Class Format: 2 lectures/week + 1 recitation/week Monday & Wednesday (10:30 – 11:50 am) Friday (10:30 – 11:30 am)

Course Objectives:

The purpose of this GEC Capstone Experience is to examine the major classes of grugs, their psychological and biological effects, and their widespread use (medicinal, recreational, ceremonial) and abuse in contemporary society. We will also focus on the enormous costs (humanistic, social, economic) associated with drug abuse and addiction.

Relationship between this course and the goals of Category 8 of the GEC (Issues of the Contemporary World):

This capstone course is designed to meet the goals of Category 8 of the GEC – "Issues in the Contemporary World". One of the most defining issues in contemporary society is the widespread use of drugs throughout the world. The use of drugs occurs at multiple levels, including; therapeutic, recreational, and ceremonial. A particularly tragic and costly aspect of drug use is the compulsive consumption of drugs characteristic of addiction. This interdisciplinary course will present information, on a wide range of drugs, from a psychological, biological and sociological perspective.

Student Evaluation:

The final grade in this course will be based on multiple evaluations. Students will take two examinations (each contributing 30% of the final grade) after approximately the first 3 and 6 weeks of the quarter. These exams will be composed of multiple-choice questions. There will also be two quizzes (multiple-choice and short answer; each contributing 10% of the final grade). Each quiz will be administered during the recitation section during weeks 2 and 8 of the quarter. The final evaluation in the course will consist of a small team-based research paper due during the week of finals (contributing 20% of the final grade). The paper topic will deal with a specific issue that integrates the biological and psychological aspects of drug use. The topic must be approved by the course faculty. It should be 10-12 pages in length and include at least 5 journal articles in its bibliography. While the overall research contributing to the paper will be conducted by small research teams, each member of the team will submitted his/her own paper.

Academic Misconduct:

DRUGS, BEHAVIOR AND MODERN SOCIETY

JUSTIFICATION AS A CAPSTONE COURSE "ISSUES IN THE CONTEMPORARY WORLD"

This course is intended to introduce students from a diverse range of majors to the contemporary issues surrounding the use (medicinal, recreational and abusive) of drugs in our world today. The course will provide a platform for discussion about cultural differences in the use of drugs as well as the costs (humanistic, economic and social) associated with drug addiction.

A. Response to specific questions

1. What contemporary issue(s) will the course address? Does the issue have worldwide significance.....?

This course will address a very contemporary issue in our society (and globally) - the use and abuse of drugs. This issue is relevant to our students now and will continue to be so for the rest of their lives. It is important that they possess a rudimentary understanding of how drugs work, cultural differences with respect to drug usage, the warning signs of drug abuse and contemporary perspectives on treating addiction.

2. Is the course based within a single discipline or is it interdisciplinary in design?

This course is inherently interdisciplinary in nature. The information will be presented from a psychological, biological, medical and sociological perspective. The two instructors in this course have international reputations in the field of psychopharmacology.

3. What features of the course will promote the interactions among students from different academic backgrounds?

Several features will promote interactions among students from different academic backgrounds. The two professors are quite skilled at stimulating discussions and soliciting opinions from a diverse audience. This solicitation will be continued during the less formal weekly recitation sections. Finally, the research paper will be a small-team effort and the instructors will strategically place students from varying backgrounds onto these teams. Students will be reinforced to maintain these interactions during the course of writing the research paper.

4. What prerequisites will be specified for this course?

Psychology 100 (Introductory Psychology) is the only prerequisite for this course. That course is taken by a very large number of undergraduates as a means of satisfying the Social Sciences (Individuals and Groups) component of their GEC requirements. This prerequisite course will provide students with a basic understanding of the psychological and biological determinants and expression of behavior.

5. What writing or research component will be required as part of the course?

Students will be required to submit, during the final exam period, a 10-12 page research paper, covering any of the topics discussed in class. Students will be divided into working groups of 3 with an effort toward maximizing the diversity of academic backgrounds in each group. Each group will submit a single paper and the grade for the paper will be given to each member of the group.

6. Will class size be limited to a maximum of 40 students?

We believe that the demand on this course could eventually be rather high. However, for the initial year, we anticipate an enrollment of 40 students. The structure of the course includes weekly recitation sessions and these will be limited to 25 students/recitation.

B. Assessment Plan

Consistent with the Model Curriculum and the GEC Guidelines and Supplementary Guidelines, this course has two learning objectives: 1) students will be required to synthesize and apply knowledge from diverse disciplines to contemporary issues and 2) students will be expected to write about and conduct research on the contemporary world. The structure of the proposed course has been designed to ensure that these learning objectives are met. Furthermore, assessment within the course has been designed to permit evaluation of the extent to which these objectives are achieved.

With regard to the first learning objective, the material that is presented will draw from a rich interdisciplinary pool of biological (the actions of drugs on the neuronal functions), psychological (the effects of drugs on various behaviors and the psychological factors that contribute to conditions of compulsive drug use), sociological (the social costs of drug addiction; social mores regarding psychoactive drug use around the globe) data. With regard to the second learning objective, students will be required to write a research paper at the end of the term. In this paper they will be expected to research an interdisciplinary topic introduced during the lectures. The sources that they draw from, in supporting the position espoused in the paper, must come from the psychological, biological and sociological literatures. A component of their evaluation will be based upon the extent to which this synthesis is interdisciplinary and reflects a problem of global significance. That is, these two aspects of their paper will be scored in a manner that will permit us to track achievement of the learning objectives across quarters. Should these data reveal that the GEC learning objectives are not being met, the course will be modified accordingly.
