Welcome to Russian for Open-Source Media Research: Reading and Listening Comprehension, Analysis, and Translation (Russian 5160)! Reading and listening comprehension are essential skills for students of Russian who plan to work as translators, language analysts, or other industry-specific specialists. These skills are also crucial for professional travelers to Russia and countries where Russian is widely spoken or used as a lingua franca (e.g., Georgia, Kazakhstan, Ukraine, Uzbekistan, etc.). This class will also provide those who have a general interest in Russian culture a survey of topics dealing with current events, politics, and international relations. Finally, this class will engage exclusively with authentic texts employing field-specific terminology, providing students with guided interaction with natively produced, advanced texts.

Prerequisites: Russian 3101 or Russian 3121

I. Course Materials:

All required course materials (i.e., reading and listening texts) will be posted or linked on Carmen. Links to required online resources (e.g., online dictionaries, corpora, grammar references) will also be listed on Carmen.

Recommended reading: Bazzell, Michael. *Open Source Intelligence Techniques: Resources for Searching and Analyzing Online Information*, 6th Edition. ISBN-13: 978-1984201577.

II. Objectives:

- By the end of the course, students will incorporate techniques of "speed-reading" in order to comprehend, summarize, and translate authentic Russian texts online efficiently.
- Students will apply their knowledge of Russian roots, morphology, cognates, and context to comprehend advanced authentic texts.
- Students will increase their capacity to comprehend authentic Russian audio materials, such as radio and TV programs, podcasts, and interviews.
- Students will learn how to "fill in the blanks" in comprehending audio materials by resorting to a variety of informed language strategies.
- Students will learn to summarize the gist of a Russian text in order to convey its substance succinctly and efficiently in English.
- Students will develop the ability to perform brief ad hoc translations of authentic written texts and audio materials from Russian into correct, serviceable English.
- Students will produce a summary report/presentation based on open-source information gathered from Russian media.

III. Requirements and expectations:

- Students will meet in class weekly to discuss the coming homework topics and present their completed homework.
- Students will engage with authentic, natively produced texts at home to become conversant in pertinent subject matter and vocabulary, as well as develop critical reading, listening, summarizing, and translating skills.
- Students will develop and employ speed-reading skills in Russian in order to read, digest, and translate open-source texts in Russian.
- Students will read, digest, analyze, and translate key portions of open-source texts in Russian. These texts will concern a number of pertinent topics to which open-source research is currently well suited.
- Students will develop and employ listening comprehension skills for open-source research by applying their knowledge of context, language structure, and online research strategies to fill in gaps.
- Students will listen to, digest, analyze, transcribe, and translates key segments of authentic, natively produced audio- and videoclips on a number of topics pertinent to open-source research.

IV. Participation:

Students are required to attend class consistently, engage proactively with materials, and foster a productive learning atmosphere.

V. Homework:

Each week, students will spend two-to-three (2-3) hours on homework, which will consist of reading and listening to Russian online sources, using a number of strategies to comprehend

them fully, and summarize them briefly in English. Each weekly Russian reading text or audio material will be at least 1000-1500 words in length. Potential topics are as follows:

- Human rights
- Domestic Affairs
- Foreign policy
- International relations
- Finances and economic policy (Russian business and financial investments)
- Technology
- Environmental issues
- Social Media (e.g., Vkontakte, etc.)
- Russian Mass Media (*RT*, *Echo Moskvy* listening)
- Russian commentary on American issues
- Google, Google Maps, Russian search engines and resources

VI. Homework Assessment

Each week students are required to engage with a reading and/or listening text on a pertinent subject. Students will apply subject-matter knowledge and comprehension strategies to summarize and/or translate a portion of the text. Homework is due at class time and should be turned in at the end of class.

Homework will receive full credit (5/5 points) if it is

- complete (1 point);
- accurate (2 points);
- careful, neat, and legible (1 point); and
- submitted at the end of class when it is due (1 point).

→ Late homework will lose one point per day it is submitted late.

VII. Final Project

The final project requires students to conduct further research on one of the topics listed in homework section. Students will

- choose one topic,
- locate 3-5 additional open-source sources,
- extract pertinent information,
- summarize the substance of the sources (in English),
- translate 250 words into English and distribute said translation in a handout,
- package their work in neat, careful, accessible presentation (5-10 minutes depending on number of students in the class).
- Grading rubric will be provided at the time of the assignment.
