Overview:

The purpose of this course is to provide students in the doctoral program in intellectual and developmental disabilities psychology with an overview of applied research and policy initiatives conducted by OSU-affiliated faculty and visiting scholars in the field. The goals of this course are for students to think critically about contemporary research and policy work in their field and to engage professionally with investigators in asking thoughtful questions. By interacting with faculty, students will learn about the broad scope of research and policy work being conducted in the field of intellectual and developmental disabilities. In addition to learning about the research programs and policy work, students will have the opportunity to learn about ethical issues that investigators may have experienced in the conduct of their programs as well as procedures investigators utilize for maintaining/enhancing the diversity of their research samples and for addressing diversity in their research.

Course requirements:

Each speaker will provide 1-3 papers for students to read in preparation for the related class session. Electronic copies of all papers will be available on Carmen.

Students are expected to attend all class sessions and be prepared to ask questions and discuss the investigator's work. Speakers are scheduled on the second and fourth Tuesday of every month, 2:00-4:00pm. The first hour will be a presentation that is open to the public and the second hour will be an informal discussion with the speakers about their research and the weekly reading material.

Students are required to submit by email **one question** pertaining to the reading for that week **by 9AM on the day of the class.** The question should demonstrate that you have read the material for the class and have thought about it. Students are expected to ask at least one question of the speaker every week, either during the presentation or during the informal discussion period.

Grading:

This course is graded pass/fail based on attendance and participation in the 7 class sessions.
