psychology-related internship.
- Develop successful work behaviors, including independence, initiative, and professional demeanor.
- Clarify their career interests and goals for life after graduation.
- Be able to succinctly explain their activities at their internships and the application of psychological concepts to their internship and career goals.
- Have the tools to effectively prepare for their life after graduation.
- Improve their self-efficacy and self-regulation through goal-setting at their internship.
- Learn how to make new professional contacts in their field of interest and broaden their professional network.

Course materials

For each credit hour of Psych 3191, you must work at least 38 hours at your internship site during this term. Your internship supervisor should monitor your working hours, and you must document the days and times you work at your internship (verified by your supervisor).

- 1 credit hour of Psych 3191 = 38-74 hours at your internship
- 2 credit hours of Psych 3191 = 75-112 hours at your internship
- 3 credit hours of Psych 3191 = 113-149 hours at your internship
- 4 credit hours of Psych 3191 = 150-187 hours at your internship
- 5 credit hours of Psych 3191 = 188-224 hours at your internship

Supervisor Agreement

So that you and your supervisor are aware of the requirements of this course, you will ask your internship supervisor to fill out a Supervisor Agreement Form (available on Carmen under Content – Course Info). You, not your supervisor, are responsible for returning the completed and signed form to the instructor by the due date on the Course Schedule below.

- Scan and email to the instructor

Readings

All course readings will be available on Carmen. The 6 readings are journal articles or excerpts from books. The readings are designed to enhance and supplement your internship experience, as well as providing you with background information for use in completing the assignments. There is no required textbook for this course.

Discussion of Readings

Online discussions of the course readings encourage you to think critically about the readings and gain new perspectives on the topics by discussing with your classmates. The readings can be found on Carmen under Content and the discussions can be found on Carmen under Discussions. There will be 6 readings and 6 corresponding discussion topics. Each discussion topic is worth 2 points, and the lowest score is dropped (so you can skip one discussion topic, if you choose) for a total of 10 points.

For each discussion topic, you must post at least twice. In first post, describe your reaction to the reading and the discussion prompt, and pose a critical thinking question about the topic for your classmates. A critical thinking question is an open-ended question based on analyzing or evaluating the topic, or the application of the topic. In the second post, reply to another student's critical thinking question (hit Reply to reply directly). Your discussions will be graded based on quality of your critical thinking question, and the new information or insights that you bring to the discussion in your response to a classmate's post. Your post should be about 5-10 sentences long and free of errors. **No late posts will be accepted.** Posts considered disrespectful will be removed and given a zero. The due dates can be found on the Course Schedule below.

Reflection Papers

The Reflection Papers are short papers (2-4 pages each) that will encourage you to analyze various aspects of your internship experiences. They should provide you with a clear structure of your progress and development during your internship, and will help you to explore your future and verbalize your thoughts when it comes time for job/grad school interviews. There will be 3 Reflection Papers, each worth 4 points. The specific instructions for each paper can be found on Carmen under Content and the due dates can be found on the Course Schedule below. Late submissions will have points deducted. All files must be submitted to the Carmen Dropbox (.doc, .docx, .pages, or .pdf files only).

Personal Commercial

When first speaking with a potential employer or introducing yourself at networking functions, you should be able to quickly describe your career goals as well as the core strengths and relevant experiences that you have to offer — all while conveying the information in a way that gives a glimpse of who you are as an individual. Essentially, you need a commercial to pitch your product—you! For this assignment, you will write out your personal commercial, and practice using it at a networking function, such as a career fair. Then you will write a reflection paper that is about 1-2 pages long.

The specific instructions for the Personal Commercial assignment can be found on Carmen under Content and the due date and time can be found on the Course Schedule below. You can earn up to 6 points on this assignment. Late submissions will have points deducted. All files must be submitted to the Carmen Dropbox (.doc, .docx, .pages, or .pdf files only).

Informational Interview

Informational Interviewing is a method of exploring career paths and gathering information about the expectations and work environments of a specific occupation by meeting with professionals already working in that field. The goal of an informational interview is not to interview for a position, but to learn specifics about the occupation and to build your network for your future job search. For this assignment, you will interview a person that currently works in an occupation you are interested in learning more about. You will turn in a summary of your interview questions and answers, along with a short 2-3 page reflection on the experience.

The specific instructions for the Informational Interview assignment can be found on Carmen under Content and the due date and time can be found on the Course Schedule below. You can earn up to 6 points on this assignment. Late submissions will have points deducted. All files must be submitted to the Carmen Dropbox (.doc, .docx, .pages, or .pdf files only).

CarmenWiki Review

One of the benefits of this course is sharing information about your internship with other Psychology majors. For this assignment, you will complete a review of your internship on our CarmenWiki page. This page is a Wiki site related to Carmen that houses our repository of psychology-related internships, and is editable by students in Psych 3191. Your evaluation will be viewable by the OSU community and is specifically aimed toward other Psychology students looking for internships.

The specific instructions for the CarmenWiki Review can be found on Carmen under Content and the due date can be found on the Course Schedule below. You can earn up to 2 points on this assignment. Late posts will have points deducted.

Working Hours Log & Supervisor Evaluation

Informational Interview

Informational Interviewing is a method of exploring career paths and gathering information about the expectations and work environments of a specific occupation by meeting with professionals already working in that field. For this assignment, you will interview a person that currently works in an occupation you are interested in learning more about. You will turn in a summary of your interview, along with a 2-3 page reflection on the experience.
