COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is the first part of a two-semester capstone experience in which students initiate a strategy and develop preliminary production work (pre-production plan/proposal and rough cut/draft stage) for their senior project. Students produce an original creative work in the areas of animation, documentary, experimental or narrative or combinations and hybrids of these modes.

Iterative development and group-oriented critiques will advance projects to an intermediate stage of development. Students may work independently or in collaborative teams throughout the semester. The film that you create in this class should clearly reflect the growth of your artistic, scholarly, and professional abilities, and you should consider it your capstone project.

You will produce this work in careful consultation with your capstone project adviser and related mode faculty. The film should reflect your artistic vision and voice, while meeting professional standards. Students involved in capstone work are expected to develop and execute their work over two semesters.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

At the completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- To develop and produce a capstone project film
- Receive and integrate feedback and critical review of your work by faculty as well as your colleagues in this class
- Improve filmmaking skills, to maximize student learning experience while producing and directing the best possible short film
- Demonstrate an applied understanding of creating time-based work to communicate ideas and concepts
- Demonstrate the use of creative thinking strategies throughout the production processes
- Demonstrate the ability to establish and manage a cohesive and constructive work process for

INSTRUCTION METHOD:

This course will emphasize hands-on studio experience. Students will meet during every class session working and use studio/lab time in careful consultation with one another and with their instructor. This course will provide students with opportunities to organize, produce and review their work through regular peer and faculty feedback. It is critical that students participate and commit to the process. This presentation and feedback loop is valuable at all stages of production.

Field trips and guest artists will be integrated into the course so that students will hear from professionals in the field about their process and approaches.

ASSIGNMENTS:

- Weekly Journal Entries should document what has been discovered, what best practice
 preproduction/production materials have been created -- (storyboards, release forms,
 copyright considerations, script, shooting list, logline, research), and what the most appropriate
 next steps for the project will be.
- *Pre-production plan* is a proposal for an original creative project that a student presents to the faculty and once it is approved, leads to the production of this work in this class.
- Screenings are critique sessions in which a student's progress on her or his capstone film is reviewed and feedback is provided by peers and MIP faculty and invited guests

All work (written or video) for this class must be original and created specifically for our assignments.

GRADING:

To receive a passing grade in the course, students must demonstrate satisfactory achievement of course objectives through fulfillment of course projects and by contributing to class discussions and critiques. Students will be expected to make a formal presentation of their progress and/or project outcomes on dates specified by the course timeline.

Adherence to deadlines is expected. It is the individual student's responsibility to keep track of the goals and deadlines and to present the work to the class and instructor on the specified dates. All assignments must be completed and turned in in order to receive a passing grade in the course.

Since this course has major deadlines for film production screenings, and these screenings will be group-based critiques and thus cannot be rescheduled, late films cannot be accepted.

Evaluation of late or missed journal entries is as follows:

- Entries posted after the original due date but by the start of the next class will have the grade reduced 20%
- Entries after the original due date and after the subsequent next class start time but before the start time of the 2nd subsequent class (1 week) will have the grade reduced 40%
- Entries more than 1 week past the original due date will receive a failing grade (E) but students must still complete all entries to pass the course.
