Purpose: History 3670 is one of three Spring prerequisite courses to the World War II Study Program's May term in Europe. Only students accepted into the program during the October registration period may enroll. The purpose of this class is to deepen the contextual knowledge of students about the different national histories and the specific sites they will encounter in May. The course is organized according to the trip itinerary and will include content on contemporary national cultures and issues of noteworthy importance, so that students will be prepared to see national differences at work. Course content will be geared directly to both the expected general education outcomes of the program and the specific aims of program content. The two persistent themes here—the American "good war" myth versus Anglo-French interactions with Americans; and collaboration and resistance among European peoples—are designed to deepen student thinking about their own national mythologies when they come into confrontation with other perspectives and wrestle with the most serious issues of human rights. They are drawn to align with the College of Arts & Sciences mandates for study-abroad.

New Course Request

History 3670, "Trans-National History of WWII in Europe."

I. Rationale: The original design of the Department of History's WWII Study Program demanded a curriculum of four prerequisite courses, which included a 4000-level writing seminar. From the first we assumed that we would have to adjust the design of the program as experienced dictated and we learned how to suit the particularities of Ohio State students.

By the end of last year, we decided that the writing seminar requirement needed to be altered. For two reasons, many of the program students struggled mightily with the seminar's large writing requirement. First, the non-majors* in the program simply had no experience in putting together such large projects as the seminar necessarily requires. Second, many of the students have been sophomores** who found themselves unprepared for courses designed for upper-level majors to finish out their studies.

Curricular concerns also led us to reconsider the seminar. In their evaluations, students noted that while they learned a lot about their chose subject in the seminar, the class seemed disconnected from the May travel component. The last two years, our colleague Alice Conklin has made terrific efforts to link the seminar readings to the travel, including, most notably, reading and guest speakers focused on Normandy. Moreover, she incorporated a book review related to a specific historical site that we visit in the seminar workload. But the individual research consumed so much of the seminar work that students seem to have lost the connection to the travel component.

The proposed course addresses this discrepancy. As you will see, each week is tied directly to a particular historical site, and the readings are designed to inform students not only about that site but about the surrounding local, regional, and national wartime experiences.

While I believe that as it is now constructed, the course nicely joins the Spring curriculum with the May travel, there is another curricular advantage to this distinct program course. It will allow us to introduce into the program some very unique projects. We know that twelve Ohio State student/alumni are interred at the American-Normandy Cemetery at Coleville sur Mer. Over the years we have learned bits and pieces about their lives and have tracked down family with, at best, mixed success. We envision incorporating a research element into this new course that would direct the students toward learning as much as possible about our "Buckeye Twelve." It would be an on-going, cumulative project that could run until we have exhausted available sources.

In addition, just this week the Department of Defense-POW/MIA Accounting Agency approached us about the possibility of creating student research opportunities that would have students contribute research to locate and identify remains of those who are still listed as MIA in Normandy. It seems that the DoD has more information than researchers to digest it and is looking for enthusiastic (yet well supervised) young historians to help them tackle the backlog. As of now, this is nothing more than a wish-dream. But with a course dedicated to the WWII program, we would have the latitude to develop student projects in this effort.

Finally, let me address the question of faculty coverage. As a practical matter, only faculty members familiar with the May travel itinerary can teach it. As of now, only Profs. Steigerwald and Mansoor fit that; sooner or later, we will have to induce other faculty members to join in.

^{*} Because it confers a History Minor, the program seeks to draw in non-majors—and by design. In this it has been successful: roughly half of the students who have taken the program have been non-majors. This year's group, for instance, includes majors from finance, pre-med, pre-law, political science, English, international business, security studies, and social work.

^{**} Sophomores made up only about 20 percent of the 2013-14 cohorts. Last year and this, however, they have comprised half of the group. No doubt the availability of funds from the STEP program is the reason behind this increase. As long as STEP money continues to flow, I expect this proportion to hold.

II. Methods

Contributions in class discussions will be considered, but weighted more lightly, given the tendency for more confident students to contribute more to such discussions. Paper and exams will provide an understanding of students' abilities to think historically and to engage in analysis. This can be gauged by their responses to specific exam questions—asking

students to provide a perspective on history and relate that perspective to an understanding of the factors that shape human activity. Thus, exams for Historical Study courses will have at least one question that requires students to provide a perspective on the factors that shaped an event or theory. Similarly, for courses that include Diversity in the U.S. GE requirements, we will have at least one question that requires students to provide a description of the roles of categories such as race, gender, class, ethnicity and religion and how those roles have helped shape either their perspective or the country's perspective on diversity. For courses that include Diversity: Global Studies, we will ask one question that requires students to provide an understanding of some combination of political, economic, cultural, physical, social, and philosophical differences in or among the world's nations, peoples and cultures outside the U.S. In this way, we hope to measure the courses (and the students') progress toward the multiple objectives of the GE. In this way we should be able to ascertain whether they are acquiring the desired skills and not simply learning (and regurgitating) specific information.

Summary of Data:

A committee, appointed by the UTC Chair, will be asked to evaluate a sample of questions and papers, and to gauge how well the goals of the course seem reflected in them. Assessment of Historical Study, Social Diversity, and Diversity: Global Issues from the GE goals will be carried out primarily through the evaluation of formal graded assignments and ungraded in-class assignments. The committee will rank the assignments across a four-category scale that captures students' mastery of the GE goals. Students will complete an informal feedback survey halfway through the semester to assess their own performance, the pace of the class, and the instructor's effectiveness. A brief summary report will be written by the UTC Chair, and that, as well as the sampled questions themselves, will be made available to the instructor and to the Chair of the department. We intend to insure that the proposed courses adequately articulate these goals, teach toward them, test for them, and help students realize their individual potential to meet them. Assessments will be summarized and used to alter the course for the next teaching.
