# **Course Change Information**

#### What change is being proposed? (If more than one, what changes are being proposed?)

Increase the credit hours for Intermediate Arabic courses (2104, 3105, 4106) from 4 to 5 credits, to reflect the considerable investment of time and work required for Arabic as a Category 5 language on the Foreign Service Institution (FSI) scale. The content covered and weekly pacing of the course will be unchanged.

Also, the course is being re-titled to follow ACTFL language standards for Modern Standard Arabic, which has been recently revised and systematized.

#### What is the rationale for the proposed change(s)?

By providing more instructional time, students will have additional class time to review difficult concepts and practice key skills. At OSU, other Category 5 languages (Cantonese, Mandarin, Japanese, Korean) all require 5 credit hours for 4th, 5th and 6th semester language courses (2102, 4101, and 4102), as we propose for Arabic.

What are the programmatic implications of the proposed change(s)?

This change means that students will take fewer courses toward an Arabic major or minor while the overall credit hours remain similar.

### **I-** Course Approach and Objectives

AR 4106 is the continuation of the previous course AR3105 and will follow the same objectives and methods. This MSA course follows the same communicative and integrated approach to language instruction, which places emphasis on the functional use of language and on communication in context, as opposed to a strictly grammatical, top-down approach. Time in class will be devoted to reinforcing vocabulary and grammar through various interactive drills and activities that will be conducted solely in Arabic. In-class vocabulary and grammar activities will be largely built upon students' prior knowledge of the materials. Memorization of new vocabulary through preparation of the basic text and studying the grammatical notes provided in the textbook will take place outside the classroom. This level concentrates on increasing students' vocabulary and command of syntax, with a higher level of fluency and accuracy.

By the end of this course the student will be able to speak, read, write and listen to Modern Standard Arabic at high intermediate and advanced levels. The student will be exposed to many dialects and become familiar mainly with the Levantine dialect.

Prerequisite: Arabic 3105 or permission of instructor

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Read a range of styles in Arabic, from formal to informal and from journalistic to expository.
- 2. With economic and intelligent use of a dictionary, understand texts of general interest.
- 3. Carry out basic research and understand main ideas in non-technical writing.
- 4. Use context and grammar to identify the form and guess the meaning of unfamiliar words.
- 5. Initiate and sustain discussion on topics of general interest.
- 6. Present information and basic narratives in semiformal language.
- 7. Understand the main points of lectures and media programs on familiar topics.
- 8. Be able to write essays and opinion pieces on topics you have studied.
- 9. Read, write, and speak with increasing grammatical accuracy.
- 10. Identify a range of important figures and ideas in Arabic literary and cultural history.

# III- Course Policies & Requirements

# **<u>1- Attendance and Punctuality</u>**

Attendance is mandatory and it will be taken daily. Both **regular attendance** and the **timely completion of homework assignments** are absolutely essential, as these form the twin pillars which together can assure smooth and consistent progress throughout the course. For this reason, tardiness will not be tolerated. Absences will be excused only in case of emergencies and/or if validated by a written justification. Excused or unexcused, if you know you will be missing a class, please do notify me before the class.

# **2- Daily Preparation and homework**

It is essential that students come **properly prepared** to each and every class by having thoroughly completed all advance work required for each day's lesson (e.g., listening to the vocabulary and basic text on the DVD several times, studying the grammar sections diligently, carefully preparing vocabulary and grammar drills etc.).

Homework: It is extremely important to consider the following guidelines:

Assignments are divided into 2 categories:

- a- Preparation for class.
- b- Assignments for submission.

Both are essential for your success in this class. Homework is posted weekly on Canvas but it is your responsibility to check after class for any update done to the homework schedule. You should also print out the requested handouts as instructed in the schedule for class use. Students should come to class every day **fully prepared** and with all homework assignments **completed**. Expect to spend an average of two hours on learning new material, writing homework, and reviewing every night. When submitting homework:

- 1. Include your name in Arabic, the date, lesson, page and drill number.
- 2. Assignments must be submitted in class and on time or before class if submission is requested on Canvas.
- 3. Assignments could be either typed (font 18, double space) or handwritten (**neatly and clearly**)
- 4. Homework sheets must be stapled together.
- 5. Make sure to skip a line and leave some blank margins for comments on your answers.
- 6. It is important to follow up on comments on your homework. I strongly encourage you to ask me if some comments or suggestions on your homework might be unclear to you.
- 7. You will also be asked to record homework (mp3 files or similar files only. Familiarize yourself with the recording software on Canvas.
- 8. You will be graded on the overall quality of your work, not on the number of correct or incorrect answers as long as your homework shows that you are trying your best effort. However, you will lose points on mistakes that you keep making after being corrected in previous homework assignments.
- 9. Late or incomplete homework will not be counted.
- 10. Check CANVAS regularly before and after class for updates and for Homework Assignments.

### **3- Class Participation**

This is a **student-centered** class, so participation is a key component of classroom activities. " You are expected to come prepared for class activities (this means studying the indicated vocabulary and grammar, doing the assigned readings in the textbook and the preparation homework, and actually participating in pair or group work).

<u>Arabic is the language of our classroom</u>; you are expected to speak in Arabic from the time you enter the classroom. Maintaining our Arabic speaking learning environment is beneficial to everyone. Students are required to use Arabic only at all times in class. Unwillingness to use Arabic in class will reflect negatively on your grade.

### 4- Oral presentations and writing project

The topics of both oral presentations and the written project should be chosen in consultation with the instructor. The topics <u>should be related to the Middle East or Arab culture throughout the world.</u>

# - <u>1- Oral Presentations:</u>

Each student has two main oral presentations with two different topics. First presentation (5 minutes) will take place in the <u>6th week</u> and the second presentation (5-7minutes) in the <u>14<sup>th</sup></u> week. Before the oral presentations, each student will submit the topic, the research questions and an outline. The topic must be approved by your instructor. You are required to inform me about the topic of the first presentation in the 2nd week of classes and for the second presentation in the 11<sup>th</sup> week.

# 2- Writing project

Each student will also submit a written project during the last week of classes. The topic must be approved by the instructor during the 8th week. It is a work-in-progress. After the midterm exams, you are **highly recommended** to start working on the written project.

The process is usually as follows: Students submit the topic, the research questions and an outline. Then they submit the drafts for reviewing by the instructor in the 12<sup>th</sup> week. After being reviewed, students get back their drafts with their instructor's comments or suggestions which they have to consider while working on the final version. During the entire process, students are encouraged to see their teacher during office hours for consultation or help with their written project. Your essay will need to include a <u>minimum of 3 Arabic sources</u> (on-line sources are acceptable but **not** *Wikipedia*).Criteria for the written project:

- 1. 1000 words typed in Arabic
- 2. Double space, simplified Arabic font, size 18
- 3. Use of language adequate to the Intermediate high and advanced levels.
- 4. Provide a list of Arabic references. Please use research strategies of quoting, summarizing and paraphrasing while writing your paper.
- 5. Submit all required assignments for your writing project at the due week as specified above. (Exact dates for submission will be announced)
- 6. Students should submit an original piece of writing. Plagiarism (Google translation....) will be penalized according to the OSU Student Code of Conduct.

# Criteria for the assessment of the written project

Essay structure: introduction, arguments, evidence and conclusion: Students are required to follow the normal 20%

structure of any essay starting with an introduction that moves from general to specific, then moving to the body of the	
essay that usually consists of paragraphs that play the building blocks in the construction of the student's argument, and	
ending with the conclusion that moves from specific to general.
