PART ONE: GENERAL INFORMATION

Name of proposed major: Theatre
Degree students will receive: BA

Proposed implementation date: Fall 2019

Academic units administrating program: Department of Theatre, College of Arts and Sciences

PART TWO: RATIONALE

The Department of Theatre has undertaken a targeted revision of the BA program for the purpose of improving student experiences and outcomes. This proposal takes into account several years of discussion, extensive research, feedback from our national accrediting body and program reviews, and information gathered from assessment.

Recommended changes include:

- The expansion of our required theatre history/literature course into a two-course sequence, including a revised THEA 3731 Theatre Histories and Literatures I course and a new THEA 3732 Theatre Histories and Literatures II course. (These two courses have already completed the submission and review process.) The previous one-semester course is not sufficient to cover the breadth of theatre history and literature that we expect of our students. This recommendation is bolstered by survey feedback, student focus groups, research into peer programs, reflection and benchmarking data available in the Department of Theatre's 2016-2017 BA Program Assessment Report. Our transition plan is to begin offering the two-course sequence immediately and to allow students in the transition to apply either course for their requirement.
- The elimination of Theatre 2110 Script Analysis as a major requirement. THEA 2110 Assessment data, in combination with direct feedback from students and faculty and discussion in the Undergraduate Studies Committee, has contributed to the department's decision to eliminate THEA 2110 from the required coursework for the Bachelor of Arts. Important concepts of script analysis will be addressed and applied throughout the curriculum, especially in the new history/literature sequence, rather than in a stand-alone course, allowing for a more direct link between theory and practice. Our transition plan is to drop the course from our schedule and allow students in the transition to substitute from the new history/literature sequence or from our Theatre Topics courses, THEA 5771.xx.
- Replacing the THEA 3111 Directing with THEA 3831 Movement and Voice as the second required course in the Foundations in Performance sequence. Currently, Theatre majors are required to complete THEA 3111 Directing for the degree. Faculty agree that THEA 3831 Movement and Voice is a more appropriate foundational course for the performance sequence and is also a prerequisite for many upper-level acting courses. THEA 3111 Directing will remain an elective option for Theatre majors. Our transition plan is to allow all students in the transition to apply either course for their requirement.

- The addition of an Experiential Learning major requirement. Students will choose from a list of existing courses that involve impactful learning practices. The faculty of the Department of Theatre asserts this additional requirement will improve student experiences and help better prepare students for future careers. Discussion around this addition was bolstered by results from alumni survey data collected between June and December 2016. The survey data, which can be found in the Department of Theatre's 2016-2017 BA Program Assessment Report, addressed experiential opportunities in the Department of Theatre and perceptions related to preparation for a career in the field.
- Reducing the required major elective hours to 12 credit hours at or above the 3000 level, in order to maintain the required 43 credit hours of coursework in the major. The current curriculum requires 15 credit hours of major electives.
- The addition of two existing courses as options for foundations in production.
 Currently, students must take a THEA 4000.xx course to fulfill their advanced practicum requirement. With this change, students can also choose THEA 3921S Creation of Outreach Theatre or THEA 4921S Performance Studies in Outreach Theatre, both of which provide significant and advanced experiences in production.

Students who began the program before the transition will have the option to follow the previous BA curriculum or switch to the new curriculum. Each change to the curriculum includes a transition plan to accommodate students in either situation.

These improvements will strengthen an existing program that already plays uniquely valuable role for our students, our University and beyond. With a BA in Theatre from Ohio State, our students have landed roles in major films and leading roles on Broadway, found success in fields of theatre technology, management, and outreach, continued on to graduate studies, and applied their theatre skills to excel in other fields such as law, education, and marketing. Ohio State offers unique support for a student of theatre including the Theatre Research Institute, self-production in our Lab Series, rich study abroad programs, research and training in Shakespeare and Autism, interdisciplinary programs such as Be The Street, service-learning opportunities such as InterACT, and a season of high production value performances.

PART THREE: GOALS, OBJECTIVES, AND EVALUATION OF PROGRAM

The revised major has six distinct learning goals. We have built multiple methods of assessing each goal, including direct and indirect assessments, with the majority of assessment methods already being implemented.

