# History 3706 - Coca-Cola Globalization: The History of American Business and Global Environmental Change, 1800-Today

## **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This 3000-level undergraduate course offers an introduction to the fields of environmental history and business history. Coca-Cola Globalization is organized chronologically, beginning with the industrial revolution of the early nineteenth century and ending in the twenty-first century. It chronicles the rise of some of America's biggest multinational corporations and examines how these firms, working with governments and other institutions, shaped global ecological change between 1800 and 2016. It also considers the social and political responses to these environmental changes.

The questions we will ask in this course are not simple, and they will require us to re-imagine well-told stories from a new, ecological perspective. How did Coca-Cola acquire the natural resources it needed to end up all over the world? Can history tell us whether global climate change is real? Are Californians going to run out of water? We will deal with these and other intriguing questions as we explore the history of America in the world through the lens of environmental history.

# This course fulfills the Historical Study and Diversity: Social Diversity in the United States GE credits.

# **Historical Study**

#### Goals

Students recognize how past events are studied and how they influence today's society and the human condition.

#### **Expected Learning Outcomes**

- 1. Students construct an integrated perspective on history and the factors that shape human activity.
- 2. Students describe and analyze the origins and nature of contemporary issues.
- 3. Students speak and write critically about primary and secondary historical sources by examining diverse interpretations of past events and ideas in their historical contexts.

# **Rationale for fulfilling the GE Learning Outcomes for Historical Study:**

Goals of the course that fulfill the GE Learning Outcomes in Historical Study: History courses develop students' knowledge of how past events influence today's society and help them understand how humans view themselves through the following ways:

1. Critically examine theories of history, and historical methodologies

• In this course students will watch films and read secondary and primary sources in business and environmental history. We will survey recent historiographical trends designed to bring these two fields together. We will also analyze how historical knowledge is generated and investigate methodologies environmental historians deploy to better understand the past (including utilization of new scientific technologies relevant to climate change and other major ecological concerns).

2. Engage with contemporary and historical debates on specific regions, time periods and themes of the human past.

• Students will investigate major contests and debates in American environmental history and analyze how those debates were resolved over time. Tackling issues of present-day importance, such as climate change, water resource scarcity, and sustainable energy development, the course will force students to consider how the past could be used to help solve some of the most pressing environmental concerns of our time. It will also help students interested in business think about how they might develop sustainable enterprises in the future.

3. Through reading in primary and secondary sources and in-depth class discussion, students will access and critically examine social, political, economic, military, gender, religious, ecological, and ethnic/racial/national movements in a wider socio-cultural context.

• This course is global in scope, examining how American firms embedded themselves in different social, political, economic, military, and ecological environments around the world. Students will analyze how firms adapted to local environments when expanding overseas. Students will also assess the degree to which American businesses alleviated or exacerbated social, racial, and gender inequalities through their international operations.

4. Students will carry out in-depth analysis in a final paper comparing distinct historical moments, social movements and their effects

• Each student will be required to complete a graph and paper detailing the environmental history of a firm operating in Columbus, Ohio. This data will be added to the Columbus Environmental Digital (CED) project, a digital map designed to increase public awareness about the environmental footprint of firm's operating in the Columbus area.

# Diversity: Social Diversity in the United States

# Goals

Students understand the pluralistic nature of institutions, society, and culture in the United States and across the world in order to become educated, productive, and principled citizens.

# **Expected Learning Outcomes**

- 1. Students describe and evaluate the roles of such categories as race, gender and sexuality, disability, class, ethnicity, and religion in the pluralistic institutions and cultures of the United States.
  - Students will tackle questions of environmental justice in this course, considering the ways in which different ethnic, gender, and racial groups interact with the ecological world and how these groups develop differing approaches to pressing issues, such as global climate change.
- 2. Students recognize the role of social diversity in shaping their own attitudes and values regarding appreciation, tolerance, and equality of others.

• The Columbus Environmental Digital (CED) project will offer students a chance to see how their exposure to environmental pollutants and access to environmental resources might differ from people of different racial, ethnic, and gender groups living in the Columbus community.

# **GRADES:**

# Your grade in this course will be broken down as follows: **participation (20%)**, **Columbus Environmental Digital (CED) Project (20%)**, **Op-Ed (20%)**, **exams (40% total)**.

