Pre-requisite: Instructor permission (permission will only be given to graduate students in the clinical psychology Ph.D. program).

Goals:

- Gain an understanding of and ability to apply ethical principles and legal statutes in the practice of clinical psychology
 - Topics include confidentiality, multiple relationships, informed consent, and reporting obligations
 - o Learn about models for ethical decision making and apply these models to real-life situations
- Gain familiarity with and practice using general therapy skills
 - Develop skills to enhance rapport building, reflective listening, termination planning
- Learn to apply interventions associated with empirically supported treatments for a range of psychological disorders
 - Gain facility with common interventions such as cognitive restructuring, behavioral activation, exposure, chain analysis, problem solving, and assertiveness training
- Receive basic training in diagnostic assessment
 - o Learn to administer the SCID-5
 - Learn DSM-5 diagnostic criteria and apply knowledge to inform differential diagnoses
- Enhance understanding of the role of diversity factors in clinical psychology practice
 - o Gain knowledge of theoretical and empirical findings related to addressing diversity
 - Begin to consider how therapists' personal/cultural histories impact interactions with patients from diverse backgrounds
- Introduce concepts relevant to professional development for psychological trainees
 - Learn about professional obligations regarding documentation, manner of interacting with staff/clients, self-awareness
- Introduce concepts relevant to supervision and consultation as a psychologist
 - Understand models of supervision and supervisory practices
 - Learn about the role of other disciplines (e.g. psychiatry, social work) in treating patients, and psychology's role in collaborating with other professionals
- Learn how to respond to emergency situations
 - o Suicide assessment, threatening behavior

Assessments, Due Dates, and Grading Scale:

Your understanding of important concepts and demonstration of key skills will be assessed in the following ways:

- (1) Ethics Presentations: 25% of final grade
 - Students will present information on a topic related to ethics; topics will be assigned during the 1st class meeting. Presentations will be assessed based on quality and comprehensiveness.
 - Due dates for presentations are as follows:
 - i. Positive Ethics, Foundations of Ethical Behavior, Ethical Decision Making: 5/16
 - ii. Competence, Multiple Relationships, Boundaries: 5/23
 - iii. Confidentiality, Record Keeping, Reporting Duties: 5/25
 - iv. Ethics in Assessment and Therapy: 5/30
 - Presentations are your chance to develop expertise on a particular area of ethics in clinical
 practice, and share that expertise with the group. As such, presentations should include a
 summary of important information related to your topic from the textbook, the APA ethics
 code, and Ohio laws governing the practice of psychology. You can also seek additional
 information (from other books, journal articles, discussions) as needed. Presentations should
 include discussion questions and/or relevant activities to help your colleagues understand and
 apply important concepts. Presentations should be about 45 minutes in length.
- (2) Ethics/Supervision/Consultation/Diversity Exam: 15% of final grade
 - A multiple-choice exam on topics related to ethics, supervision, consultation, and diversity factors will be given on 6/13.
- (3) In-class role plays: 25% of final grade
 - Students will demonstrate therapy skills, such as reflective listening, cognitive restructuring, and activity planning, during in-class role plays. The instructor will provide feedback based on these role-plays, assessing for facility with clinical skills.
 - In-class role plays will be conducted in class meetings from 6/15 to 7/27
- (4) Mock therapy session: 35% of final grade
 - At the conclusion of the course, students will conduct and video-record a mock therapy session with a student volunteer in which they will demonstrate relevant clinical skills. The instructor will rate students' performance of relevant clinical skills during this mock therapy session.
 - Mock therapy sessions will be conducted during finals week, from 7/31 8/2
