Comparative Studies Major Revision Proposal August 31, 2015

Section 1. General Information

This is a revision of the existing major in Comparative Studies. Its name is Comparative Studies, with concentrations in Comparative Cultural Studies, Comparative Ethnic and American Studies, Comparative Literature, Folklore, Science and Technology Studies. Students will receive a BA in Comparative Studies. The proposed implementation date is July 1, 2016 or beginning of AU 16 semester (whichever is appropriate). The academic units responsible for administering the program are the Department of Comparative Studies and the College of Arts & Sciences.

Section 2. Rationale

During our annual assessment exercise in Spring 2014, we observed a serious drop in majors. This prompted an expansion of our regular assessment process that encompassed focus groups and a broad survey of current and former majors. Along with data that emphasized strengths in the major, this assessment identified a trend in student responses that indicated frustration with the complexity of and inconsistencies in the structure of our major, and a feeling that there were too many choices required of the students. This major revision is intended to respond to that data by:

- a) Simplifying and clarifying pathways through the major
- b) Establishing consistency across the concentrations
- c) Ensuring that we can regularly offer the classes our students need
- d) Emphasizing the strengths of the department identified by our students
- e) Increasing student/faculty interaction outside the classroom

This major continues the Department's unique focus on comparative, interdisciplinary work that crosses national and identity-based boundaries. It structures students' pathways through the curriculum so that each succeeding level of course builds on skills and knowledge bases developed at previous levels.

The most typical path would begin with a student taking one of our popular GE courses and discovering the department's approach to the study of culture, knowledge and power. Ideally, the path would continue with our new course CS 2099, which is intended to orient them to our curriculum, introduce them to our faculty in a relatively informal setting, and teach them more about research, study abroad, and other opportunities outside the classroom. Students would then advance through an organized procession of introductory courses (2XXX), topical or theorizing courses that provide frameworks for the study of particular types of objects or practices (3XXX), and a set of research-oriented classes that provide the

opportunity to exercise and refine their abilities to identify complex cultural issues and develop interdisciplinary comparative approaches to those issues (4XXX). Along the way, students in every concentration will take a required survey of interdisciplinary comparative methodologies and theoretical approaches (3990). The major culminates in a capstone course (4990) for which they will write a senior seminar paper or a thesis that will demonstrate their mastery of the skills and knowledge bases they have developed as a major in Comparative Studies. Every concentration will follow this model, ensuring regularity of expectations and availability in each of them. Every student will complete a significant research project.

Students who complete a major in Comparative Studies will have acquired the sensibilities, skills, and knowledge bases necessary to confront the complex problems and issues that they will face in their globally extended, increasingly entangled world. They will have the demonstrated ability to identify multi-layered, intricately entangled problems of culture, knowledge, and power, develop interdisciplinary comparative means of approaching those problems, and to write up their findings. This set of skills is precisely what is needed in a wide range of professions, from education to law to business to non-profit work.

During our assessment process, students also identified flexibility as one of the strengths of the major. In order to ensure a sufficient number of realizable pathways through our major, this revision includes the renumbering of several courses in order to place them in their proper place in the sequence. In each case, no substantive changes have been made to the course. All that is being changed is the course number in order to more accurately reflect the place of the respective course in our curricular maps. Further details can be found in our curricular maps that are included with this proposal.

Specific Changes from the Existing Comparative Studies Major

- Every student majoring in Comparative Studies will be assigned a faculty advisor. This advisor will help the student create a coherent program of study and increase faculty/student interaction outside the classroom.
- A new one credit-hour course, CS 2099 The Question of Comparative Studies, is being proposed and will become one of the required courses for all majors. This course is intended to orient them to our curriculum, introduce them to our faculty in a relatively informal setting, and teach them more about research, study abroad, and other opportunities outside the classroom. The addition of this course pushes our major up to 37 credit hours. We believe that the value of this course exceeds the cost of adding the single credit hour.
- The number of concentrations have been reduced from 6 to 5.