- 1. Participation (20%)
- Students are required to email me **one question** related to the readings by **midnight** the evening before we meet (you can find my email on the syllabus). Each question should be roughly a paragraph (no more than 250 words each) and should relate to some critical theme addressed in the readings for that day.
- **ATTENDANCE POLICY:** Each student will be allowed one free absence from meetings without penalty. Any additional absences will be reflected in your participation grade. Any student that misses **more than four classes without an excuse will fail the course.**
- Your participation grade is a composite of your attendance, in-class contributions, and preclass questions. If you have a conflict with a particular date, please talk with me at least two weeks before class so we can discuss a supplemental assignment.
- I reserve the right to implement **pop quizzes** if I find that students are failing to do the readings. These quiz performances will be reflected in your participation grade.

# 2. Columbus Environmental Digital (CED) Project (20%)

- Students will identify a Columbus business in town to research.
- Students must pick a business from the list below.
- Each student will be assigned to a business and will investigate the air or water pollution/toxic chemicals generated by that firm over time.
- Each student will then **generate a graph** that shows changes in air or water pollution/toxic chemicals released over time. A detailed explanation of how to generate such a graph will be described in a handout given out the first week of class. You may choose one chemical to examine or you may compare different chemical releases.
- Investigations of firms will likely require contacting the EPA so that you will have a sound understanding of the data presented online.
- Each student will then craft a **1,000-word summary** to explain the data presented in the graph and the environmental history of their firm. This explanation must include a detailed summary of basic facts about the chemicals featured in the graph as well as a detailed history of when the business came to Columbus, what its local and global economic impact has been, and how it has changed over time.
- Each student will also take a **picture** of the business that they are interested in studying. You MUST take your own picture, as we will need you to sign away rights to the image so that it can be used on the website.
  - FIRST DRAFT OF GRAPH, IMAGE, and SUMMARY STATEMENT DUE: TBA by 11:59 PM (10% of grade). Submit summary statement to Turnitin on Canvas. Email graph and picture.
  - FINAL Draft DUE TBA by 11:59 PM (10% of grade). Submit summary statement to Turnitin on CanvasCanvas. Email graph and picture.
  - Students must choose their firm by TBA. First come first serve. Pick your topic early.

#### 3. Op-Ed (20%)

- **a.** Students in the course will write a **500-word op-ed** about their business (or another business on the TED website if they choose). Your op-ed should be a publishable piece that explains the following:
  - i. The history of how your business came to town.
  - **ii.** Some aspect of its environmental history that you think the public should know about.
- **b.** We will have several in-class discussions about how to write this kind of op-ed, and students will submit a rough draft so you can get constructive feedback before submitting your final piece.
- c. Papers should be 12-point Times New Roman Font.
- d. Papers will be docked a half-letter grade per day (ex A to A-).
  - i. FIRST DRAFT DUE TBA by 11:59 PM (10% of grade). Submit op-ed to Turnitin on Canvas. Email graph and picture.
  - ii. FINAL DRAFT DUE TBA by 11:59 PM (10% of grade). Submit op-ed to Turnitin on Canvas. Email graph and picture.
- e. The last week of class, we will vote on the top three op-eds, which I will then recommend for submission to a major news outlet.
- 4. Exams (45%)
- There will be **two exams** throughout the course of the semester. These exams will include multiple choice, identifications, and an essay question drawn from the course readings.

# Week 2: What is Environmental History? What is Business History? Tuesday

In this session we will cull through a short 3-page article by Jared Diamond that will get us primed to discuss what environmental history is all about. His central question is this: why did people of European descent end up conquering the world? I will also have you read Chapter 2 of our textbook, Ted Steinberg's *Down to Earth*, to give you more context for our conversation.

**Required Reading:** Three-page excerpt from Jared Diamond's *Guns, Germs, and Steel* (Reading posted on Canvas); Read also Chapter 2 in Ted Steinberg's *Down to Earth: Nature's Role In American History* (required text available at bookstore),

#### Thursday

As we continue our introductory discussions, I'll talk a little bit about what it's like to write environmental history, offering you a glimpse into my brand new book, *Citizen Coke: The Making of Coca-Cola Capitalism*. Since we'll be talking mostly about American businesses and their impact on the environment, it seems smart to start with one of the biggest companies in the world: Coca-Cola. We'll talk about the craft of writing within the subfields of business and environmental history. Feel free to tear it to shreds!