LEARNING GOALS

- Students exhibit broad knowledge, appreciation, and understanding of live theatrical performance as a diverse and malleable art form that can influence history, culture, politics, and society.
- 2. Students understand the technical, physical, and vocal skills required by live performers and develop these skills in practical and theoretical context.

- 3. Students understand the design, technology and management skills involved in theatrical production, and develop these skills in practical and theoretical contexts.
- 4. Students develop critical faculties as audience members, able to encounter each theatrical work on its own terms.
- 5. Students obtain experiences creating work as generative theatre practitioners.
- 6. Students grasp the terrain of contemporary theatre practice and are prepared to apply their education to professional life or further study.

ASSESSMENT METHODS

- Students exhibit broad knowledge, appreciation, and understanding of live theatrical
 performance as a diverse and malleable art form that can influence history, culture,
 politics, and society.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct Writing assignment. In Theatre 2100 (Introduction to Theatre), students create Written Production Responses that are shaped around prompts that are pitched towards appreciation and understanding of live performance. In particular, because this course also fulfills a Diversity GE, these WPRs look specifically at how live performance influences (and is influenced by) culture and society.
 - CRITERIA: The WPR is evaluated using a rubric consisting of two areas and containing a total of five criteria. The criterial included categories like Design Element, Point of Interest, Issues of Representation. At least 75% of declared Theatre majors enrolled in 2100 will earn 5 out of 5 points in the "Issues of Diversity" category.
 - SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct Embedded testing. In Theatre 2100, key questions pitched to assess broadness of knowledge, appreciation, and understanding are embedded on midterm and final exams.
 - CRITERIA: At least 75% of students will answer all key questions correctly.
 - SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct Culminating Project. Final project in the Theatre 5771 courses
 - CRITERIA: At least 75% of students with earn a B or better on the final project.
 - SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
- 2. Students understand the technical, physical, and vocal skills required by live performers and develop these skills in practical and theoretical context.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct Performance/recital. Final student performances are evaluated by a course rubric by the instructor.

- CRITERIA: At least 75% of Theatre majors enrolled in the course are scored at 15 out of 20 points or better.
- SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
- ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct. Final Project in Theatre 3831 Movement and Voice
- CRITERIA: At least 75% of students earn a B or better on the final project.
- SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
- ASSESSMENT METHOD: Indirect. Individual success rate of acting auditions
- CRITERIA: 100% of Theatre majors that audition for mainstage roles in the Department of Theatre production season are cast by their 3rd Department of Theatre audition.
- SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
- ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct Use of Rubrics. Theatre 4000.08 rubric assessing acting process and performance.
- CRITERIA: At least 75% of students will earn 2 out of 3 or better on all elements.
- SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
- 3. Students understand the design, technology and management skills involved in theatrical production, and develop these skills in practical and theoretical contexts.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct Pre- and post-testing. Students in Theatre 2111 take a preand post-test to assess their baseline familiarities with key course content and their success in mastering it.
 - CRITERIA: At least 75% of students will improve their score in all areas from the pre-test to the post-test.
 - SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct. Combined final project grades in the 3000-level required design elective courses (3411, 3511, 3611).
 - CRITERIA: At least 75% of students enrolled in all three courses will earn a B or better on the final project.
 - SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct Use of rubrics. The Theatre 3000 rubric assess each student's process and performance in the course (Run Crew).
 - CRITERIA: At least 75% of students will achieve a 4 or better on all elements.

- SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
- 4. Students develop critical faculties as audience members, able to encounter each theatrical work on its own terms.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct Writing Assignment. Students in Theatre 2100 create written production responses that are shaped around prompts that are pitched towards appreciation and understanding of live performance. Since this class is also a GE course, only declared Theatre majors will be included in the assessment.
 - CRITERIA: At least 75% of Theatre majors enrolled in the course will earn a 4 out of 5 or better in the "Point of Interest" category.
 - SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Direct. Final project grades in the Theatre History and Literatures sequence (TH 3731 & 3732)/
 - CRITERIA: At least 75% of students in either course will earn a B or better on the final project.
 - SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
- 5. Students obtain experiences creating work as generative theatre practitioners.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Indirect Participation Levels. This method will measure the level of participation in activities that involve creating work: Lab Series (extra-curricular), InterACT (TH5921S) and/or Creative Honors and Distinction Projects (TH 4998 and 4999) CRITERIA: At least 30% of majors will participate in at least one of these activities each year.
 - SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every Autumn and Spring semesters. The outcome will be assessed every other year.
 - ASSESSMENT METHOD: Indirect Survey. Department-specific question on the university Graduation Survey.
 - CRITERIA: 75% of Theatre respondents to the university Graduation Survey report that they had the opportunity to gain experiences in creating new work in coursework or production.
 - SCHEDULE: Data will be collected every year. The outcome will be assessed every three years.
- 6. Students grasp the terrain of contemporary theatre practice and are prepared to apply their education to professional life or further study.

