#### Course Description

This course addresses some of the basic issues surrounding national security policy. The primary focus is on policy issues related to the use of force between and within countries. The goal of the course is to provide you with the analytical tools and factual knowledge that you will need to identify and assess current and future threats to national security. This is not a course solely on U.S. national security, but much of the material deals with the specific problems of the United States. Students are encouraged to apply what they learn in this course to the security concerns of other nations.

The course presupposes some basic familiarity with international politics as taught at the level of an introductory course in international relations. The emphasis is on developing your analytical capacity to examine and assess the problems that exist in current defense policy. The ability to memorize factual material is taken for granted, but it is not the primary goal of the course. To excel in this course, you must demonstrate the ability to integrate theory and facts by applying analytical concepts to security puzzles in the international arena. In short: think, be creative, and be ambitious.

This course will also take advantage of the web as an instructional and research technology. Some of the readings are accessible only via the web, and students are encouraged to use information technology tools in their assignments. If you are not familiar with web tools such as JSTOR, you need to become familiar with this technology as soon as possible.

#### Course Assessment

Failure to turn in an installment on its due date without prior contact with the instructor will result in a zero for that portion of the grade. However, you are still required to turn in and proceed with the rest of the assignment.

You will be graded not only for the depth of your ideas, reasoning, and evidence, but also for your presentation (this includes the basics: spelling, punctuation, organization, grammar, but it also includes the effective use of technology to enhance the report and improve on your ability to communicate your ideas).

Office hours: Office hours are your time for one-on-one dialogue about the issues we are discussing in class. I encourage you, in the strongest possible terms, to make full and regular use of them.

#### READING NOTES

Prior to the beginning of each class, you will turn in a copy of your reading notes. This is to help me keep track of how well you are comprehending the reading and thinking critically about it: one of the major objectives of the class. Good note taking will also help you prepare for the exams and ensure that you have plenty to talk about in class. I will not be grading these notes on content nor turning back any comments on them. Rather, I will be evaluating them on completeness with a simple check-minus, check, check-plus system. The notes need not be typed, spell checked, or even in complete sentences. If you are photocopying hand written notes, there are a number of copy machines around the university (e.g. in the library) and copies are inexpensive.

# INTELLIGENCE ESTIMATE Due March 27

You will prepare a brief in the style of an intelligence estimate on a particular area/issue in national security from a particular perspective. Your goal in this project is to identify, explain, and assess a current national security challenge. While the areas/issues and perspectives will be assigned, you may express a preference and I will accommodate it if possible. The three basic perspectives are: (1) State Department (diplomatic), (2) Defense Department (military), and (3) White House (general, but with attention to domestic pressures). You may also request a particular issue/area that interests you. The options are as follows. Areas: (1) Iran, (2) Saudi Arabia, (3) China, (4) Taiwan, (5) Ivory Coast, (6) Russia; Issues: (1) nuclear weapons, (2) biological weapons, (3) counterterrorism, (4) intervention in ethnic conflicts, (5) intelligence gathering and operations, (6) conventional warfare.

Specific instructions will be given when the perspectives and issues/areas are assigned. However, the intelligence estimates will be between 10 and 12 pages long and include a

minimum of 20 cited sources. The bibliography does not count towards page length. I will supply a basic template for the IE, we will discuss the project in class, and you may view actual declassified IEs through the link on the course's Carmen site.

To complete the project **you will need to conduct library research.** Library sources include relevant books, professional journal articles, policy magazines, major newspapers, and original government documents. See the Reference desk in the Davis Library for assistance. A bibliography must be included with the intelligence estimate. The bibliography is not counted as a part of the project length requirement. Internet sources can be used to compliment your research, providing you include the appropriate URLs in your bibliography, but at least 10 non-internet sources are required. When using internet sources, students must also make an effort to demonstrate that the sources are credible and one internet source only counts as 0.5 sources. While you are welcome to cite the required reading for the course, no citations of course material count toward the required number of citations.

Note: it is expected that this project represents original work not previously or simultaneously handed in for credit in another course, unless this is done with the prior approval of all professors involved.

#### EXAMS

Both the midterm and the final exams will be in-class exams with short-essay and essay formats. Performance will be assessed by your ability to provide complete factual answers as well as to analyze the facts, cite examples, and argue your position convincingly. A list of possible questions will precede each exam. As such, expectations will be high. Only answers that exceed these expectations will be evaluated as excellent. The final exam will be cumulative. Missing either exam will result in a score of zero. Makeup exams will not be provided without proper documentation, and if at all possible the student must notify the instructor of the conflict before the scheduled exam takes place.

The Honor Code is in effect in this class and all others at the University. I am committed to treating Honor Code violations seriously and urge all students to become familiar with its terms set out at . If you have questions, it is your responsibility to ask me about the Code's application. All exams, written work, and other projects must be submitted with a statement that you have complied with the requirements of the Honor Code in all aspects of the submitted work.

For B grades I require assignments and exams to be comprehensively satisfactory, not just essentially correct, and I reserve A grades for truly outstanding work that goes beyond the requirements. Substantive challenges to grades on projects and the midterm may be submitted to me in writing, with the provision that I reserve the right to regrade an entire assignment or exam. The grade received on any regraded assignments or exams will be final regardless of whether that grade is higher or lower than the original grade.

**Curriculum Map:** How and at what level do program courses facilitate student attainment of program learning goals?

#### **Program Learning Goals:**

**Political science** is the study of public power: its mobilization, exercise, and transformation by governments, political parties, interest groups, and mass behavior. Political scientists examine the causes and effects of political power and institutions in decision-making and governance at various levels, from the local to the global. We employ both scientific and humanistic perspectives and a variety of methodological approaches to analyze political structures and processes in all regions of the world.

Majors in political science are expected to:

- 1. Acquire basic knowledge across the four major fields of political science—American Politics, Comparative Politics, International Relations, and Political Theory.
  - Students accomplish this goal by taking introductory and "pre-major" classes at the 1000 through 3000 level.
- 2. Gain deeper knowledge of the scholarly literature in one of the four major fields.
  - Students accomplish this goal primarily in courses at the 4000 and 5000 level, although 2000- and 3000-level courses may also contribute to this knowledge base.
- 3. Become familiar with debates about theories, research methods, and substantive issues, and learn to engage and assess contributions to the literature.
  - Students accomplish this goal primarily in courses at the 4000 and 5000 level, although 3000-level courses may also contribute to this knowledge base.
- 4. *Develop analytic and critical thinking skills* that will enable them to rigorously evaluate competing arguments and to appraise value-based claims.
  - Students accomplish this goal primarily in courses at the 4000 and 5000 level, although 1000-, 2000- and 3000-level courses may also contribute to this knowledge base.

Political science majors will acquire a knowledge foundation and an array of skills enabling them to pursue a wide variety of professional and leadership roles and to become responsible and well-informed

citizens. We prepare our students for post-graduate studies in numerous areas including public policy, international affairs, law, business, and political science. Our department's challenging and supportive learning environment gives students the confidence to assume progressively greater initiative and independence through their undergraduate years and beyond.

The charts below provide graphic information showing the relationship of our primary undergraduate major requirements [the field distribution and focus area] and courses, both in general and individually, to our Program Learning Goals.