*Required Reading:* Short chapter from my book, *Citizen Coke: The Making of Coca-Cola Capitalism* (Reading posted on Canvas).

# Week 3: Railroads and the American Environment: The First Big Businesses Make Their Mark Tuesday

Perhaps no technology was more important in reshaping the American landscape—and thereby the global economy—than the railroad. In this class, we'll talk about the environmental history of the iron horse. *Required Reading:* Ted Steinberg's *Down to Earth* (required text available at bookstore), Chapter 8, The Unforgiving West, 116-135.

## Thursday

The iron horse unleashed the forces of big business in the late-nineteenth century. We'll talk about the growth of one business, the Coca-Cola Company, which used the railroads to establish a national empire in the 1880s and 1890s

Required Reading: Selections from Mark Pendergrast's For God, Country, and Coca-Cola.

### Week 4: Ecological Costs of the Industrial Revolution Inspire a Conservation Movement, 1860-1916 Tuesday

Changes wrought by industrial titans in the first half of the nineteenth century inspired a conservation movement in the United States. In this class, we'll talk about the birth of that movement as well as the creation of the world's first national parks.

*Required Reading*: Ted Steinberg's *Down to Earth* (required text available at bookstore), Chapter 9, Conservation Reconsidered, 136-154.

## Thursday

As we continue our conversation about conservation, we will get to know one of the first great environmental preservations in the United States: John Muir. We will watch portions of Ken Burn's *National Parks* as well to learn more about Muir's relationship to Pinchot and Progressive conservationists.

Required Reading: Short readings from John Muir's writings.

# Week 5: A Progressive Nation and Banana Republics: Urban Environments and Transnational Food Systems, 1900-1920

#### Tuesday

This week we're going to learn a lot about United Fruit and the international banana industry. This industry really highlights key aspects of Gilded Age and Progressive era business and the international ecological footprint of America's expanding economic empire.

Required Reading: Selected readings from Dan Koeppel Banana: The Fate of the Fruit that Changed the World

# Thursday

In this class, we're going bananas again. By that I mean we're going to continue our discussion of the history of United Fruit and other transnational companies that made the banana commonplace in America during the Progressive Era. We'll also talk more broadly about the emergence of packaged foods and consumer concerns about food adulteration.

**Required Reading:** Selected readings from Dan Koeppel *Banana: The Fate of the Fruit that Changed the World.* **Required Listening:** Listen to an NPR interview with Dan Koeppel, author of *Banana: The Fate of the Fruit that Changed the World.* 

#### Week 6: The Middle of the Nation Turns to Dust: Agribusiness in America, 1900-1939 Tuesday

The development of large-scale agribusiness in the American West had profound effects on American ecology. We'll talk about the agricultural buildup in the early 1900s in this class. *Required Reading:* Ted Steinberg, *Down to Earth*, Chapter 11: Moveable Feast, 173-186.

# Thursday

We'll talk about one of the nation's worst environmental disasters in this class: The Dust Bowl.

## WEEK 7: Damnation:

#### Tuesday

In the wake of the Dust Bowl, the government sought to ramp up irrigation projects in the American West. We'll talk about the rise of damming initiatives in the United States after the 1930s and the emergence of cities like Phoenix and LA as we ponder what history can tell us about the future sustainability of an arid West.

**Required Reading:** Read short selection on dams from Jeff Crane's *The Environment in American History* (On Canvas); Watch selection of *Cadillac Desert* on Canvas.

#### Thursday

We now live in an age when dams are being demolished and this will have profound affects on the way we do business in America today. We'll talk about this historical moment as we watch the documentary called *Damnation*.

No reading: Prepare for exam next week.