- The existing major consists of six concentrations: Comparative Cultural Studies; Comparative Ethnic and American Studies; Comparative Literature; Folklore, Religious Studies; Science and Technology Studies. The proposed major will eliminate Religious Studies because a separate major in Religious Studies now exists. The RS concentration is redundant.
- In the existing major, the structures of the concentrations varied significantly. For example, Comparative Cultural Studies required 1 *Foundation* course and 6 *Interdisciplinary/Thematic/Comparative* courses. While Comparative Ethnic and American Studies required 2 *Foundation* courses and 4 *Interdisciplinary/Thematic/Comparative* courses. In the proposed major, these structures have been brought in line with each other, with only minor variations remaining.
 - Each concentration now has the same structure of 4 required courses, 3 of which are identical. This includes a new one credit-hour course, 2099, as well as 3990 and 4990. The latter two courses, 3990 and 4990, were required of all CS majors in the existing major.
 - Each concentration now has a limited number of *core* courses that constitute the center of each student's major. The concepts of *Foundation* courses and *Interdisciplinary/Thematic/Comparative* courses no longer apply. Courses that were listed in the *Foundation* section of the existing major have in most cases been moved to the *Core* section of the proposed major. Courses in the *Interdisciplinary/Thematic/Comparative* category have been shifted to either *Core* or *Elective* courses.
 - Each concentration also has a reduced number of *Elective* courses that build on the core while also adding relevant additional content or methodologies.
 - Reduction in the number of courses in both the *Core* and the *Electives* was a response to student concerns about a lack of direction that comes from too many options and the lack of consistent offerings of all the listed courses. A high degree of student choice has been retained while reducing student frustration.
 - Four of the proposed concentrations carry an implied *focus*: e.g. Concentrators in Folklore will find their *core* courses drawn from the Folklore curriculum. Comparative Cultural Studies does not imply a pre-existing *focus or core*. Therefore, majors who concentrate in CCS will work with their faculty advisors to construct an area of *focus*, which will constitute the center of their major.

- Each of the proposed concentrations requires an introductory course (e.g. CS 2350, Intro to Folklore) with the exception of Comparative Ethnic and American Studies. A new course is being developed, Introduction to Comparative Ethnic and American Studies. However, it is not yet ready. At this time, CS 2360, Introduction to Comparative Cultural Studies, will function as the introductory course for that concentration.
- We are re-numbering several courses to bring them in line with an explicit understanding of the numbering system of our curriculum. This explicit understanding recognizes that 2000 level courses are introductory; 3000 level courses are theorizing or topical courses; 4000 level courses offer deeper investigations of more specific areas of study and offer research opportunities.
- The Department of Comparative Studies also administers majors in Religious Studies and World Literature. As mentioned above, the concentration in Religious Studies is being eliminated as it is redundant with the RS major. The World Literature major focuses on literatures in translation. In order to limit the overlap between WL and CL, the concentration in Comparative Literature no longer requires courses in translation studies.

Section 3. Goals/Objectives and Evaluation of Program

Comparative Studies Program Goals:

<u>Goal 1:</u> Students develop the capacity to analyze differences in culture and politics over time.

<u>Goal 2:</u> Students develop the capacity to engage and analyze issues of community and social justice.

<u>Goal 3:</u> Students develop interdisciplinary thinking and writing skills and understanding of relationships between disciplines.

<u>Goal 4:</u> Students develop the ability to read critically and interpret a diverse range of texts, material artifacts, and/or performance traditions.

Our existing assessment plan measures the success of our program by reviewing capstone papers, surveying our majors, and reviewing discursive course evaluations. One of the stimuli for this major revision derives from that plan. It showed that a significant percentage of our students entered the capstone course unprepared for the work that course demanded and, as a result produced papers that did not effectively address our program goals. Given the evident success of the existing assessment plan and its ability to identify problems in the program, we are

submitting the same plan to accompany this revision. This plan is already implemented. The relevant section from this year's report follows.

Section 4. Relationship to Other Programs / Benchmarking

This is a revision of the existing major in Comparative Studies. There will be no new overlap with any other programs or departments within the university. As an interdisciplinary major, the program encourages students to incorporate classes from other departments, and many of our courses are cross-listed. These pre-existing arrangements will continue in the revised major. There are no direct transfer opportunities for this major. The only consultants that participated in the revision of this major were members of the faculty, staff, and current and former students of the program and the staff of UCAT. We anticipate that the initial set of students who enroll in the revised major will draw essentially from the same sources as the current major, but our aspiration is that the greater clarity of the structure and goals of the revision will help to attract a larger percentage of those students who will benefit from our curriculum. With proper communication and promotion, the special qualities of this major should attract high-ability humanities-oriented students from leading feeder high schools as well as OSU colleges outside ASC.

Section 5. Student Enrollment

During the first year, we anticipate no change in the number of students who add our major. In 2014-15, 17 students added the major. The second year might see a slight drop as the increased rigor of the program drives away a small portion of those who might otherwise be attracted to it. After that, given proper communication and promotion, we anticipate the number to rise back to the level we reached before semester conversion. In 2012-13, the major added 29 students.

Section 6. Curricular Requirements—

Advising sheets, curriculum maps and sample plans for all five concentrations are included with this proposal.

The minimum number of hours required for completion of the major is 37. The total number of credit hours earned by the typical major in Comparative Studies is 121.

No courses in other departments are required to complete our major. It is expected, however, that every student will take at least some of their major coursework outside of Comparative Studies.

Our concentrations are interdisciplinary and cross-departmental by design. Typically, students will take between 6 and 21 credit hours across the College of Arts and Sciences and, occasionally across multiple colleges, at both lower and upper division levels.

We require all our majors to write at least a major senior paper. A senior thesis is highly recommended.

The name of the major as it will appear in the College Bulletin is Comparative Studies.
