1. Discussion Board Posts, Attendace and Participation:

The instructor will arrange a trip to a Somali restaurant to practice the language of food in Somali. Every effort will be made to select a date that works for all.

3. Midterm Exam:

There will be a written and oral exam mid-way through the semester. The midterm written exam will be a review of your progress and ability to write basic expressions in Somali. The oral section will assess your ability to comprehend and respond to simple Somali expressions.

4. Final Exam:

The exam will be a comprehensive review of the course material. A written exam will be given at the end of the semester during exam week. The oral final exam will be in the form of class presentation in Somali using concepts learned throughout the semester. Every student is expected to demonstrate communicative skills in spoken Somali.

I. <u>SUMMARY OF THE ASSESSMENT PLAN</u>

General Education assessment of Somali 1102.2 Online will follow the assessment plan outlined in the Somali 1102 classroom section as previously approved by the curriculum and assessment panel of the College of Arts and Sciences.

These assessments include direct measures to evaluate the degree to which students achieve learning outcomes in two GE areas of developing student skills in communication across culture and national boundaries and by helping students understand other cultures and patterns of thought. The following are the expected learning outcomes by the end of this level II course:

1. Students demonstrate communicative skills (e.g. speaking, listening, reading, and/or writing) in a language other than their native language at level II.

2. Students learn about the cultural contexts and manifestations of the peoples who speak the Somali language.

3. Students recognize and understand differences and similarities between the cultures and communities of the language that they are studying and their own.

To assess Communicative Skills GE, both direct and indirect measures will be employed. A presurvey will be administered to students in Somali 102.02 Online during the first week of classes each term the course is taught. The same survey will be re-administered as a post-survey during the final two weeks of the term to students in this course. Indirect assessment instruments include student discursive evaluations and SEIs.

Assessment of the Social Diversity GE (Level II) will include direct (holistic evaluation of student responses and social interactions in a Somali context) and indirect (student discursive course evaluations and SEIs) measures.

II. SUMMARY OF DATA TO BE COLLECTED

The following data will be collected each term from all sections of Somali 1102.02:

- Communicative skills survey data (one pre- and one post-survey); from this data set, pre- and post-surveys will randomly be selected for assessment
- Class assignment results will be collected and assessed; all assignments will be used for assessment
- Discursive course evaluations will be collected, reviewed, and summarized
- Summary results for SEIs will be collected, reviewed, and summarized.
