Course Description:

This is a course for Graduate Teaching Associates (GTAs) who teach a 1000-level German language class independently in the Department of Germanic Languages and Literatures. The goal of the Teaching Practicum is to facilitate the development of a solid foundation in teaching skills and practices for German and for GTAs to acquire an understanding of the challenges involved in teaching and learning college-level German. The class meets weekly, during which teaching materials, lesson plans, and class- and teaching-related concerns and experiences are discussed.

Required texts: No required texts. Instructional materials will be available on CARMEN.

Activities and assignments:

- GTAs practice creating lessons for their teaching and discuss best practices in planning a lesson for class, designing and developing speaking, listening, writing, and reading tasks for German 1101, 1102, and 1103
- GTAs develop and implement instructional materials. Each week GTAs, together with a partner, develop an activity that focuses on one of the learning aspects (such as grammar, vocabulary, listening, speaking, writing or culture; warm-up and cool-down activities) and share it with the class members for feedback. In the following week, class members will report on the implementation of the activity.
- For each class meeting, GTAs present teaching-related topics for discussion. For example, how to deal with a problem student; how to best grade a particular assignment; how to best quiz specific item, or how to teach specific cultural topic using authentic materials.
- GTAs receive instructions on best practices in designing chapter tests, quizzes, and final exams
- GTAs participate in developing, implementing, and improving speaking assessment materials.
- GTAs are provided with appropriate training to facilitate consistent practices in grading homework, class participation, chapter tests, and speaking assessment across sections of the same class.
- Students visit and evaluate each other's teaching and provide constructive feedback to help each other improve and strengthen their teaching skills.
- Students write an end-of-the-semester reflection on their progression and development as a teacher

Course evaluation

- Effective engagement with teaching materials

- Diligent involvement in creation and development of pedagogically sound activities and various test and quiz components
- End of semester reflection on their own progression and development as a teacher