#### Week 8: War and Nature: World War II and the Boom for America's Chemical Companies Tuesday, October 6 MIDTERM

#### Thursday, October 8th

Technologies developed during World War II would have long-lasting effects on natural environments at home and abroad. We'll talk about how chemicals produced by Dupont and Monsanto Chemical Company deployed overseas during wartime were brought back home in the 1940s. *Required Reading:* Selections from Ed Russell's *War and Nature* (on Canvas)

# Week 9: AutoNation: The Environmental Footprint of the Automobile Industry, 1950-Today Tuesday

As we continue our discussion about war and nature, we'll talk about how the Cold War bred a radically new technology that transformed the American landscape: the interstate highway system. This will allow us to then talk about the birth of the fast food industry in our next class.

Required Reading: Steinberg, Down to Earth, Chapter 13, "America in Black and Green," 203-224.

#### Thursday

All those cars needed lots of fuel. In this class we'll talk about the oil industry and the environmental costs of burning fossil fuels in car engines.

Required Reading: Selections from J. R. McNeill's Something New Under the Sun.

# Week 9: The Green Revolution: Exporting American Agribusiness Abroad

# Tuesday

Believing that exporting American agribusiness techniques overseas was the only way to solve world hunger, businesses and NGOs, working with US scientists, exported American agricultural practices overseas in the 1960s and 1970s. We will talk about this Green Revolution this week.

*Required Viewing:* Ted Steinberg, *Down to Earth*, 274-277: Read Norman Borlaug's Nobel Prize speech (on Canvas).

#### Week 11: Monsanto and the Birth of GMOs, 1980s-1990s.

#### Tuesday

This week we will talk about the emergence of genetically-modified organisms (GMOs) in the 1980s and 1990s. Are they a good thing? Are they bad for the global environment and/or our health? *Required Reading:* Selections from Marie-Monique Robin's *The World According to Monsanto* (available on Canvas).

#### Thursday

#### Week 12: Blue Gold: Water Wars Overseas

Conflicts over water are becoming increasingly common worldwide. This week we'll talk about these crises. We'll start by looking at one company, the Coca-Cola Company, and tracing out the history of its efforts to gain access to blue gold in some of the most arid regions of the world. *Required Reading: Citizen Coke*, Chapter 6, Water From Abroad (available on Canvas).

#### Thursday

Coca-Cola isn't the only business making big money selling water. We'll expand our investigative lens in this class and watch how big companies, such as Suez, sought to take over public water supplies in *Last Call at the Oasis*

# Week 13: Global Climate Change

#### Tuesday

We'll discuss global climate change, starting with Naomi Klein's introductory chapter in *This Changes Everything*.

#### Thursday

- 1. Students describe and evaluate the roles of such categories as race, gender and sexuality, disability, class, ethnicity, and religion in the pluralistic institutions and cultures of the United States.
- 2. Students recognize the role of social diversity in shaping their own attitudes and values regarding appreciation, tolerance, and equality of others.

Goals of the course that fulfill the GE Learning Outcomes: Students will achieve the social diversity goals and learning outcomes by

- 1. Completing readings, attending lectures, and participating in class discussions and in-class assignments that will help students understand how the categories of race, gender, class, ethnicity, religion, and nation have shaped peoples' identities and the distribution of power and resources in the U.S. and elsewhere
- 2. Describe theories of racial, ethnic, class, national, gender, and religious formation on exams and written assignments.
- 3. Critically examine theories of race, gender, class, ethnicity, religion, and nation
- 4. Engage with contemporary and historical debates on race, gender, class, ethnicity, religion, and nation.
- 5. Access and critically examine movements framed by race, gender, class, ethnicity, religion, and/or nation in a wider socio-cultural context.
- 6. Carry out in-depth analysis in a final paper, exam, or project comparing distinct moments of ethnic, racial, nationalist, gender, class, and/or religious mobilization or social movements and their effects.

3. Both the GE and course-specific learning objectives for History courses requesting Diversity: Global Studies might be summarized as follows:

#### **Global Studies GE Requirements: Goals:**

Courses in Diversity – Global Studies will foster students' understanding of the pluralistic nature of institutions, society, and culture across the world in order to become educated, productive, and principled citizens.

#### **Expected Learning Outcomes:**

1. Students understand some of the political, economic, cultural, physical, social, and philosophical aspects of one or more of the world's nations, peoples and cultures outside the U.S.

2. Students recognize the role of national and international diversity in shaping their own attitudes and values as global citizens.

