HIST 3219: The Historical Jesus

Jesus Christ is a major religious figure about which there is considerable academic and theological debate. This course examines this debate and thus explores the problem of how historical facts and religious persuasion are related where a religion, such as Christianity, lays claim to historical truth. Since the Enlightenment this has been a matter of considerable intellectual and cultural interest. The basic questions are: Who was Jesus? What can we know about him that will satisfy ordinary standards of historical knowledge? What difference does it make? Attempts to answer these questions have resulted in what is usually called the "quests" for the "historical Jesus." This course will analyze those previous quests for the historical Jesus and their analysis of the early Christian Gospels. Each student will write a final paper arguing for his or her own particular reconstruction of the historical Jesus, using the methods of critical analysis that he or she is learning in the course.

For **Historical Study** the **Goals** and **Expected Learning Outcomes** are specified as follows:

Goals:

Students recognize how past events are studied and how they influence today's society and the human condition.

Expected Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students construct an integrated perspective on history and the factors that shape human activity.
- 2. Students describe and analyze the origins and nature of contemporary issues.
- 3. Students speak and write critically about primary and secondary historical sources by examining diverse interpretations of past events and ideas in their historical contexts.

The course readings and assignments address the learning outcomes of Historical Study in the following ways:

This course allow students to recognize how past events are studied and how they influence today's society and the human condition in the following ways:

- Critically examine theories of history, and historical methodologies
 Students will analyze the historical contingency of Jesus as an ancient Galilean Jew. Claims (both ancient and modern) about Jesus are contradictory, neither self-evident nor inevitable.
 Students will encounter social, cultural, economic, and social explanations for changing ideas and images of Jesus as part of the history of early Judaism.
- 2. Engage with contemporary and historical debates on specific regions, time periods and themes of the human past.

This course highlights how the figure of Jesus never exists in isolation as a single set of "facts." The complicated relationships among history and beliefs are continuously defined by social and cultural ideas, and they change over time.

3. Through reading in primary and secondary sources and in-depth class discussion, students will access and critically examine social, political, economic, military, gender, religious, ecological, and ethnic/racial/national movements in a wider socio- cultural context.

Students will study a finite corpus of evidence, the New Testament writings in concert with extra canonical gospels (i.e, the *Gospel of Thomas*), as primary sources in order to gain insight into past beliefs about Jesus, such as the claims about his teachings and actions, and how and why those beliefs changed over time.

4. Students will carry out in-depth analysis in a final paper comparing distinct historical moments, social movements and their effects.

This course covers a distinct historical moment in the Roman empire, the first two centuries of the Common Era, and the papers, and especially the final exam, require students to analyze how social, political and religious changes shaped the rise of early Christianity as a religion distinct from its parent, Judaism.

5. The courses addresses (1) mastery of content; (2) articulation of ideas; (3) capacity to work toward accomplishing goals both independently and cooperatively; (4) knowledge of and respect for individuals and groups who are different from the student; (5) development of multiple literacies (in the philosophy of history) and information literary of the past; (8) a literary aesthetic; (9) self-reflection; and (10) historical consciousness.

Requirements:

Class Participation. For each class session, you are to email to the instructor one (1) question based on the homework reading. Questions are due the night before class. Attendance at all class sessions is expected and role will be taken. The course will be primarily lecture with discussion. All students are expected to come to class having read and understood the materials for that session. Students must be prepared to contribute to discussion each day.

A **Midterm Examination** on February 8.

Term Paper (8–10 pages) on the historical Jesus. All papers are to be typed with 12-point *Times New Roman* font and double-spaced. E-Mail attachments or FAX are not acceptable options for submitting papers in this course. You have the option of meeting any of three deadlines:

Deadline I (re—write option). <u>April 5</u> If you turn in your paper by this date, I will return it with criticisms and suggestions on <u>April 12</u> so that you can submit a revised paper (along with your first draft) by Deadline III (<u>April 19</u>).

Deadline II. April 12. If you turn in your paper by this date, I will grade it and make comments and criticism. There is no re–writing with this option.

Deadline III. April 19 If you turn in your paper by this date, I will grade it without comments and criticism. There is no re—writing with this option. Late penalties start to apply for papers submitted after the end of class.

The purpose of this system is to allow each student as much feedback from me as she or he wants. The criteria for evaluating the papers are the same for each deadline. Your paper will not be graded more or less strictly depending on which deadline you meet. That is, a Deadline II paper could get an A, a Deadline I paper a C.

Grading Policy: An **A** indicates excellence of the highest quality. A **B** indicates above average work, meeting more than the minimum. A **C** indicates that the student minimally does the requirements of the course. In grading papers, I give a grade in the "B" range to papers I judge basically successful, and a grade in the "C" range to papers I judge basically unsuccessful. A paper will have to impress me strongly, one way or the other, to get a higher or lower grade. An "A" paper therefore will be a paper that is not merely good, but genuinely outstanding.

