Course Description

Every human voice is unique. This uniqueness allows us to recognize the voices of our friends and family members over the phone, as well as the voices of famous actors and politicians on the radio, in voice-overs, and in animated television and film. In this class, we will explore the acoustic properties of the human voice, including what makes voices unique, with the goal of understanding what makes the voices of ourselves, our friends and family, and famous actors and politicians distinctive, memorable, and recognizable. Our investigation of these questions will involve reading and discussion in basic acoustic-phonetics (i.e., the study of human speech sounds), in-class acoustic analysis of real speech samples produced by famous voices, and takehome acoustic analysis of the students' own speech. The famous voices discussed in class will be identified by the students, providing students with the opportunity to learn more about the voices that they find especially distinctive or recognizable.

Course Components

Reading Assignments: Reading assignments are listed on the weekly schedule below. Chapter numbers refer to chapters in the required textbook. Each reading will have an associated Carmen discussion board for questions. Class meetings on days when reading assignments are due will be devoted to discussion of the assigned reading. You are therefore expected to read the assigned reading in preparation for those class meetings, to post at least one thoughtful question about the reading to the Carmen discussion board by 11:59pm on the day before class, and to bring a copy of the reading (hard or electronic) to class to refer to during the discussion.

Famous Voice Assignments: Famous voice assignments are listed on the weekly schedule below. For each voice assignment, you will be asked to find a recording of a famous voice that illustrates the current topic. Class meetings on days when famous voice assignments are due will be devoted to acoustic analysis of the voices you submit. You are therefore expected to upload your recording and a brief comment about why the voice fits the topic to the Carmen assignment by 11:59pm on the day before class.

Speech Analysis Assignments: Speech analysis assignments are listed on the weekly schedule below. For each speech analysis assignment, you will be asked to make a recording of your own speech, conduct an acoustic analysis of your recording, and write up a report describing your analysis. Speech analysis assignments are due at the beginning of class on the day they are listed on the schedule.

Class Participation: Students are expected to attend class and to actively participate in reading assignment discussions and in-class hands-on acoustic analysis activities.
