GE Education Abroad Course

Goals:

 By living and studying outside the United States, students acquire and develop a breadth of knowledge, skills, and perspectives across national boundaries that will help them become more globally aware.

Expected Learning Outcomes:

- Students recognize and describe similarities, differences, and interconnections between their host country and the United States.
- Students function effectively within their host country.
- Students articulate how their time abroad has enriched their academic experience.

Specific Goals and Learning Outcomes for this course:

- Students recognize and describe similarities, differences, and interconnections between England and the US by analyzing course materials, participating in class discussions, and creating an online research project using the u.osu.edu platform.
- Students function effectively outside the United States by living and studying in Liverpool and by traveling independently both to and from and within Liverpool.
- Students articulate how their time abroad has enriched their academic experience by documenting and reflecting upon their experiences in Liverpool through journals, blogs and group discussions.
- Students will gain a basic knowledge of English history, politics and culture.
- Students will develop critical thinking skills by analyzing course materials and through field experiences.
- Students will develop research skills, including information and digital literacy, by conceiving and developing original research projects to be presented using the u.osu.edu platform.
- Students will develop communications skills through journals, blog posts, class discussions and collective sharing of their overseas experience.

Course description:

This interdisciplinary course introduces students to the history, politics, literature and culture of Liverpool, England. This particular iteration of the course will examine Liverpool as a microcosm of the past three centuries of British history as a whole, examining its role as a major participant in the 18th century slave trade, its colorful immigration history, and its recent transformation from a blighted 20th century industrial city roiled by labor disputes and riots into a European Capital of Culture in 2008. It will also, however, give students the opportunity to visit sites in the area around Liverpool, such as Conwy Castle in North Wales and Manchester, England second largest city, in order to foster an appreciation of Liverpool in its immediate geographical context. Students will be encouraged to attend local festivals and events and to perform academic research, with on-site instruction from subject librarians, in the extensive special collections of the University of Liverpool.

In the process of learning about and directly experiencing Liverpool's rich cultural heritage, students will be encouraged to think critically about connections between Britain's past, its present and its perceptions of the future and to reflect on what their new understanding of a foreign city can teach them about the United States and its position in the world.

Course Requirements and Grades:

• Class Participation: 15%

Students are expected to attend all classes. This course will include both lecture and discussion. To receive a high participation grade, students are expected to have read and be prepared to discuss all readings thoughtfully with their fellow students.

• Research project: 40% [5% research proposal, 10% oral presentation, 25% website]

Students must submit a research proposal by the end of the first week, which will be revised with feedback from the instructors before departure for Liverpool. Each student will be responsible for giving a short oral presentation about the topic upon return to the US. The final website must be completed and submitted for assessment by July 28.

• Reflection paper: 15%

Students must submit a 4 page minimum (double-spaced) reflection paper in which they address the following questions:

- 1. Describe the most striking similarities, differences and interconnections you have encountered between Britain and the United States. What do they reveal about these two countries?
- 2. Explain how you've developed an ability to function effectively in Britain and what obstacles you've faced in the realms of verbal and non-verbal communication.
- 3. Overall, has this course enriched your academic experience? If so, how? Use concrete examples.

The reflection paper is due in the Carmen drop box by July 15.

• Journal and blog post: 30% [20% journal entries; 10% blog post]

Students will reflect on

- a) the assigned readings
- b) on what intrigued, puzzled, irritated and delighted them about life, people and things in Liverpool

Journals entries will consist of one entry per week of 150-200 words. For blog posts, students will choose from a list of topics and post photos, videos and written reflections (1 post per week) based on their experiences.

Grading Scale:

Grades will be calculated according to the standard OSU scale.

Course policies:

Course Structure:

This course will have two major components:

• Total lecture and discussion sessions in Newark and in Liverpool: 14, for a total of 25.5 hours with each session averaging 2.5 hours.

 In Liverpool, potential activities include guided tours of the city and the Wirral peninsula; ferry tour of the Mersey river; visits to museums and local sites of interest, including Conwy Castle; required attendance at cultural events; instruction in research practices at the University of Liverpool; lectures or discussion sessions with native students; scavenger hunt to learn geography of the city; journaling; debriefing sessions; free time for students.

Tentative Schedule (Summer 2016)

Class sessions will be held on weekdays in weeks 1, 2, 5 and 6 for a total of 21.5 structured class hours pre- and post-travel. Students will also have hours of structured class time in Liverpool for discussion and reflection (for a total of 4 hours of formal instruction). The remaining 1 credit will be earned with a total of 3 hours of excursions and field trips, organized by the instructor and required of students, in Liverpool and the surrounding area.

GE assessment plan

The reflection papers will be used to assess the degree to which students have achieved the GE learning objectives of recognizing similarities, differences and interconnections among host and home countries; functioning abroad effectively; and articulating how their time abroad has enriched their academic experiences. I intend to sue the standard rubric being developed to review this assignment for assessment purposes. I will also give the students a pre- and post-travel survey and compare their answers to evaluate their ability to compare the two countries and their knowledge of British vs. U.S. history and culture. If students do now show a significant increase in their ability to compare the two countries and knowledge of British history and culture, I will revise the syllabus, potentially including more or different readings, lectures, discussions or excursions. Because several faculty members will provide the pre-travel lectures, I will share the results of these assessments and work with them to revise their portions of the course as necessary. I also intend to ask students to fill out a discursive evaluation of the course that will help me determine what areas in my own, or those of my colleagues, teaching style need improvement. For example, I will ask students to evaluate how well the pre-travel lectures prepared them to understand and interpret what they observed in-country. I would expect students to answer 90% of the questions on the post-travel survey successfully, but only perhaps 20% on the pre-travel survey. I will share the information I gather on student success with the colleagues coteaching the class, and since we plan to rotate leading the course abroad, I will work closely with the subsequent year's leader to evaluate the effectiveness of the planned activities in-country to supplement and connect to the readings and lectures. The data will be archived by the associate dean for study abroad on our campus and will be made available to the Office of International Affairs and others as necessary or requested.
