This 1 credit hour course is designed for first year, second semester graduate students to extend their learning of practice patterns, contemporary issues, and resources needed for clinical rotations in medical settings.

Prerequisites: 6752 Clinical Seminar in Speech and Language Disorders II

Course Objectives:

1.) Students will demonstrate advanced knowledge of setting specific issues, needs, and requirements for speech-language pathologists.

Learning Outcomes:

- a. Students will be able to evaluate memory care and skilled nursing practice settings based on physical space, patient population needs, and personal compatibility.
- b. Students will develop and utilize evidence based tools to optimize client-clinician interactions for persons with dementia.
- c. Students will examine and demonstrate common equipment utilized in medical practice settings.
- 2.) Students will demonstrate advanced knowledge of interprofessional practice patterns.
 - a. Students will utilize evidence-based teamwork tools during interprofessional simulation.
 - b. Students will utilize clinical reference guides to support integration of medical information outside of their practice area.
 - c. Students will demonstrate common mobility and ADL support techniques commonly used in medical practice settings.
 - d. Students will differentiate the roles of the interprofessional treatment team.
 - e. Students will convey their role on the interprofessional treatment team.
- 3.) Students will demonstrate advanced knowledge of contemporary issues in medical speechlanguage pathology.

- a. Students will analyze health literacy for a person with cognitive-communication disability.
- b. Students will analyze potential for compassion fatigue and identify strategies and resources to mitigate the effects for clinicians.
