Specific Course Description:

SHS 6755 is a 2 credit hour course to prepare the student for advancing clinical practicum placements, gain exposure to specialized areas of the field, and begin to apply the ASHA Code of Ethics in their current practicum work. Satisfactory completion of this course is intended to assist students in meeting the knowledge and skill sections, IV and V, of the ASHA 2020 Standards and Implementation Procedures for the certificate of Clinical Competence in Speech-Language Pathology (https://www.asha.org/Certification/2020-SLP-Certification-Standards/).

Class begins promptly at the appointed time; it is professional to be prepared for class before the start time. Class meetings will consist of a mix of lecture, question/answer discussion, case discussion, and guest speakers. This course occurs with weekly in-class meetings for 1 hour and 50 minutes with additional time outside of the class used for readings and completion of exercises.