Grade scale: **A**, 100-93%; **A-**, 92-90%; **B+**, 89-87%; **B**, 86-83%; **B-**, 82-80%; **C+**, 79-77%; **C**, 76-73%; **C-**, 72-70%; **D+**, 69-65%; **D**, 64-60%; **E** 59% and below.

Assessment Goals and Objectives

Historical Study GE Requirements:

Goals:

Students recognize how past events are studied and how they influence today's society and the human condition.

Expected Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students construct an integrated perspective on history and the factors that shape human activity.
- 2. Students describe and analyze the origins and nature of contemporary issues.
- 3. Students speak and write critically about primary and secondary historical sources by examining diverse interpretations of past events and ideas in their historical contexts.

Goals of the courses that fulfill the GE Learning Outcomes:

History courses develop students' recognition of how past events are studied and how they influence today's society and the human condition through the following ways:

- 1. Critically examine theories of history, and historical methodologies
- 2. Engage with contemporary and historical debates on specific regions, time periods and themes of the human past.
- 3. Through reading in primary and secondary sources and in-depth class discussion, students will access and critically examine social, political, economic, military, gender, religious, ecological, and ethnic/racial/national movements in a wider socio- cultural context.

- 5. Access and critically examine movements framed by race, gender, class, ethnicity, religion, and/or nation in a wider socio-cultural context.
- 6. Carry out in-depth analysis in a final paper, exam, or project comparing distinct moments of ethnic, racial, nationalist, gender, class, and/or religious mobilization or social movements and their effects.
- 3. Both the GE and course-specific learning objectives for History courses requesting Diversity: Global Studies might be summarized as follows:

Global Studies GE Requirements:

Goals:

Courses in Diversity – Global Studies will foster students' understanding of the pluralistic nature of institutions, society, and culture across the world in order to become educated, productive, and principled citizens.

Expected Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students understand some of the political, economic, cultural, physical, social, and philosophical aspects of one or more of the world's nations, peoples and cultures outside the U.S.
- 2. Students recognize the role of national and international diversity in shaping their own attitudes and values as global citizens.

Goals of the course that fulfill the GE Learning Outcomes: Students will achieve the social diversity goals and learning outcomes by

- 1. Through reading in primary and secondary sources and in-depth class discussion, students critically examine the political, economic, social, cultural and philosophical development in the World.
- 2. Engage with contemporary and historical debates on the differences and similarities between cultures and peoples.
- 3. Access and critically examine ethnically, nationally or religiously framed movements in a wider socio-cultural and global context.
- 4. Carry out in-depth analysis in a final paper, exam, or project comparing distinct moments in human history and how they shaped the world in the past and today.
- 5. Completing readings, attending lectures, and participating in class discussions and in-class assignments that will help students understand the complexity of debates over international issues. They will describe theories of international issues on exams and written assignments.
- 6. Students will understand the roots and structures of today's globalized world.

II. Methods

An assessment of whether these objectives are met is effectively carried out by an examination of the work students are actually required to do for the course. Contributions in class discussions will be considered, but weighted more lightly, given the tendency for more confident students to contribute more to such discussions. Paper and exams will provide an understanding of students' abilities to think historically and to engage in analysis. This can be gauged by their responses to specific exam questions—asking

students to provide a perspective on history and relate that perspective to an understanding of the factors that shape human activity. Thus, exams for Historical Study courses will have at least one question that requires students to provide a perspective on the factors that shaped an event or theory. Similarly, for courses that include Diversity in the U.S. GE requirements, we will have at least one question that requires students to provide a description of the roles of categories such as race, gender, class, ethnicity and religion and how those roles have helped shape either their perspective or the country's perspective on diversity. For courses that include Diversity: Global Studies, we will ask one question that requires students to provide an understanding of some combination of political, economic, cultural, physical, social, and philosophical differences in or among the world's nations, peoples and cultures outside the U.S. In this way, we hope to measure the courses (and the students') progress toward the multiple objectives of the GE. In this way we should be able to ascertain whether they are acquiring the desired skills and not simply learning (and regurgitating) specific information.

Summary of Data:

A committee, appointed by the UTC Chair, will be asked to evaluate a sample of questions and papers, and to gauge how well the goals of the course seem reflected in them. Assessment of Historical Study, Social Diversity, and Diversity: Global Issues from the GE goals will be carried out primarily through the evaluation of formal graded assignments and ungraded in-class assignments. The committee will rank the assignments across a four-category scale that captures students' mastery of the GE goals. Students will complete an informal feedback survey halfway through the semester to assess their own performance, the pace of the class, and the instructor's effectiveness. A brief summary report will be written by the UTC Chair, and that, as well as the sampled questions themselves, will be made available to the instructor and to the Chair of the department. We intend to insure that the proposed courses adequately articulate these goals, teach toward them, test for them, and help students realize their individual potential to meet them. Assessments will be summarized and used to alter the course for the next teaching.