ASSESSMENT METHOD: Indirect – Survey. The University Graduation Survey

CRITERIA: 100% of respondents that earned a BA in Theatre select a rating of 4 or 5 as a response to the question, "To what extent, through your major(s), minor(s), and other specialized study programs, have you gained in-depth knowledge, skills, perspectives, and ways of thinking related to your specialized field(s) of study?"

SCHEDULE: Data will be recorded every year. The outcome will be assessed every three years.

ASSESSMENT METHOD: Indirect – Survey. The University Graduation Survey

CRITERIA: At least 75% of Theatre respondents to the university Graduation Survey report that Ohio State has prepared them "Generally well" or "Very well" for the job market.

SCHEDULE: Data will be recorded every year. The outcome will be assessed every three years.

ASSESSMENT SCHEDULE

The program will be assessed on a three-year cycle, with two outcomes being assessed each year. This cycle will allow time to accrue meaningful data, thoughtfully discuss results, and incorporate assessment into the regular work of the department. The first assessment reports will cover data collected during the 2019-2020 academic year and will be examined in Autumn 2020 by the Department of Theatre Assessment and Curriculum Committee. A report, including any necessary actions, will be submitted by the end of Spring 2021. Every four years the assessment results will be evaluated in full by the same committee and a report presented to all department faculty.

- Year One (2020-21): Assess outcomes 1 and 4 (covering data from AU19-SP20)
- Year Two (2021-22): Assess outcomes 2 and 5 (covering data from AU19-SP21)
- Year Three (2022-23): Assess outcomes 3 and 6 (covering data from AU19-SP22)
- Year Four (2023-24): Assess outcomes 1 and 4 (covering data from AU20-SP23); Full review of assessments from Years One-Four
- Year Five (2024-25): Assess outcomes 2 and 5 (covering data from AU21-SP24)
- Year Six (2025-26): Assess outcomes 3 and 6 (covering data from AU22-SP25)
- Year Seven (2026-27): Assess outcomes 1 and 4 (covering data from AU23-SP26)
- Year Eight (2027-28): Assess outcomes 2 and 5 (covering data from AU24-SP27); Full review of assessments from Years Five-Eight

PART FOUR: RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER PROGRAMS/BENCHMARKING

Currently, the Department of Theatre offers a BA in Theatre and four minors: Theatre, Video Arts, Media Production and Analysis, and our new minor in Musical Theatre. Musical Theatre is the only minor program that can be undertaken by students in the BA Theatre program. For these students, a minimum of twelve credit hours in the minor must be distinct from credits for the major.

PART FIVE: STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Our BA program currently includes 95 declared Theatre majors. Our aim is to grow that number to 150 in five years, a goal we hope to reach by means of our increasing relationships high schools, involvement with Off The Lake Productions, and outreach to diverse students and programs at Ohio State.

PART SIX: CURRICULAR REQUIREMENTS

The minimum number of credits required for completion of the BA in Theatre is 121. An estimate of the average number of credits a Theatre major has earned at the completion of the major is 144. This increase is due in part to a higher number of students pursuing two majors.

Within the BA program, students are not required to take credits in other departments. Within the GE, Theatre majors would need to take between 34 and 57 credit hours in other departments. Outside of the GE, a typical student might take 6-12 credits as electives in other departments. In addition, a typical Theatre major is more likely to be pursuing a second major and taking courses from that department.

Theatre is a facilities-dependent field and the curriculum for our BA program requires stages, studios, labs and classrooms, each appointed with unique and sometimes extensive equipment. Although we are outgrowing our facilities in the Drake Performance and Event Center, the new facilities planned for the Arts District promises to support our program going forward.