Goals of the course that fulfill the GE Learning Outcomes: Students will achieve the social diversity goals and learning outcomes by

- 1. Through reading in primary and secondary sources and in-depth class discussion, students critically examine the political, economic, social, cultural and philosophical development in the World.
- 2. Engage with contemporary and historical debates on the differences and similarities between cultures and peoples.
- 3. Access and critically examine ethnically, nationally or religiously framed movements in a wider socio-cultural and global context.
- 4. Carry out in-depth analysis in a final paper, exam, or project comparing distinct moments in human history and how they shaped the world in the past and today.
- 5. Completing readings, attending lectures, and participating in class discussions and in-class assignments that will help students understand the complexity of debates over international issues. They will describe theories of international issues on exams and written assignments.
- 6. Students will understand the roots and structures of today's globalized world.

# II. Methods

An assessment of whether these objectives are met is effectively carried out by an examination of the work students are actually required to do for the course. Contributions in class discussions will be considered, but weighted more lightly, given the tendency for more confident students to contribute more to such discussions. Paper and exams will provide an understanding of students' abilities to think historically and to engage in analysis. This can be gauged by their responses to specific exam questions—asking

students to provide a perspective on history and relate that perspective to an understanding of the factors that shape human activity. Thus, exams for Historical Study courses will have at least one question that requires students to provide a perspective on the factors that shaped an event or theory. Similarly, for courses that include Diversity in the U.S. GE requirements, we will have at least one question that requires students to provide a description of the roles of categories such as race, gender, class, ethnicity and religion and how those roles have helped shape either their perspective or the country's perspective on diversity. For courses that include Diversity: Global Studies, we will ask one question that requires students to provide an understanding of some combination of political, economic, cultural, physical, social, and philosophical differences in or among the world's nations, peoples and cultures outside the U.S. In this way, we hope to measure the courses (and the students') progress toward the multiple objectives of the GE. In this way we should be able to ascertain whether they are acquiring the desired skills and not simply learning (and regurgitating) specific information.

#### Summary of Data:

A committee, appointed by the UTC Chair, will be asked to evaluate a sample of questions and papers, and to gauge how well the goals of the course seem reflected in them. Assessment of Historical Study, Social Diversity, and Diversity: Global Issues from the GE goals will be carried out primarily through the evaluation of formal graded assignments and ungraded in-class assignments. The committee will rank the assignments across a four-category scale that captures students' mastery of the GE goals. Students will complete an informal feedback survey halfway through the semester to assess their own performance, the pace of the class, and the instructor's effectiveness. A brief summary report will be written by the UTC Chair, and that, as well as the sampled questions themselves, will be made available to the instructor and to the Chair of the department. We intend to insure that the proposed courses adequately articulate these goals, teach toward them, test for them, and help students realize their individual potential to meet them. Assessments will be summarized and used to alter the course for the next teaching.

Hi, Chris,

I polled the NMS and SBS departments which might have an interest in the content of History 3706, especially in terms of the subject of environment. None of the departments objected, so I am happy to concur with the offering of the course on behalf of ASC's Biological Sciences, Mathematical & Physical Sciences, and Social & Behavioral Sciences.

You may find some of the comments I received useful:

- The syllabus seems to treat "environmental" and "ecological" (or "environment" and "ecology") as synonyms, which they are not. We strongly encourage the instructor to carefully define and use each of these terms correctly, in their scientific senses, or be sure to clarify to the students if/when he means "human environment" and "human ecology", rather than environment and ecology in the broader natural sense.
- It is not clear why Thursday of Week 15 includes any discussion of firms in Tuscaloosa, rather than Columbus -- particularly since the student assignments specifies that student research contributes to the Columbus Environmental Digital Project.
- Given that Pomerene Hall is now a pile of rubble, the address for the Office of Disability Services must be different than what's shown on the syllabus. I don't know if the phone numbers have changed, too, but the proposer make sure that accurate contact information is listed.
- I think a course such as this should have economics as a prerequisite. How can they teach about business if the students do not know the principles of economics? I would [suggest] that students have either Econ 2001.01 (2001.02, 2001.03) or Econ 2002.01 (2002.02, 2002.03) as a prerequisite.
