COURSE DESCRIPTION and OBJECTIVES

Advanced study of the role and operation of the criminal justice system: police, courts, and corrections. This course will provide an in-depth analysis of the major areas of the criminal justice system by evaluating current literature. Prereq: Jr standing or above, or permission of instructor or department.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Analyze the nature of the relationship between the criminal justice system and members of disadvantaged groups in society.
- Understand the development of the different branches within the criminal justice system given their historical context.
- Analyze current issues related to policing, the courts.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the critical issues correctional institutions face within society, including privatization, rehabilitation, and reform.
- Understand the Constitutional rights of incarcerated populations including how those rights are enforced, and analyze the health, safety, and ethical mandates related to custody and incarceration.
- Identify current issues faced by correctional administrators and employees, as well as the existing policies, practices and procedures for both incarceration and parole.
- Evaluate various risk assessment tools.
- Read, analyze and evaluate the political, policy and legal contexts of the administration of correctional programs and services, including probation.
- Develop an understanding of the juvenile justice systems and the critical issues associated with the juvenile justice system.
- Analyze critical issues society and the system faces with the death penalty.

Your topic will be to choose anything within the CJ systems that you want to further investigate. Just make sure your topic is phrased as a question you want to answer in your research.
