Course Description

Students practice and examine individual development and artistic creation through advanced exploration of lithography and silkscreen printmaking. Students begin to develop the ability to identify and pursue individualized research, processes, themes and aspirations while they interpret and respond to significant works of art, the work of their peers, and their own expressive goals through rigorous production and critique.

Course Learning Objectives

Focusing on an advanced study of the mediums of lithography and silkscreen printing, this class allows the freedom to pursue individual concepts with critical feedback and material expertise that will facilitate a deepening of concepts and techniques. This requires a motivation and an open-minded approach to risk taking; pushing boundaries to gain technical proficiency and engage in critical discourse. Students are encouraged to be actively engaged in the print community and to build their experience by applying for competitions, helping with visiting artist print projects, attending a print conference and more.

At the successful completion of the course the student will demonstrate:

- technical and material knowledge of advanced techniques in lithography and silkscreen printing
- an understanding of color theory and color printing approaches and methods
- an understanding and applications of multi-plate printing

- an understanding of integration of digital and photographic printing methods in combination with traditional approaches
- an advanced development of concepts and ideas in their work
- the ability communicate the successes and goals of their studio practice verbally and in written form
- the ability to provide constructive and insightful critical feedback to their peers
- an understanding of the relationship of their work within the historical, contemporary and global context

How this course works

Format

This is a hands-on, process-oriented studio. This course is comprised of presentations, workshops, demonstrations, assignments, participatory activities and exercises, individual and group discussions, and reviews.

Students are encouraged to be actively engaged in the print community and to build their experience by applying for competitions, helping with visiting artist print projects, attending a print conference and more. Details are outline in the attached Printmaking Area requirements.

Demonstrations

These will be given regularly throughout the class. Demonstrations generally take place in the first portion of each class so attendance and punctuality are important. The demonstrations are intended to provide you with new information about printing or to reinforce your understanding of the process. Demos are mandatory for the Intermediate level students and optional for the Advanced level students. Additional demos can be requested and may or may not be required based off of the students' own personal knowledge of the medium.

During the first week(s) of the term we will survey the technical needs of the group and a series of technical workshops may be added to the schedule.

Research

Personal research will help you generate ideas and broaden your understanding of the print medium. This research will consist of reviewing art exhibitions, artists' lectures and workshops. Research activities will be collected and organized on your personal u.osu.edu webpage and linked to a course page.

Sketchbook

A good comprehensive sketchbook is a critical tool for the generation of ideas and approaches. You should have a sketchbook for previous years and/or for other class and it should be brought to EVERY print class. The sketchbook is not a separate assignment. Imagine your sketchbook as a visual diary. It should be used when developing ideas, taking notes, etc.

The Program of Study and Projects

This course is based on self-directed research. Students will develop their own projects and articulate the aims of the project in writing using the attached Project Description form. Students at the advanced level should be able to develop project effectively. Intermediate students may require more guidance developing projects. Each Project Description form outlines the goals for a small body of work (2-4). These will likely be a combination of editions and experimental monoprints. This class requires you to incorporate lithography and/or silkscreen print media in your projects, however your approach may be very open and you are mostly asked to work in your own direction. Content is up to you and you are encouraged to work in a series. By completing three (3) Project Plans the final portfolio should contain **minimally 8-10 fully considered works**, with multiple layers or (depending on media) or multi-media piece with an equivalent amount of work. You should be self-motivated and working all the time, having new completed work for each critique.

Critiques

During group and individual critiques, we will discuss technical, aesthetic and conceptual development. Critiques are a valuable opportunity to receive feedback about your work and to share ideas and suggestions with your peers. Conduct in critiques should be professional at all times. You will not be expected to mat work for critiques, however work should be presented in a professional manner. There are three sessions scheduled for the term.

Participation and Evaluation

Attendance

Art is a field that requires discipline, timely participation, and respectful and thoughtful communication. Active engagement is essential to learning in our discipline. You are expected to come to class prepared and to participate actively in each class. Spontaneous and planned studio experiences and discussions are impossible to recapture or duplicate. Attendance will be taken regardless of delivery format.

The Department of Art recognizes that students may on occasion miss class due to extenuating circumstances such as illness, emergency or other important matters. When this occurs, it is your responsibility to request updates and notes from a peer and to review any course material on Carmen that is associated with the class you missed. It is important to notify your instructor of factors that may be impacting your ability to be present or participate effectively in a timely manner. Please communicate attendance concerns when appropriate.

Participation expectations:

Attendance, productive class activity and meeting in-progress deadlines are factors in the assessment of your assignments. Students are expected to be present and active for the entire class period. Attendance may be taken at any point in the course meeting therefore, you may be counted as absent if you are not present when attendance is taken. Three late entries /early departures = one absence. Tardiness, missing class, and poor preparation can, therefore, impact your project/course grades in a detrimental manner.

The Department of Art acknowledges that illness, family obligations, and other conflicts with your classes do occur from time to time and up to three absences are allowed for any reason during the semester without penalty. In the instance that you miss three class meetings, you are required to meet with your instructor to discuss strategies for avoiding additional absences. Missing class more than 20% of the semester (six class meetings for a course that meets twice a week or three class meetings for courses that meet once per week) may result in an E grade for the course.

Grading

There are 300 possible points this term, distributed across three small groups/bodies of work and the resulting critiques. Assessments will use a rubric that provides an assessment of performance.
