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Dear Shoshanah, Shari, and Kirsten,

In turn, I also wish to congratulate you for winning the team-teaching grant!

At the meeting of the Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee on December 11 (referenced below), it was pointed out that when the course is taught the language for academic misconduct used on the proposed syllabus (p. 4 of syllabus) should be replaced with the standard language used by the College of ASC, namely:

“It is the responsibility of the Committee on Academic Misconduct to investigate or establish procedures for the investigation of all reported cases of student academic misconduct. The term “academic misconduct” includes all forms of student academic misconduct wherever committed; illustrated by, but not limited to, cases of plagiarism and dishonest practices in connection with examinations. Instructors shall report all instances of alleged academic misconduct to the committee (Faculty Rule 3335-5-487). For additional information, see the Code of Student Conduct <http://studentlife.osu.edu/csc/>.”

The committee members asked that that information be communicated to the Dept of Art Education. In particular, they indicated that faculty cannot give an automatic E when plagiarism is suspected but need to report such cases to the Committee on Academic Misconduct, which takes appropriate action.

Also, please know that I have added to the course description in curriculum.osu.edu that the course is team-taught with a faculty member in CRP (a statement we add for all such team-taught courses). I have also added an exclusion to the course, namely that the course is not open to students with credit for CRP 4674.

At our December 11 meeting, the Arts and Science Curriculum Committee evaluated the submissions to the ASC Interdisciplinary Team Teaching grant program. I am pleased to inform you that Dean Manderscheid has accepted our recommendation to fund your application for the interdisciplinary team-taught course, "The City as Art." We believe your course will provide a rich and rewarding interdisciplinary experience for OSU students and appreciate your initiative and effort in developing this course within your curriculum.

As spelled out in the call for proposals, "Faculty whose courses are selected will each receive one full-course teaching credit for their participation in the initial year of the team-taught course, and departments offering these courses will be compensated at the lecturer rate during the initial year to offset the cost of covering the departmental course that would otherwise have been taught by the team-teaching instructor."
